## Northam Man Gets Contract

OTTAWA—A contract for \$35,742 has been awarded to Ralph Ford, of Northam P.E.I., for improvements at Judes Point, P. E. I. it was announced by the Minister of Public Works, Honourable Howard Green. The company submitted the lowest bid on the project in response to the Department's advertising for public tenders. Specified completion date in January 15, 1960.

This work will consist of the construction of a landing 320 feet long and 28 feet wide, and the grading of the approach area. The landing will be of creosoted pile bent construction with a timber-concrete composite deck.

The landing is to be built on the south side of the dredged basin at Judes Point over the site of an existing smaller landing, which it will replace. The increased landing space will provide more convenient facilities for the large number of fishermen and boats operating at Judes Point,
