

Local and Other Items.

ENTERTAINMENT.—The Lawn Tennis Club's Entertainment at the Lyceum Tuesday evening, 23rd April.

TRAFFIC INCREASING.—The Times reports that passenger traffic over the Ectouche and Moncton railway is increasing rapidly. There is also an increase in the freight business.

LOTTERY TICKETS SEIZED.—The Department of Customs at Ottawa has been notified by the Collector of Customs at Galt, Ont., that he has seized several hundred Louisiana State Lottery tickets and destroyed them.

SCARLET FEVER.—It is pleasing to learn from the St. John Sun that scarlet fever, which caused so much alarm for a time both in that city and Portland, is fast disappearing. For the week ending Sunday, only three cases were reported to the chairman of the Portland board of health.

THE MARKET.—There was a very small attendance at the market to-day, and prices were about the same as last week. The only new feature noticeable was a dusky dapper from the Indian settlement, with her hair banded in a style that would make some of her white sisters turn green with envy.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

Debates and Proceedings.

OTTAWA, April 11.

After routine Sir John moved that henceforth on Mondays the Government measures have precedence.

Mr. Cook moved in amendment that his Home Rule resolution be made a special order for Monday.

Sir John replied that the majority of the members were just now more concerned in getting away as soon as possible, so as to exercise their individual home rule in Canada.

The amendment was rejected without division.

In reply to Mr. Laurier the Premier announced that owing to pressure of business, the usual Easter recess would be dropped, and that the House would adjourn on Thursday, the 18th, to meet again on Saturday, the 20th. The present week, however, the House would not sit on Saturday.

Mr. Flynn took the floor on the motion to go into supply, and held it for almost two hours, denouncing the location of the Cape Breton railway, its cost, its construction, and all concerned therewith.

Mr. McDougall, in reply, showed that the central route served a population of 40,000, within a twenty mile belt along the line, while the line advocated by Mr. Flynn would not suit over 24,500 people. He gave figures to show that the present location applied in even a greater degree as regards serving the section of Cape Breton richest in the production of the soil.

The debate was continued by Messrs. Kirk Cameron, McKeen and Purcell, (the builders of the St. Peter's canal) when Mr. Flynn's resolution was bounced without the formality of a division, and the House went into committee of supply on the item of canals.

Wreck Sighted.

NEW YORK, April 11.

Purser Coates of the Mallory Line str. San Antonio arrived here to-day. He says that on Sunday morning at 10 o'clock, 20 min. north of Frying-pan Lightship, a wreck, flying a signal of distress, was sighted. The steamer was unable to get close to her on account of the heavy sea, but discovered five men on board the bark. She had lost three topmasts, jibboom and stays. One of the men shouted out he and his companions were starving, but they could not be taken off until the sea went down. About four hours after the steamer State of Texas, of the same line, came to their aid, and the San Antonio proceeded on her way, leaving the State of Texas in charge of the wreck of the bark.

The Fisheries Report.

OTTAWA, April 11.

The fisheries report was submitted to-day. The total value of fish taken during last year was \$17,400,000, a decrease of \$967,500 from the year previous. The deficiency is made up as follows: Nova Scotia, \$562,750; New Brunswick, \$617,640; P. E. Island, \$14,590; British Columbia, \$72,690. The other Provinces show increases. The decline for P. E. Island fisheries is largely due to falling off of the mackerel and lobster catch. The Assistant Inspector lays great stress on the damage occasioned to the herring fishery by the use of purse seines. He recommends their utter prohibition.

The Vote Approved Of.

TORONTO, April 11.

A convention of the Liberal-Conservative electors of St. Lawrence Ward, at which sixty-three were present, approved of Mr. Small's vote on Col. O'Brien's resolution, by sixty to three. There was a good deal of grumbling, and the three members comprising the minority resigned.

The Challenge Accepted.

NEW YORK, April 11.

The New York Yacht Club has accepted the Earl Dunraven's challenge to race for the America's Cup, the cup committee to decide whether there shall be a series of three or five races, which will report at the next meeting of the club.

Montreal Harbor Clear.

MONTREAL, April 11.

The ice went down the river to-day and the harbor is now completely clear.
