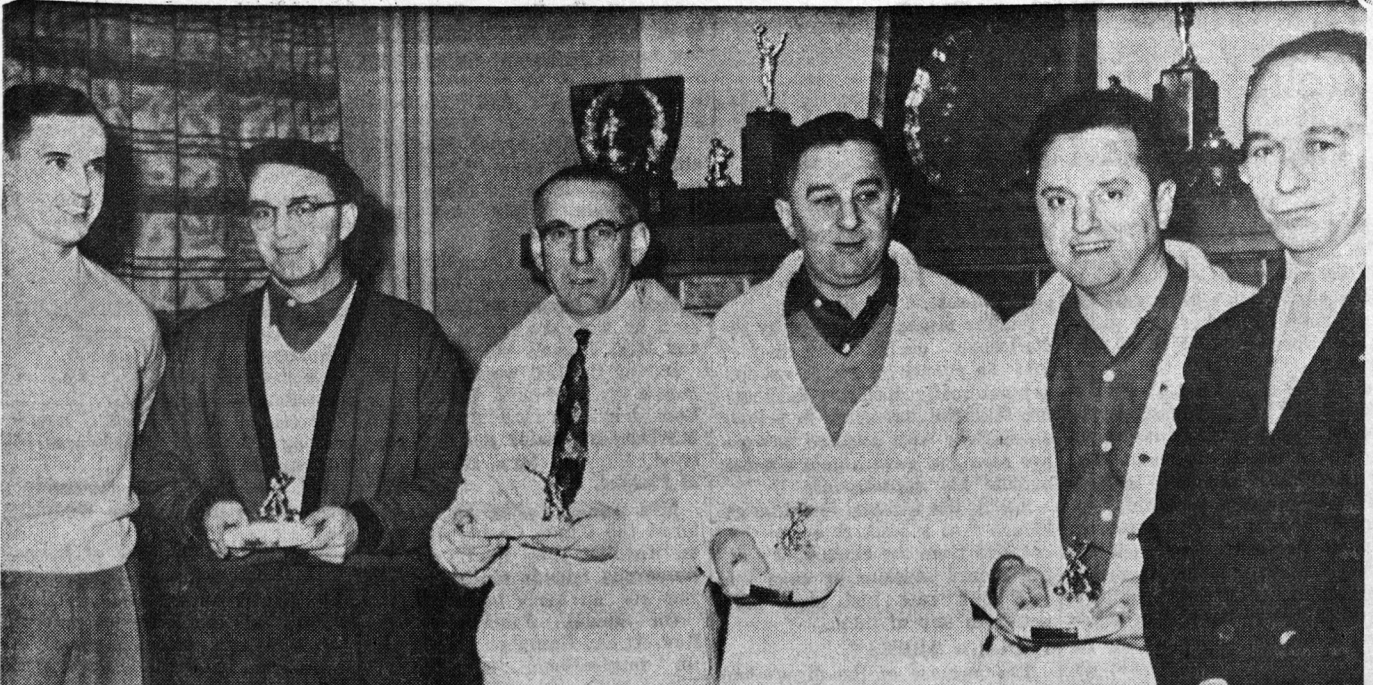

## Bruins Defeat Rangers As Montreal Gets By Chicago

BOSTON (AP)—Fleming Macell scored midway in the third period with defender Lou Fontinato hanging on and provided Boston's 4-3 victory over New York Sunday night. Andy Bathgate of the Rangers scored his 19th and 20th goals in the National Hockey League game at the Garden.

Mackell connected at 10:45 of the final period, skating straight in on the net. Fontinato wound up in the cage on the play. The puck went in the area just vacated by New York goalie Gump Worsley.

The goal, set up by Don McKenney's pass from behind the net, put the Bruins in front 4-2 but made the eventual difference. Bathgate scored his 20th for the Rangers on an 85-foot slap shot from mid-ice which tore the glove of Bruins' goalie Harry Lumley at 13:35.

In a wild finish, the Bruins held off a New York advantage when Worsley was pulled in the last 50 seconds in favor of an extra skater.

Six penalties, including four majors for fighting, cut both teams to the minimum three skaters most of the final five minutes.

LONDON (AP) — Manchester United snatched a 5-4 away victory over Arsenal Saturday in an English Soccer League thriller that saw United strike back after the home team had scored three times in as many minutes.

It was the highlight match of the day—one that saw 11 First Division matches produce 45 goals.

League-leading Wolverhampton Wanderers showed the way with a 5-1 slamming of lowly Leicester City—a victory that maintained Wolves' five-point lead.

Preston North End maintained second place, routing Birmingham City 8-0.

Wolves led the championship race with 42 points from 28 matches. Manchester United is third with 36 points.
