TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DISPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

Damaged by Heavy Rains.

St. John, N. B., Oct. 8. The unprecedented heavy rain of the past few days has caused an immense amount of damage to some of the leading railways of the Province, and it is feared the loss to the farmers will be very heavy. The St. John River has risen close on three feet within the past few days, and is still rising. The western express went out yesterday morning as usual, but could not proceed farther than Welsford, and consequently returned to the city. Beyond this station there is a wash-out in the vicinity of 500 feet in length and four or five feet deep. About one mile farther on is a washout 200 feet long and about 15 feet deep. These are the heavy washouts, there being some, five in all, between Welsford and H. Yt. Supt. McLeod, of the railway, thinks that repairs will be made in time to admit of trains being got through to-night or early to-morrow.

Riel Ag ain.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 8. In the Senate to-day Mr. Blair (Republican) of New Hampshire, offered a resolution which was laid over till to-morrow, calling on the President for information as to the trial for treason, the conviction and execution in Canada, in November, 1885, of Louis David Riel, who claimed to have been a naturalized citizen of the United States, and whether the proceedings in the case were according to the due process of law, including the presentation of the fact of Riel's citizenship and defence of insanity.

Action for Annulment.

NEW YORK, Oct. 8. Judge O'Brien, in the Supreme Court to-day, granted permission to Attorney-General Tabor to bring an action of annulment of the charter of the Havemeyer and Elder Sugar Refining Co., on the ground that in becoming a party to the sugar trust, which he alleged is a conspiracy under the State laws against the welfare of the people, the company has forfeited its corporate rights and exercising privileges not conferred upon it by law.

Hon. Mr. Smith's Opinion.

LONDON, Oct. 8. Wm. H. Smith, in a speech at Gloucester to-night, said, Canadians are willing to bide their time, because they know that after the presidential election in the United States they would obtain just and fair arrangements of the fisheries trouble. The people of England, America and Canada are too good friends to quarrel over a question of this time.

Emperor Frederick's Biography.

LONDON, Oct. 8. The biography of the late Emperor Frederick of Germany will be published in London shortly. It will relate solely to his domestic life. It is believed his widow is the author of the work, as her name is appended to the preface. The profits will be devoted to a hospital for the treatment of diseases of the throat. The Pall Mall Gazette says the work is being revised by Lord Salisbury.

The Currency Commission.

LONDON, Oct. 8. The Currency Commission reports are ready for presentation to Parliament. Six, including Lord Herschel, Sir Thomas Farrer, Sir John Lubbock and Mr. Courtney sign a statement supporting a gold standard, and the other six, including Messrs. Balfour, Chaplen and Mallet advocate the adoption of a metallic standard in a modified form.

A Disastrous Flood.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 8. A disastrous flood in the Province of Monken, about 350 miles north-west of Peking, caused the death of hundreds of natives, and the utter annihilation of very many homes, and the destruction of crops, and there are prospects of a general famine for the coming winter.

Mounted Police Moving.

WINNIPEG, Oct. 8. A detachment of mounted police has been stationed by the Dominion Government along the southern boundary of Manitoba, to prevent the smuggling of opium and other articles.

Cholera Still Raging.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 8. Cholera is still raging at Hong Kong, the daily average of new cases ranging from 40 to 50, most of whom will die.
