U.S. Tariff Structure Revision Completed

WASHINGTON (CP) — The first major overhaul in the U.S. tariff structure in 33 years has been completed and the revised, simplified package, product of five years redesigning, goes into operation Aug. 31. With it may come some temporary problems for Canadian and other exporters.

U.S. authorities say that although rates on thousands of items are changed or redefined in some minor way, there are no significant tariff increases and therefore they hope for a smooth transition from the old schedules to the new package. In fact, the revised package is expected to help foreign exporters for in many cases simplified definitions remove the possibility of multiple customs interpretations of the rates of duty that could be applied. This may reduce the need for court haggling to eliminate rate controversies.

The structure also has been brought up to date, clearly defining rates on scores of new items that have sprung up. **PROTESTS EXPECTED**

Four Arraigned On Break Charges

GEORGETOWN — Four young men appeared before Kings County Stipendiary Magistrate James B. Johnston, QC, here yesterday charged with breaking and entering Rays Grocery in Cardigan and stealing approximately \$20, and two cans of tomatoes.

Three of the men, James Herbert Williams, Gerald William Cronin, both of Cardigan, and Clifford James Galtier of Georgetown all elected trial by magistrate and pleaded guilty and were remanded in custody to Aug. 28 for sentence.

The fourth party, Donald Jerome O'Brien of Cardigan did not elect and was remanded in custody for one week to permit time to obtain legal counsel.

Joseph Clarence Cundon of Murray Harbor North was fined \$6 and costs for having undervalued tobaccos in his possession and a second fine of \$20 and costs for illegal possession.

Pearson To Place Memorial Stone

Plans for the visit this weekend of Prime Minister Lester B. Pearson, and the accompanying ceremony, Monday afternoon, for the Fathers of Confederation Memorial Building were announced yesterday by Dr. Frank MacKinnon.

The Prime Minister, accompanied by Mrs. Pearson, will arrive by private plane Sunday. Directors of the Fathers of Confederation Memorial Citizens Foundation will arrive in the city on the weekend.

The ceremony will take place at the corner of Grafton and Queen Streets on the plaza of the new theatre.
