SUMMERSIDE — A Summerside resident, Walter Joseph "Peanuts" Arsenault, was charged with breaking, entering and committing an indictable offence. He was remanded to Friday with bail set at \$2,000.

The charge followed alleged intrusions into two Summerside homes, the assault of the lone occupant of one of the residences. Mrs. L. G. Lewis, and her husband of about \$40 which was taken from her purse.

Means must be Taken to Ensure A Better Rate of Growth for our Economy

Summary of address by the President of The Provincial Bank of Canada, Mr. J.-U. Boyer, at the 62nd Annual General Meeting of Shareholders held in Montreal, December 11th, 1962.

...The year about to end has been characterized by a fair degree of prosperity. The gross national product has increased during the year. According to the latest statistics, we may expect a rise of about 6% in current dollars and 5.4% in physical volume. The main factor in this increase will apparently be government expenditures for goods and services, which so far have risen by 8.7%. On the other hand, consumer expenditures are showing signs of slowing and there is every indication that a lower portion of income will be devoted to consumption this year than in 1962.

...The Provincial Bank has been called to assist in the financing of the government's program to reduce unemployment. This has been done through the issue of government securities, which the bank has helped to place with the public.
