THE LYMPH ANALYZED.—An analysis of Koch's lymph for the cure of consumption has been made in Paris and reveals the fact that it is composed of the remains of the ptomaine tubercular bacilli which is a poison as violent as the venom of serpents; cyanare of gold and glycerine. The glycerine preserves the ptomaine and the gold gives the liquid its brownish color.

THE QUEBEC WAY.—The Quebec newspapers are furnished with an "official report" of City Council proceedings. This is prepared by the clerk and usually appears in the newspapers two or three days after the meeting. In Montreal, during the reading of minutes, reporters are rigidly excluded from the council room and policemen are stationed at the doors to see that none of them slip in unawares.

A GOOD SEASON'S WORK.—A New Brunswick exchange says that the lobster pack of Westmoreland County last season amounted to 14,223 cases, or 682,704 pounds. This shows a pronounced increase over last year's work. The total pack for 1889 was 9,514 cases, or 456,672 pounds; an increase this year of 5,409 cases, or 126,032 pounds.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.
Fighting With Indians.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 15.
Indian Commissioner Morgan this evening received from Indian Agent McLaughlin the following despatch, dated Fort Yates, N. D.:

"The Indian police arrested Sitting Bull at his camp this morning. His followers attempted to rescue him and fighting commenced. Four policemen were killed and three wounded. Eight Indians were killed, including Sitting Bull and his son. Crowfoot and several others were wounded. The police were surrounded for some time, but maintained their ground till relieved by United States troops, who now have possession of Sitting Bull's camp, with all the women, children and property. Sitting Bull's followers, probably one thousand men, have deserted their families and fled up Grand River."

Trade With the West Indies.
OTTAWA, Dec. 15.

The Minister of Finance at latest accounts had returned from Trinidad to Barbadoes, and at all points which he visited had met a most cordial reception. He is expected to reach Jamaica on the 12th, and according to present arrangements, will sail from Bermuda for New York on the 25th. There is every indication that his trip will prove most beneficial to the development of trade with the West Indies.

Iri h Affairs.
DUBLIN, Dec. 15.

Patrick O'Brien and Michael O'Brien Dalton, members of parliament, who were sentenced to six and four months imprisonment respectively for conspiring to induce tenants not to pay rent, were removed today to Nenagh to be tried for rioting at the opening of the conspiracy case at Tipperary. They both regret they cannot be with Parnell in his fight to retain the leadership of the Irish party.

A Disastrous Fire.
LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Dec. 15.

Two thriving Arkansas towns, Dardanelle and Monticello, were almost wiped out of existence Sunday night by fire. The whole business blocks were burned with their contents. The aggregate loss is \$150,000, partly insured. Dardanelle is in the western part of the State and Monticello in the south.

Details of Detective Work.
MONTREAL, Dec. 15.

Major Bond, secretary of the Citizens' League, has issued a circular to-day giving details of their detective work in Montreal. The League says there are 1100 licensed and 1200 unlicensed grog shops, and between four and five hundred houses of ill-fame within the city limits.

Major D. W. Stevenson, B. A., of London, Ireland, British Agricultural and Industrial Delegate to the Dominion of Canada, one of a party of 13 delegates from England, Ireland, Scotland and France, who visited the Dominion on the invitation of Federal Government, to prepare a report for circulation in the districts they represent at home, arrived last evening by the steamship Stanley. He will be the guest of His Honor the Lieut. Governor at luncheon to-day and will have an opportunity of meeting a number of representative people.

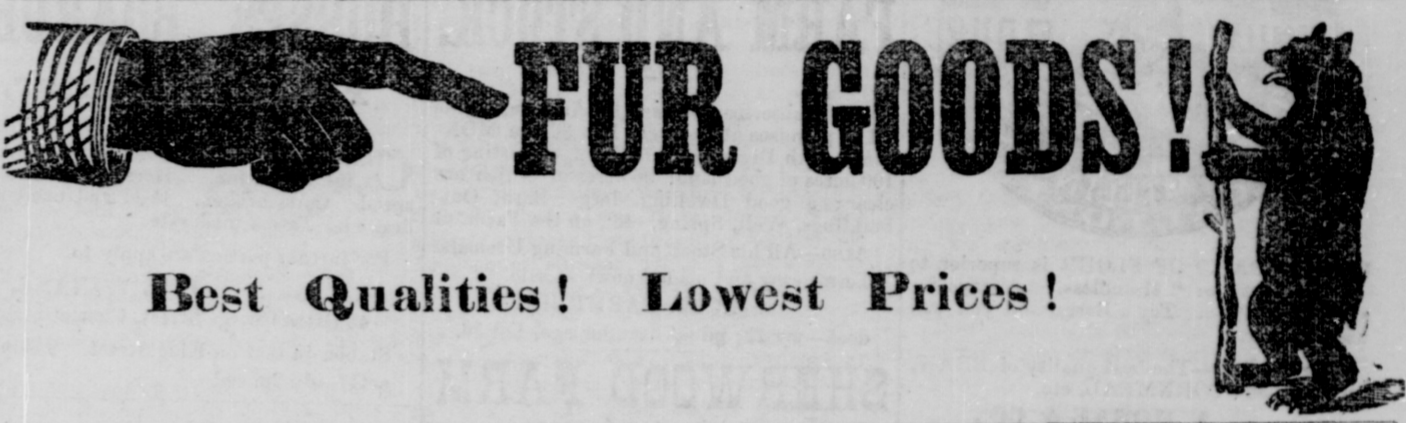
