personal use or for adornment of the person; goldsmiths and silversmiths' products; pewter ware; Articles of cut glassware, crystal glassware, cut or not, etched glassware, or metal decorated glassware; articles of china, porcelain, earthenware, marble, stoneware, or other pottery ware; carbonated beverages, aerated waters, unfermented fruit juice beverages and imitations thereof and all other compounded or mixed soft drinks and all mixtures or products advertised or sold for making soft drink beverages or imitations thereof, whether sold in liquid, concentrated or in dry form; candy, chocolate, chewing gum and confectionery that may be classed as candy or a substitute for candy.

Remove Sales Tax

Oil and gas burners and stokers for use with furnaces for the heating of buildings; coal crushers and stokers for use directly in the manufacture or production of goods; equipment sold to or imported by municipalities for their own use and not for resale, at a price in excess of \$1,000 per unit, specially designed for use directly for road making, road cleaning or fire fighting, but not to include automobiles nor ordinary motor trucks.

Wall panels for use in buildings and materials for use in the manufacture of such panels; drain tile not exceeding four inches in inside diameter and 12 inches in length; sheet music and materials used in its manufacture; hearing aids and parts thereof, including batteries specifically designed for use with such hearing aids.

N. S. Labor Given Guarded Pledge

HALIFAX, (CP) - Nova Scotia labor carried its fight for strong anti-recession measures into the ranks of the Progressive Conservative Opposition Tuesday and came away with a guarded pledge of support.

The 100-member labor team was closeted with legislative Opposition Leader Robert L. Stanfield and his followers for more than an hour before the opening of the afternoon house sitting. The delegates demanded support for the program to ease unemployment which they took before Premier Angus L. Macdonald and cabinet members Monday.

Mr. Stanfield told the labor representatives they would have the backing of most Progressive Conservatives at the meeting although some undoubtedly had different viewpoints with regard to details of the program.

Liberal From Fifth King's Would Keep Dragger From Inshore Fishing Areas

The suggestion that the Department of Industry and Natural Resources should force dragger to cease sweeping inshore fishing grounds was made in the Legislature last night by Mr. George Saville, Liberal Fifth Kings as he took part in the debate on the Budget.

Mr. Saville stated he had been told that the draggers were coming in at night and fishing those areas. He stated that they were destroying the inshore fishermen's gear and forcing a number of inshore fishermen out of business.

Mr. Murray Harbor fisherman told me that he fitted up a new set of gear and the first night nearly all his gear was destroyed by dragger," stated Mr. Saville. In opening his remarks he said that he was grieved that the dragger were catching great amounts of fish at Souris and recalled that in 1946 and 1947 several boats at Annandale had landed tremendous catches of hake.

"I know that it is pretty tempting for the dragger fishermen but it is not fair to the rest. The people of Prince Edward Island have fitted these men to go out long distances for their fish and they should not interfere with the inshore fishermen."

Mr. Saville stated that he fully agreed with Mr. Hubert Gaudet that there should be a cold storage plant in Prince County. "I have always been of the opinion that there should be a cold storage plant in each county. He stated he did not know what would have happened had the Jones Government not built such a plant in Charlottetown.

He warned against lobster poaching and warned if the practice continued the lobster would become so scarce that the Government would be forced to step in and stop lobster fishing the same as the Newfoundland Government did in a certain area a few years ago.

He suggested that size limits on

potatoes consumed in Charlottetown 50 years ago as there are today," he stated.

He complimented Mr. H. W. Clay of the Dominion Department of Agriculture for outlining a breeding plan for developing a high quality bacon hog.

Winter Roads "I think that if necessary road machines should be called in during October and examined by a competent mechanic. If there should be any doubt about any parts these parts should be discarded and new ones provided so that the machines would be ready for service in the clearing of winter roads," he stated. Mr. Saville suggested that three or four machines could be taken in at one time in order not to interfere with road work.

He suggested increased facilities so that the plows would be out as early as possible and asked for two more plows for Kings County. He said there were only nine miles of paved road in the Georgetown area and six in the Souris area so that the people couldn't say Kings County had a great amount of paved roads.

New Radar Equipment For Data On Weather

MONTREAL, (CP) - McGill University is to install newly developed radar equipment, enabling meteorologists to probe the skies up to a distance of 400 miles for weather data. It was disclosed Monday.

David Atlas, representative of the geographical research directorate of the United States Air Force at Cambridge Mass., said his group is supplying the radar signal apparatus, which goes into operation this summer.
