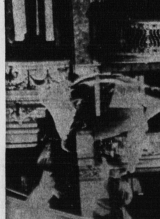
ATTENDS FUNERAL

Parliamentary Delegates To See Fountain Opening

Delegates attending the sixth annual Commonwealth Parliamentary Association convention here will be on hand this evening when the Central Fountain, donated by the British Government for the Fa-

thers of Confederation Memorial building will be put into operation by the High Commissioner to Canada, Sir Henry Lintott.

The fountain is located near Grafton Street between the historic Provincial Building and the new museum of the Parliament of Confederation buildings. Sir Henry and Lady Lintott will be met at the airport by Hon. J. Watson, McNaught, Mrs. McNaught, and Dr. Frank MacKinnon.

During this morning the delegates to the conference will be guests of Lieutenant Governor W. J. MacDonald and Mrs. MacDonald for a tour of Government House and coffee. They will then travel to Green Gables at Cavendish and afterwards to the airport by Hon. J. Watson, McNaught, Mrs. McNaught, and Dr. Frank MacKinnon.

They will lunch at Lakeview Lodge and will then tour the national park and will then arrive at the farm of Mr. and Mrs. Lyle Bewall and Son at Marshfield. This farm has been awarded for safety.

On leaving the Rowall farm they will arrive back at Charlottetown for the fountain ceremony at 5 o'clock. During the evening, the group will attend a reception by the Bank of Montreal which will be followed by a P.E.I. Government Banquet with Dr. Frank MacKinnon as guest speaker, and after the dinner they will tour the Confederation Complex. GUESTS AT 5:00 P.M. Yesterday they saw the Woodleigh replicas at Burlington, the Seaman Brothers plant at New Annan, and then lunched at the Summerside Legion home, the guests of the mayor and councillors of the town of Summerside.

On leaving Summerside they toured the Acadian Fishermen's Co-op Plant, Egmont Bay, and the Fisheries Biological Station, Ellerslie. An outdoor lobster boil was held at Green Provincial Park, Port Hill, and then the delegates returned to Charlottetown.
