

# Two S'ide Men Sentenced To Penitentiary Terms

Two Summerside men were each sentenced to terms in Dorchester Penitentiary yesterday by Mr. Justice G. J. Tweedy of Charlottetown in the Supreme Court in Summerside.

Clarence Cahill, 28, was found guilty by a petit jury of assault causing actual bodily harm and was given a two-year sentence in Dorchester Penitentiary. Cahill originally was charged with robbery with violence. Cecil Arseneault, 28, who was indicted on the same charge, pleaded guilty to the reduced charge of assault and was also sentenced to two years in penitentiary.

Arseneault earlier had pleaded guilty to escaping from Prince County Jail and was also sentenced to two years in the Dorchester penitentiary on this charge, sentences to run concurrently.

Mr. D. O. Stewart, Q.C., represented the crown, Mr. L. P. O'Donnell of Charlottetown acted for the two accused.

The petit jury members were as follows: Emmett Callaghan, St. Louis, (foreman); Fred Kelly, Roseville; Wilbert Lawless, Kensington R.R.; Burton Baxter, O'Leary; Earl Phillips, O'Leary; Ernest Bryanton.

## Name Publisher of Calgary Herald

CALGARY (CP) — Appointment of Basil Dean, 39, as acting publisher of the Calgary Herald was announced Thursday.

Mr. Dean, an associate editor of the Herald since 1949, succeeds John David Southam, Herald publisher, who died suddenly at his home here Sunday, aged 45.

The announcement was made by the Southam Company Limited.

Mr. Dean is the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Dean and was born in Newbury, Berkshire, England, in 1915.

Mr. Dean came to Canada in 1939 under the Empire Press Union exchange plan, joining the staff of the Hamilton Spectator as a reporter.

## Grave Anxiety

Plus' speedy recovery.

The Pope lay pale and feeble in his simple white-walled bedroom overlooking St. Peter's Square. His Swiss guard knelt in prayer in the Vatican corridors. Outside, a small group gathered in the square gazed intently at his bedroom windows.

Only the Pope's physicians were permitted to enter the chamber where the pontiff passed his perilous hours. It is on the top floor of the yellowish brick palace whence he had ruled the church for 15 years.

## ISSUE EXTRAS

Rome newspapers issued extras reporting the pontiff's condition. One said he had requested extreme unction, the sacrament administered to Catholics in danger of

## Death—but a Vatican spokesman denied this.

Returning last Saturday from his summer residence at Castel Gandolfo, the Pope suffered a recurrence of the gastritis and hiccups which struck him down for two months from late January until March. He had taken no food orally since returning to the Vatican.

A Vatican press office spokesman said the pontiff suffered a "serious collapse" at 4 p.m. (10 a.m. EST). The spokesman described this as a weakening of the heart, but qualified this later to say it was not a heart attack. Other reliable sources inside the Vatican said the pontiff's heart, which held up strongly during the earlier attacks this year, had weakened.

The Pope was suffering again from nausea (vomiting).

In the afternoon, the Pope's private physician, weary himself from night-long vigils at the pontiff's bedside, came out of the papal apartment and announced:

"There has been a worsening of the general condition of the Holy Father, but for the moment it is not alarming. He is conscious and fully lucid."

## Grave Concern

Despite this reassurance, grave concern was felt throughout the Holy See and Rome. Italian Premier Mario Scelba was notified and asked that he be kept informed throughout the night. Foreign diplomats accredited to the Vatican began arriving to inquire about the Pope's condition.

Msgr. Angelo Dell'Acqua, substitute secretary of state at the Vatican, said there would be no official announcement on the Pope's condition before morning.

In recent days the usual Vatican sources, including L'Osservatore Romano, Vatican newspaper, had minimized the current attack in the hope the Pope's extraordinary vitality, despite his apparent frailty, would induce a quick recovery.

When the Pontiff arrived from Castel Gandolfo Saturday he seemed worn out. He was to have visited a Marian basilica across the Tiber river on his 15-mile drive into Rome but instead went straight to the Vatican.

For the first time since Pope Plus' elevation in 1939, he failed to attend the opening Sunday of the Vatican's annual spiritual exercises preliminary to Christmas.

In January, 1953, the Pope suffered an attack of bronchial pneumonia. The gastric disorders struck him a year later, last Jan. 25. Flat on his back for two months, he still managed to keep in touch with vital church matters by daily con-
