At Alberton, on Friday evening, James Stapleton assaulted a man named Gillis with an iron wrench, and inflicted such injuries on him that his life was despaired of until yesterday, when he began to show signs of recovery. Stapleton was arrested, but escaped from the custody of the constables.

AT THE Licensing Board Meeting held in the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court last evening, present, Messrs. SUPPOSED DROWNING ACCIDENT.—A Magdalen despatch of the 16th says: "Two men belonging to the schr. 'Adelaide,' of Summerside, P. E. I., lying at anchor in Pleasant Bay, left the vessel last evening to go on shore and visit some friends. They left the house they had been visiting at about 11 o'clock, p. m., to return on board their vessel, since which time they have not been seen. A dory is missing from the beach this morning, and it is supposed in attempting to return to their vessel they were capsized and drowned, or driven out to sea, as the wind was blowing from the westward during the night.

THE necessity of organizing a society for the prevention of cruelty to animals, in this city, is every day becoming more and more apparent. Time and again we see instances which require the redress demanded by such a society. But the protection of dumb animals from the heartless cruelties perpetrated by their owners is a matter of law as much as a matter of a S. P. C. A. Then why do not the officers of the law become more vigilant? Why do they not punish every unfeeling wretch they see ill-using dumb animals. Yesterday a truckman passed through our streets driving a horse, attached to sloop, which was loaded with sixteen barrels of flour. The Civic by-law distinctly states that "six barrels of flour shall be deemed as composing a load." The individual to which we refer carries but two barrels short of three times that number, and with all on board asks his neighbor to "help his team up the hill." Again, we often see an individual driving the mere skin-covered frame of a horse through our streets. Many times we see this sorrowful-looking animal loaded with coal, the driver perched upon the cart, instead of helping in an odd turn of the wheel. With reins in hand, this heartless human jerks the bit against the toothless gums of the infirm quadruped, while the weight of his lazy carcass added to the load, apparently bends the back of the animal in such a manner as would lead the spectator to believe it is cracking and about to break. These are two of many instances which we could quote had we space at our disposal. We hope the authorities will take this matter in hand, and justly punish the cruel offenders.

PRIZES PRESENTED BY THE PRINCESS.

HOMEWARD BOUND.

OTTAWA, Sept. 22.

The Dominion Shooting Match was finished to-day. The Princess presented the prizes in the Senate Chamber this afternoon.

The Island Team secured twenty individual prizes.

Private Dover won first prize in Minister of Militia's competition. Sergeant Macdougall won two prizes and badge in the Governor-General's Match, and is sixth in the Wimbledon Team. Two hundred and fifty competitors entered. In the shooting averages the Island Team did remarkably well; but was at a disadvantage in competing against the other Provinces, because of the small number sent here. The Team leaves for home to-morrow.
