the Union in a very compromising  
position and they tried to get the  
story hushed up by buying off the  
DJ involved by giving him his old  
job back.

with experience, could  
develop into a good all  
round player. Another for-  
mer Rural player and mem-  
ber of P.E.I.'s Winter  
Games team is guard Sandy  
MacAusland. Sandy, exper-
