P.E.I. Builders Exchange Announced Men Returned

The P.E.I. Builders Exchange in conjunction with the various construction employers in P.E.I. last night announced that following a series of meetings with a committee of the workers that all the men are returning to work immediately.

"All employers have unanimously agreed that they will accept all workers back on their jobs without prejudice. Contrary to current rumors being circulated it is not necessary for a worker to belong to a union to go to work and the employers have also agreed that all workers will be treated equally union or non union."

"As soon as sufficient workers have returned to their jobs management will have their committees investigate any and all grievances of the workers. We regret any inconvenience that we may have caused to the public, but as we were not advised or made aware of any problems until after the walk-out occurred and because of lack of communication in the initial stages valuable time was lost and many workers' families suffered. As soon as communications could be established the P.E.I. Builders Exchange took all possible steps to resolve the problem and have the men return to work."

A preliminary agreement for protesting construction workers to return to their jobs was reached Tuesday. There had been no announcement of any decision until yesterday when Michael Schurman, representative of the P.E.I. Builders Exchange and J.M. McAlduff, representative

of the P.E.I. Construction Workers issued the following statement:

STATEMENT

"On April 26, 1966, a preliminary agreement was reached between the two parties, as a result of which all men are urged to return to work as soon as possible without prejudice on the side of either party."

"Committees are now being formed by labour and management to continue progress toward the eventual solution of current labour problems."

"A general meeting is being planned for Saturday afternoon in order to explain to all construction workers the details of the preliminary agreement made on their behalf. Time and place to be announced."

"It is our hope that the good faith which has prevailed in our meeting shall continue to exist."

High Winds Cause Delay

The Northumberland Ferries Limited were forced to cancel the opening of the scheduled runs between Caribou and Wood Islands for the second consecutive day yesterday. High winds in the strait did not allow the Department of Transport to lay the bouys required to operate. Company officials hoped that they would have been able to start operations April 27. Gordon MacDonald Elected President

At the construction workers regular protest meeting Thursday morning Gordon MacDonald was elected president of the Construction and General Labor Local No. 1, P.E.I.

Other officers elected included: vice-president, Eugene Clarkin; recording secretary, Errol MacEachern; financial secretary, Gavin Duffy and treasurer, Roger Keizer. All officers elected this morning will be sworn in at a later date. A number of committees and delegates will also be appointed later.

GOOD NEWS

Rejean Charlebois, international representative of the labourer's union, had what he called "good news" for the men and told them he hoped to have even better news soon. He said, "We have 85 per cent of the battle in the bag. There is a little group which hasn't come around to us yet but they should not have much trouble. All but the heavy and highway construction people have agreed to recognize us. We can't stop now, we have to have all employers sitting at the table."

It was also announced yesterday that the Department of Labor has agreed to certify the men in a very short time.

The international representative for operating engineers, Paul E. Wile, Lower Sackville, N.S., attended this Thursday's meeting.

He told the men, "The job has been well done up to this point. The battle is mainly in your favour now, don't let it slip through your fingers."

Mr. Wile continued by telling the men that they had a solid group and should stay that way. He said it was important to have all contractors recognize them to do away with competition on this matter.

STEP FORWARD

He called the position the department of labor is taking now a "really big step forward." He said, "The Department of Labor

is in full accordance with labor. You are being fully supported by this department."

In regards to a statement made by Mike Schurman, vice-president of the P.E.I. Builders Exchange, who said a very important statement would be made at noon yesterday, the officials of the labor protest said they did not know what that might be but that no agreement would be reached without heavy construction.

"You will be going back to work very soon," Mr. Charlebois told the men. "You must remember that this battle was not made for money alone but also for recognition. Stay together."

SUGGESTED MEETING

It was suggested that a meeting be held at the Basilica Recreation Centre at 2 p.m. Saturday afternoon if the centre is available. The general feeling yesterday morning was that this Saturday's meeting might be the last one in protest. It is hoped to have news of returning to work then.

Since Mr. Charlebois will be unable to attend Saturday's meeting Bill Shields thanked him for his help and called him a "person who gives his all for the benefit of others."

Mr. Charlebois said he was a little jealous that he would not be able to attend Saturday's meeting and see the possible wrap-up of this protest. He said, "Nothing can replace the happy faces I see before me now. We're going to make the economy of this Island higher. We're all going to make a better living."

It was reported that Elgie Carmichael, international representative for the electricians, is on his way to the Island again.
