Civic Stadium Operated At Net Profit of \$602.89

A net profit of \$602.89 in the operation of Summerside Civic Stadium was shown in the revenue and expenditure statement tabled at the annual meeting of the Summerside town council on Monday evening, by the Chairman of the finance committee, Councillor W. E. MacCausland.

Under the management of Charlie Hogan, income at the Stadium during the year totalled \$46,772.12, while expenditures for this same period totalled \$46,169.23. The canteen under the direction of Clovis Perry, showed a revenue of \$17,700.82, while other in the revenue statement, indicating the seasonal programs conducted at the stadium throughout the year, by the manager Charlie Hogan, included:
