Specializing in classics, he is at present touring British Columbia with U.B.C. Players Group, appearing in George Bernard Shaw's "Major Barbara."

\$20,000 DAMAGE CLAIM BEFORE EXCHEQUER COURT IN CH'TOWN

A claim for \$20,000 damages by Harold Behm, Grandview, and a counter claim for \$2,070 by the Crown is being heard by Mr. Justice Alphonse Fournier of the Exchequer Court of Canada. The actions arose from a collision between a 1936 Ford driven by Mr. Behm and a Canadian Army 60 cwt. vehicle driven by WO 2 H. J. Gallant.

The accident occurred in September 1952 as the Army truck was proceeding from Montague to Charlottetown and the Ford was going from the City. It happened near Mt. Mellick just this side of the rise and curve at Cannon's Hill.

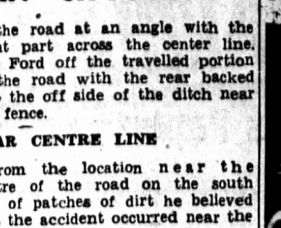
A large number of witnesses were heard starting in the morning and continuing until supper time when an adjournment was taken till 10 o'clock this morning when Court will resume.

Restaurant Ass'n President Speaks At Dinner Here

"I cannot over-emphasize the contribution of one's staff towards the success of any establishment," said Mr. Jack Sim, president of the Canadian Restaurant Association at a dinner meeting of the organization held at the Charlottetown Hotel last evening. No matter how good our food values are, competitors can give them too; competition can in a short time imitate.

Mr. Sim discussed the wage factor as largely responsible for high menu prices. Basic factors involved in employer-employee relations are opportunities for advancement, a general feeling of security and words of appreciation. Bonuses, group insurance, hospitalization plans, etc. are good incentives, he said. He stressed sanitation facilities, agreeable surroundings, tourist traffic and finally a strict adherence to food law requirements.

The speaker was introduced by Mr. Dan Chan, national director for P. E. Island, and extended a welcome by Mr. G. V. Fraser, director of the Travel Bureau who also addressed the meeting briefly. Mr. Doug Hill was chairman.
