Special Dispatch to the Examiner.

CONSTANTINOPLE, May 22. Said Pasha, Turkish Minister of Foreign Affairs, in the name of the Sultan, has demanded of the British and French Ambassadors, a recall of their squadrons from Alexandria, on the ground of the order now restored. The Ambassadors have communicated the request to their respective Governments, and are now awaiting instructions.

CITY OF MEXICO, May 22. Five men who attempted to destroy a bridge on the Mexican National Railroad, on last Friday, were caught yesterday by the Governor of the State of New Mexico, and immediately shot.

LONDON, May 22. A despatch from St. Petersburg states that the coronation of the Czar is deferred one year, because of the receipt of alarming information touching the projects of the Nihilists.

CALCUTTA, May 22. A number of small dwellings, covering three acres of ground, and occupied by natives, were destroyed by fire on Friday last.

LONDON, May 22. Sir John Holker has resigned his position as Lord Justice of the High Court of Appeals on account of ill-health. Mr. Gladstone moved the second reading of the Arrears Bill in the Commons this afternoon. The debate on the measure ensued.

WASHINGTON, May 22. The Court en banc to-day, affirm the sentence of conviction in the case of Guiteau.

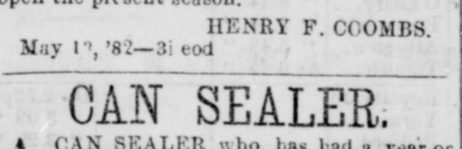

A By-Law for Levying and Specifying the rate of an Assessment on Real Estate and Incomes in the City of Charlottetown.

BE it enacted by the City Council of the City of Charlottetown, as follows:

1. The rate of assessment for the year commencing the 1st January 1882, and ending 31st December, A. D. 1882, is hereby specified and fixed at the rate of one and one-tenth of a cent on every dollar of the value of real estate within the City of Charlottetown, according to the valuation of such real estate as assessed by the assessors of the said city in their valuation roll of such real estate made and duly returned by them on the twenty-second day of April, A. D. 1882.

2. The rate of assessment for the year commencing the 1st day of January, A. D. 1882, and ending 31st December, A. D. 1882, is hereby specified and fixed at the rate of one-tenth of a cent on every dollar of the amount of the net yearly income salaries or receipts of all persons, partnerships and corporations as assessed by the assessors of the said city in their valuation rolls of such Income Tax made and duly returned by them on the twenty-second day of April, A. D. 1882.

A By-Law for allowing a rate of discount on the Assessment on Real Estate and Incomes for the current year.

BE it enacted by the City Council of the City of Charlottetown, as follows:

1. A discount at the rate of two and one-half per cent shall be allowed to all taxpayers who shall on or before the twentieth day of June, A. D. 1882, pay to the City Clerk, at his office, the taxes severally due by them for the current year on Real Estate and Incomes.
