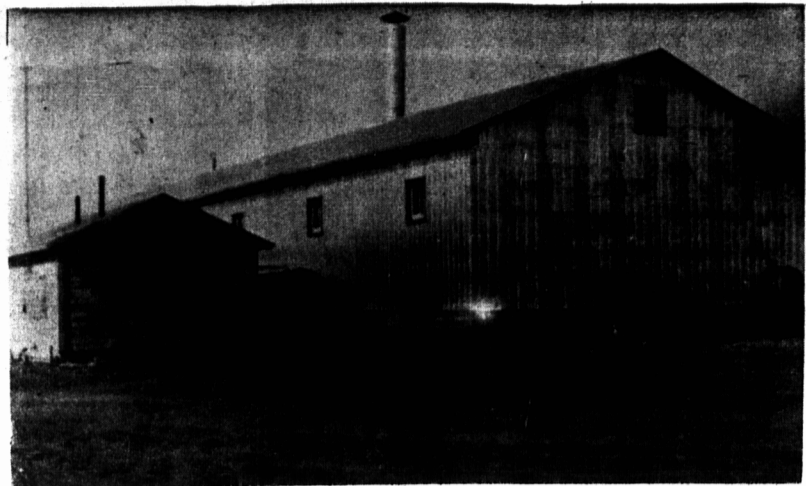

W. I. Convention At Burton Opposes Daylight Time

The annual district convention of the Women's Institute for Burton and vicinity was held in St. Mark's Hall, Burton, Oct. 7, on Tuesday, May 31, with Burton institute entertaining.

Mrs. Peter Dalton presided. Mrs. Melvin MacGregor acted as secretary. The meeting opened with the Ode, followed by the Mary Stewart Collect in unison. On behalf of Burton Institute, Mrs. Wilfred Dalton, extended a cordial welcome to those present. Mrs. Norbert Corcoran of Plusville made fitting reply. Roll call was answered by forty-eight institute members.

Following the reading of the minutes of the previous convention new business was as follows: Plusville as entertaining district for next convention; silver collection to be donated to the O'Leary Hospital Fund; a scholarship fund, sponsored by the District Convention for girls desiring to enter the nursing profession (a meeting to be held at a later date); Mrs. Manning gave an interesting talk on project work.

Reports from all Institutes showed good work accomplished during the year. Mrs. Lloyd Wilkie, convener of health and welfare gave a very interesting talk on Polio.

Mrs. Fred Ramsay, Montrose, gave a most interesting talk on her native country, the Netherlands, and showed a hand-made wooden shoe from Holland. A singing led by Mrs. Manning with Mrs. Harold Howard as pianist was very much enjoyed by all present.

Miss Doris Anderson of the Vocational School, Charlottetown, gave a very interesting talk on Home Economics. A reading by Ebbesfleete Institute was enjoyed. An interesting contest conducted by Bloomfield Corner was enjoyed.

Mrs. Manning then gave a demonstration of Re-model. Re-make and Re-nants of children's clothes.

The resolution report was read by Mrs. Edward MacAusland.

A resolution concerning Daylight Saving Time favoured its abolishment.

A second resolution, where as our young men of the community are desirous of establishing farm homes for themselves and are financially unable to do so. Whereas immigrants are assisted financially by the Government in establishing farm homes for themselves and be at least placed on a par in importance with the immigrants.

Resolution number three, where as the Matheson Government has been returned to power and as one of the promises was increased Rural Electrification.

Be it therefore resolved that the Government be urged to extend Rural Electrification to our districts as soon as possible.

Resolution number four, where as Western Prince County is definitely not in favour of the present train schedule.

Therefore be it resolved that this new system be discontinued another year.

Mrs. Doric Gallant, read the courtesy resolutions thanking institutes; to Rev. J. N. Trainor for so generously providing the use of the hall for the convention; and to the supervisor, Mrs. Manning, the guest speakers. Summer School At Mt. Allison

SACKVILLE, N. B. — New features and a broadened curriculum will be keynotes of the four summer schools being planned for Mount Allison University in Sackville during July and August. The four are the Mount Allison Summer Institute, Church Music Workshop, United Nations Summer School for Boys and Girls, and the 32nd annual Maritime Summer School.

A summer Institute, intended for all interested in public affairs, and featuring distinguished representatives from the High Commissioners' office in Ottawa, and from the Department of External Affairs, will be held at the University from August 11-13.

The Institute, under the direction of Dr. D. D. G. Kerr, will have as chief speaker Edgar McInnis, a native of Prince Edward Island, and President of the Canadian Institute of International Affairs. A former member of the History Department of the University of Toronto, Mr. McInnis is also a distinguished poet and author, having twice received the Governor-General's awards for his writings.

The Institute will study "The Commonwealth Today," discussing both the nature and the problems of the Commonwealth itself, and the role of Canada as a Commonwealth member.

Mount Allison University is again offering a Church Music Workshop as part of the 1955 Summer School Programme. In addition to the regular one week course, from July 25th to 30th, in the basic techniques and historical background of music in worship, the Workshop will offer this year, as part of the regular Maritime Summer School, a special course in Organ Playing and Elementary Musical Theory, to be held July 4th to August 13th, under the supervision of Professor G. D. Poyzant.

Professor P. A. Lockwood has announced the registration for the United Nations Summer School for Boys and Girls of the Atlantic Provinces is excellent, and will continue until the end of June. The popular five-day session, to be held from July 5th - 9th, was first introduced last summer, and a full registration of one hundred boys and girls is expected again this year. Among the special speakers will be A. R. Lusby, M. P. for Cumberland County, Nova Scotia, and a former member of the Canadian delegation to the United Nations, and A.E. Ritchie, of the Canadian Department of External Affairs. They will address the students on various aspects of the United Nations Organization.

The regular Maritime Summer School will be held at Mount Allison from July 4th to August 13th. Preliminary investigations by Dr. Kerr indicate that registration for the thirty-second session of the school will be good. This summer new degree-credit courses in psychology and French will be offered as part of the expanded curriculum. The school is particularly directed towards those hoping to qualify for a teaching license, and to others unable to attend university during the winter months.

In Memoriam
