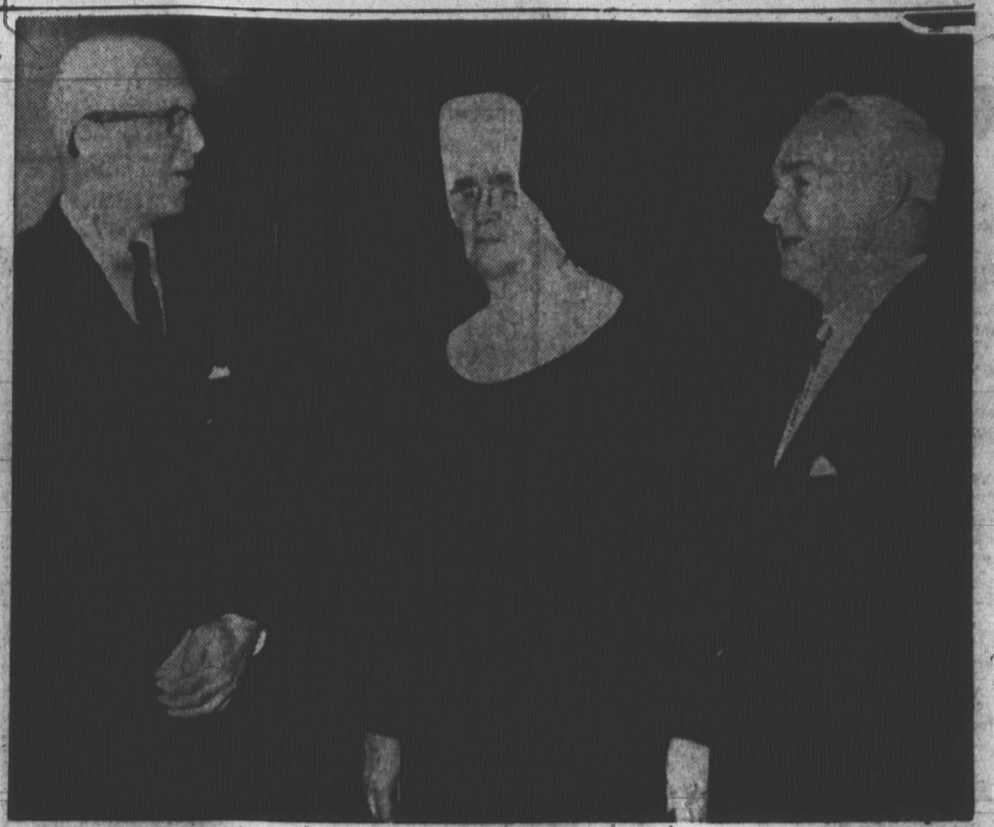

## Civic Election Yesterday Produced No New Faces

SUMMERSIDE—There will be no new faces on the town council following the civic election here yesterday. The only change will be the absence of Eric Johnston, who resigned his West Ward seat to contest the mayoralty in opposition to George Key Jr., and who says he will not return to civic politics after his defeat yesterday.

All incumbents were returned, with Key, Grant Mollison in the East Ward, and Milton Mellish in the Center Ward all winning by comfortable margins.

The closest contest came in the west ward where Mrs. Frances Perry was returned to office by 54 votes. A by-election will have to be called to fill the seat left vacant by Mr. Johnston, and unless he changes his mind about running, there are no candidates for the office in immediate view.

Mayor Key was returned to office with a thumping 966 vote margin and the majority of votes in all three wards. The margin of Key's victory was perhaps the major surprise of the day. He led 514-411 in the West Ward, 485-85 in the Center Ward, and 650-167 in the East Ward.

**SOLID TROUNCING**  
In the East Ward Councillor Grant Mollison was returned with a 628 vote margin, solidly trouncing Halzey Gunning, 722 votes to 94. In the Center Ward Mellish's margin over Gordon Rogers was 120 votes, with the totals being 349-229. Councillor Perry won over Norman Gallant

491-487. Gallant's showing was impressive, losing by only 54 votes out of a total of 928, but he scotched speculation about his future political activity by noting he does not expect to run for civic office again.

Councillor Grant Mollison probably summed up the winners' feelings with his comment that he was "jubilant and humble" at the election results.

Mayor Key remarked, "I can have no other feeling than that of humility" at being returned to office, and expressed his thanks to Mr. Johnston for his public service in entering himself for the mayoralty campaign.

Councillors Mellish and Perry both mentioned the worthiness of their opponents and praised their opponents' campaigns.

**END OF ROAD**  
In conceding defeat and congratulating Mayor Key, Mr. Johnston said "it's the end of the road for me as far as poli-

tics are concerned. I said before the election I would retire from town politics if I lost." He noted that he wanted to devote more time to his business, and expressed his thanks to all his supporters.

The defeated candidates for council seats, Halzey Gunning, Gordon Rogers and Norman Gallant each congratulated his successful opponent. "I could wish for no finer opponent than Mr. Mellish," said Rogers. "There is no one I would sooner be beaten by," Mr. Gallant thanked all his supporters, stated he enjoyed the campaign very much, and that he was very pleased with the results.

There were 2,389 votes cast yesterday, which is 64.3 percent of the 3,713 eligible voters. The Center Ward had the highest percentages of votes cast with 68.7 percent, followed by the West Ward with 67.2 and trailed far back by the east ward with 59 percent.

## Skies Clear, Mercury Dips

Charlottetown's skies were clear at midnight last night, the temperature was four degrees below zero and the wind was west at 10 miles per hour, reported a spokesman at the City Radio range.

The lowest temperature recorded yesterday was 15 degrees below zero at 2.30 a.m. The highest wind was north at 18 miles per hour late in the afternoon.

The barometer reading was 30.29 and steady.

The conservatives jumped on expropriation of Quebec village property and promised to hold up defence spending in the Commons.

They protested vehemently an extension of an army camp range into the village of Shannon during study of 1965-66 defence estimates.

Opposition Leader Diefenbaker also blistered the government on its nuclear policy. He suggested Defense Minister Healey was under pressure from the U.S. when he changed his policy in 1963 on nuclear weapons.

Mr. Healey denied having talks with the U.S. ambassador on the matter.

Prime Minister Pearson announced a appointment of Hughes Lapointe as Quebec lieutenant-governor.

The Canadian Federation of Agriculture presented a brief to the cabinet on farm problems.

It asked that the government nationalize the CFR and guarantee dairymen \$4 a hundredweight for milk.

## Mercury Dip Not Record

The 19th, 20th, and 21st of this month when the temperature dipped to 15 below have been the coldest for the month of Feb. since 1951 when the mercury went down to 19 degrees below zero.

However, in 1914, 1922 and 1932 it went down to 21 below and in Feb. of 1948 a low of 16 below was recorded.

The total precipitation so far this month is reported to be 1.86 inches. The lowest precipitation recorded for the month of February is 1.97 inches in 1948.

Although the majority of people dread the thought of such cold weather it is making more work for others. One towing company in town reports that it has had five times as much work since the cold weather set in the latter part of last week.

The trucks are going steadily and low an average of 40 to 50 motorists every morning.

Work for the oil companies is also booming. One reported a 50 per cent increase in stove oil sale, with the drivers working late into the night bringing warmth and comfort to many city homes.

Another company which normally uses only one truck to deliver furnace oil was forced to put another truck into operation to supply the increasing number of requests.

## Book Research Planned Here

Solange Chaput Rolland will be in Charlottetown doing research for a book that she is writing on bi-cultural relations. She will be here Feb. 29th and March 1st. The working title of her book is "My Country, Canada or Quebec".

Born at Montreal she was educated at Convent Outremont then at La Sorbonne in Paris for one year. In 1943 she published a number of short stories in different magazines. She is a book reviewer, and for three years has won the Gold Medal of French CBC for best literary pages of the newspaper for which she was then writing.

Mrs. Rolland has had many shows on English and French TV. She has also appeared as a panelist, commentator, book reviewer, lecturer, journalist and writer.

In 1955 she edited and published a political newspaper at the head of a so called quiet revolution. After seven years and a circulation of 5,000 the paper ceased publication.

**WROTE LIBRETTO**  
She has written a libretto of a ballet called "Short Circuit" which played on French TV at the Music Hall.

As a result of many trips and lectures throughout Canada she joined with Gwethalyn Graham to produce a book entitled, "Dear Enemies". The book is still on the best seller list.

Last year she was named to the Art Council of the province of Quebec and on the permanent commission of culture.

She is married to Andre Rolland of Lolland Paper Company. They have two children and two grandchildren.

Her visit to P.E.I. will be part of a Canada-wide tour she is making on a Centennial grant to write her book.

## Guest Speaker Discusses Diabetes Effect On Eyes

The largest meeting ever held here of the Prince Edward Island Diabetic Association, was the comment of veteran members who last night heard Dr. J.W. Moreside of Charlottetown discuss the effects which this disease can have on the eyes.

Mother Frances Loyola of Charlottetown is the new president of the organization. The past president of the organization, S. G. Ives of Charlottetown presided. The large crowd taxed the capacity of the National Film Board theatre and several rows of additional chairs had to be brought in for the occasion.

"Good control of your diabetes is the most effective means of preventing eye damage," said Dr. Moreside who urged people afflicted to be particularly sure to have their diabetes as well controlled as is possible when they are having their eyes tested.

The condition of the eyes really tell a great deal about a diabetic patient; perhaps 50 or more cases of diabetes have been found here in recent years by examination of their eyes in persons who had not known previously they had the disease, Dr. Moreside said.

Examination of the eyes often reveals a similar condition in the kidneys. Kidneys cannot be examined directly but the knowledge gained by a study of the eyes, often reveals helpful information that may apply to the kidneys, Dr. Moreside observed.

**GREATER INCIDENCE**  
Diabetics often have a greater incidence of certain diseases than do other people. Glaucoma, for example, is present in two percent of the general population. It's present in four to six percent of diabetics it was explained.

More than 90 per cent of Glaucoma can be controlled medically; most of the rest can be controlled by surgery, it was explained.

The guest speaker was introduced by Charles Praught, Charlottetown who is honorary president of the association. He was thanked by H.B. Armstrong, a member of the new executive.

The possibility of organizing other branches of the diabetic association in other parts of the province was suggested by Mr. Ives who was warmly praised for the effective work he and his executive had done during the past year. Summerside was suggested by several members as a likely spot for a branch, and it is possible that new members may be added to the executive from various sections of the province. Miss Thompson was named last night from Summerside.

Mrs. S. G. Ives acted as secretary of the meeting in the absence of Mrs. Helen Dunbar who was unable to attend because of illness.
