**Mr. And Mrs. Sandow Return To Resume Duties At Local Golf Course**

A sun-burned, happy couple, Mr. and Mrs. Marc Sandow, arrived in this City yesterday afternoon where they will resume their Club Professional duties at the Belvedere course of the Charlottetown Golf Club, after spending the past five months or more at Ciudad Trujillo of the Republic of the Dominican (Dominique Republic), West Indies.

"We are definitely pleased and happy to be back on P. E. I.," said the Sandows, "and the wonderful welcome we received from members of the Charlottetown Club on our arrival here today makes us feel right at home again. That fresh, salt air is really good too, after the heat of the West Indies."

Mr. and Mrs. Sandow, who came here last year to take over the professional duties at the local club, held the same post during the winter months at the Santo Domingo Country Club at Ciudad Trujillo.

"It was a wonderful experience and we enjoyed it," said Mrs. Sandow, "but we had enough of it and are glad to be back again."

The Sandows also said that the warm welcome they also received from Mr. and Mrs. Bert Cameron, where they resided during their stay here last year and will again this summer, "made it a real, welcome homecoming."

**Recount Experiences**

Spending a pleasant part of last evening with the Sandows, they recounted many of their experiences and impressions of the Dominican Republic. Mr. Sandow said that he was the first professional golfer to be on the staff of the Santo Domingo Country Club, which has a membership of over 500, and the individual club fee is \$120 a month, while Mrs. Sandow, who managed the affairs of the clubhouse which she described as "magnificent and immense" had a staff of 37 under her command and all colored, but they were really fine people to work with once they understood you."

Mr. Sandow described the course as one "not good by our standards, with all the greens being of sand that made golfing difficult, and that the layout was in need of organization and planning." He said that while there he did much to re-plan their course and even sent to England for special tropical grass seed to develop proper greens for the course.

Mr. Sandow said that he also spent much of his time instructing in golf at many privately owned courses in connection with the sugar plantations on the Island,

and there were about six that he made regular tours of instruction to. He said that some would only have maybe six or seven members.

The Sandows said "we had to learn to speak Spanish, but we didn't find it too difficult as we both speak French fluently."

Although they made the trip to the West Indies by air last fall they made the return trip to this Province by car, and took them three weeks to make the trip. They made the first part of their journey by boat from Trujillo to Miami, Florida which took five days. They motored the rest of the way, via Palm Beach, Orlando and Atlanta. Mrs. Sandow did all the driving and said "I averaged about 400 miles a day but did as much as 650 on one occasion."

While in Orlando, the Sandows visited a boy whom they entertained while he served with the American Army in England, and said that they had received a royal welcome from his family when they arrived there. Like many other hospitable Old Country people did during the war, Mrs. Sandow referred to him as "our adopted son."

**Match With Sam Snead**

During their trip through the States Mr. Sandow had the pleasure of a friendly match with the famous Sam Snead at his own Greenbrier Golf and Tennis Club at White Sulphur Springs, Virginia, and exhibited his score card that showed Snead's initiated score of 69 and his own of 72. Prior to that at Atlanta, Mr. Sandow also played over the East Lake Country Club course, where Bobby Jones first started his golfing career, and the Druid Hill Golf Club also at Atlanta.

Mr. Sandow made one particular observation while travelling through the States. He said "that P. E. I. and Charlottetown in particular, should advertise more. You have a beautiful spot here for tourists, but people seem to know so little about it."

The Sandows also mentioned a peculiar thing that they noticed in the Dominican Republic. "They are great people for parties," they said "and will use any excuse to have one. For that reason we used to have a lot of birthday parties at the Club, a lot of the time for the youngsters and cadets. But this is the funny part. They practically don't speak English at all, but when they congratulate the honored guest of the occasion, they all sing 'Happy Birthday to you' in English."

The showings put on by Cobey McCloskey and Harry Poulton, two of the Islands leading mit sengers, in a boxing card at Saint John, on Monday night augurs well for the forthcoming scraps to be staged here by Forum manager Bill Brown early in June. The two local boxers will be the principals against mainland opponents in the main and semi-final clashes here on that date.

Both boys took decisions at Saint John on Monday over tough opponents. Cobey, present holder of the Maritime middleweight title and Island heavyweight crown, garnered a close decision over Marc Begin, a clever middleweight hailing from Montreal, in a 10-round battle. Poulton, P. E. I.'s welterweight title holder, took an eight-round decision from Howard Leslie of Saint John in what was described as a "bristling semi-final."

Talking with Manager Brown yesterday, Bill was more than pleased with the outcome of the scraps at Saint John, and said that if it was at all possible, he would like to re-match the four scrappers later this summer. Apparently both boys were crowd-pleasers at Saint John, and he felt that re-matches would go over well here—but at the moment he is primarily concerned with finishing off the details for the June bouts.

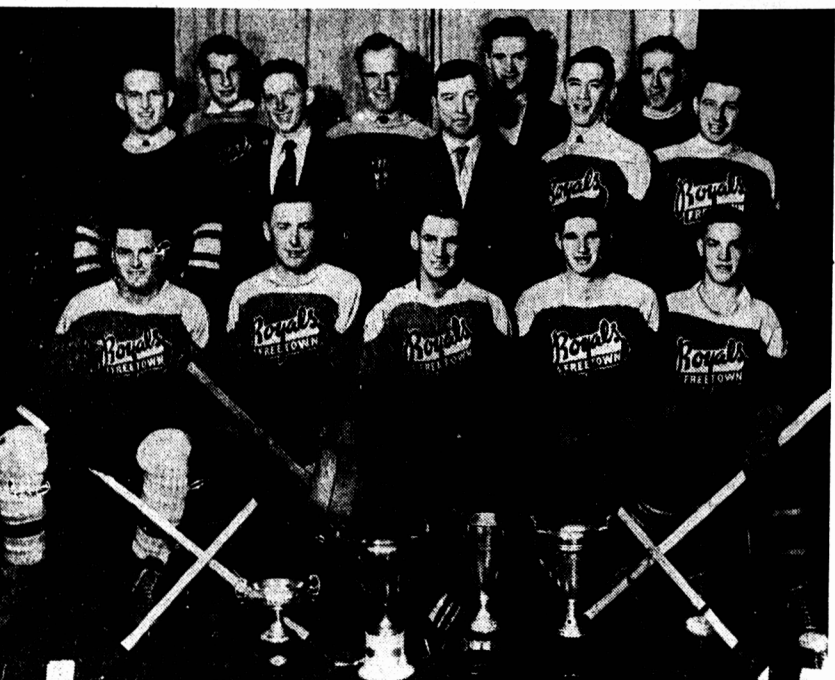
McCloskey will meet Yvon Durelle of Bale Ste. Anne, N. B., the opponent he took his Maritime middle title from last January by a split decision but it will be a non-title scrap of 10-rounds, as both boys won't expect to be able to cut down their weight to meet the 160-pound limit. Cobey weighed-in at 170 for his Saint John scrap. Poulton's opponent on June 5th will be Harold Schultz of Dartmouth, N. S. **"Flash" Gordon Shines As Manager Of Ball Club**

 SACRAMENTO, Calif., May 15 — (AP) — Joe (Flash) Gordon is threatening to out-sizzle the California sun with his feats as manager and second baseman of Sacramento's Pacific Coast League Solons.

The erstwhile New York Yankee and Cleveland baseballer, working his first season as a skipper, has sparked his club to just one game out of first place with his managerial acumen and blistering bat.

The Solons, after a rain-soaked spring training and a bad first week, caught Gordon's contagious hustle to win 25 of the next 39 games and become the hottest club in the league.

The 36-year-old flasher is hitting a hot .373. After seven weeks, he leads the league in home runs, with 18 and in runs batted in, 47. And he's played in all but one of his team's 46 games.

His bosses, the press box fraternity and baseball fanbase generally are loud and unanimous in their acclaim.

"That boy may go on to become one of the really great managers in baseball," said Sacramento president, Eddie Mulligan. "He's a born leader and his baseball is both sound and brilliant."

"Joe Gordon may be the greatest baseball player in Sacramento history," one Sacramento scribe said.

"The performance of Joe Gordon . . . has brought a new standard of play into the league," wrote another.

"Pacific Coast League's rookie of the year is probably Joe Gordon," a Los Angeles columnist wrote.

And a San Francisco writer observed: "Joe Gordon has introduced a new method of managing a ball club — he simply waits until a couple of his hirelings get on base, then he whacks a home run."

Charlie Graham Jr., vice-president of the Solons and a close observer of Gordon in action, labels him Sydney did."

According to Phil Vitale's letter, he has been having a busy time. **Ted Williams Hits His 300th Home Run**

**BOSTON, May 15 — (AP) —** Boston Red Sox slugger Ted Williams poled the 300th home run of his major-league career in the fourth inning of today's game against Chicago White Sox.

Williams is the 10th player to reach the famed 300-home run total, the third among still-active players. The other two active players were Joe DiMaggio and Johnny Mize, both of New York Yankees.

**Brooklyn Dodgers Open Tour With 8-4 Victory Over The Chicago Cubs**

 The front-running Brooklyn Dodgers opened their first tour of the west in brilliant style Tuesday, pounding out four home runs to sink Chicago Cubs 8-4.

Duke Snider's grand slam homer in the seventh inning of the National League game was the key blow in the Dodger attack. Gil Hodges, the major's home run leader, banged out his 10th and 11th homers and Jackie Robinson clouted his fifth.

The Dodgers, trailing 4-3, loaded the bases in the seventh inning with none out on two walks and a single. Snider, who struck out on his first three trips to the plate, followed with a blast over the right field wall to wrap up the decision. Hodges completed the rally with his second home run of the day.

Big Don Newcombe started for Brooklyn and held the Cubs to one hit until the fifth, when they chased him with a four-run rally. Wayne Terwilliger singled home two runs and Frank Baumholtz tripled the other two across.

Clyde King, who took over from Newcombe in the fifth, was the winner, although Ralph Branca finished up. Cal McLish, former Dodger, was the loser.

Chicago White Sox edged Boston Red Sox 9-7 in 11 innings. Nelson Fox banged a two-run homer, the first homer of his major league career, to win the game.

Ed Robinson poled a three-run homer for Chicago in the first inning and Ted Williams hit his seventh for Boston with the bases empty in the fourth. Williams' clout was the 300th of his major league career. Only other active players who have 300 or more homers are Johnny Mize (341) and Joe DiMaggio (351) of New York Yankees.

Chicago manager Paul Richards pulled an odd move in the Boston ninth in this American League game. With Williams due to lead off, Richards called in lefty Bill Pierce to pitch to Williams and shunted righthander Harry Dorish to third base. Pierce got Williams to pop up and turned the mound chores back to Dorish, who went on to gain his first victory. Ray Scarborough, fourth Red Sox pitcher, was the loser.

Detroit mauled four Washington pitchers for 14 hits and climbed into a second-place American League tie with Chicago as they registered a 12-4 victory behind Hal Newhouse's nine-hit pitching.

Vic Wertz and Pat Mullin led the Tigers' assault with three hits each, while Steve Souchock slamed an eighth-inning homer off Joe Haynes after Wertz walked.

The defeat was the first suffered by Washington's trio of Cuban pitchers, who had won eight altogether, and dropped the Senators to fourth place. Detroit is tied with Chicago for second.

St. Louis Browns won a free-swinging 11-8 battle over Philadelphia Athletics as the two teams rapped out three homers, three triples and the same number of doubles.

Gus Zernial hit two round trippers for the A's and Don Lenhardt one for the Browns. The Athletics also lost catcher Joe Tipton for several days when he was hit on the head by a swinging bat.

George Strickland was the big gun as Pittsburgh Pirates punched out a 7-3 National League victory over New York Giant before a crowd of 25,838 at Forbes Field. Strickland hammered out two homers and a single and drove in five runs.

Bill Werle, getting his first chance to start when other probable pitchers reported sore arms gave up only two hits in his first five scoreless innings. The Giants slapped him for five hits, including Bobby Thomson's homer and Rafael Noble's double. Werle yielded to Vern Law, who gave up only two hits in the last three innings. It was Werle's second victory against the Losers.
