

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

EUROPEAN.

LONDON, Oct. 29.

The rumor that Col. Clarke has had a fight with the native insurgents at Natal, has been confirmed by the gratifying intelligence that the forces under his command had won a decided victory after a contest of two hours. After considerable skirmishing, during which both flanks of Colonel Clarke's command were threatened, a desperate charge was made, when the Provincial troops carried everything before them. The rebels have been everywhere repulsed, until the single exception of the recent disaster to the yeomanry, and Mafeking has been relieved, with but slight loss to the Provincial forces. The Basutos, on the other hand, admit a loss of three hundred men and many more wounded. Additional details have been received from Cape Town of the recent uprising of the tribes which have joined the Basutos in the rebellion. These tribes of rebels, while professing loyalty, surrounded the Europeans and murdered them. The magistrates who were captured by them were submitted to special tortures before being killed, the natives, meanwhile, executing a war dance. The horrors of the massacre have only found partial relief in the public mind by the great and unexpected news of Col. Clarke's victory. The authorities have at length determined to send some more troops to Natal at the earnest solicitation of the Colonial authorities, with the instructions that in the event of affairs assuming a more peaceful attitude by the time they reach there, they are to proceed thence to India with all dispatch.

NEW YORK, Oct. 29.

A Dublin despatch says: Only six names of Land Leaguers remain to be prosecuted, as all the minor officers of the League have been struck off. It is expected that six will be arrested to-day (Friday), including Parnell, Dillon and Brennan.

DUBLIN, Oct. 29.

A. M. Sullivan, member of Parliament, will be one of the counsel for the defence of the agitators.

It is understood that Parnell, Dillon and O'Kelly will attend a land meeting at Tipperary on Sunday afternoon, and will proceed to Limerick, where Parnell will speak at a land meeting on Monday and will be presented with the freedom of the city on Tuesday.

The Government have engaged all the leading legal talent in order to prevent the League securing their services. It is expected all who may be arrested will be bailed.

NEW YORK, Oct. 29.

Cablegrams state that a great storm swept the English, Irish and Scotch coasts, doing great damages to shipping, houses, roads, etc. The packets between Southampton and France were prevented from clearing in consequence of the high sea. Two ships are on the Redcar rocks. A steamer drifted from her moorings at Eaton and drove through Stag Well on to the sand bar at Berwick. Several ships in the harbor broke from their moorings and sustained damage.

At Kilderminster, many portions of the town were inundated and factories were stopped.

On the Yorkshire coast the storm raged over Whitby. The flood swept down a railroad bridge, and caused great damage. Six vessels were driven ashore. The captain of one and eight men were drowned.

Five vessels were driven ashore at Scarborough, and three near Hartlepool; the crews were saved.

At Leatham one vessel drifted on the beach. The crew clung to the rigging; one man was drowned.

There were heavy floods at Monmouthshire, Oxfordshire and Leeds. At the latter place the mills stopped work.

While trying to enter South Shields harbor the Danish schooner Johanna foundered. All on board, except the mate, were drowned. Five other vessels are reported ashore in that neighborhood.

LONDON, Oct. 29.

A despatch from Copenhagen says that 100 vessels of different sizes were destroyed by the late recent storm.

LONDON, Oct. 29.

A despatch from Admiral Seymour asks for more vessels to be sent to him immediately. He also states that his confidants, the Admirals of the other representatives, are working more harmoniously than at any time since the arrangement.

UNITED STATES.

MARYSVILLE, Mo., Oct. 29.

Albert Talbot, his brother Edward, his mother and Henry Wythe, a hired man, are held to trial for the murder of Dr. Talbot, father of Albert and Edward, at Marysville on the 18th of September.

BOSTON, Oct. 29.

Neal Dow denies the report that he has declared for Garfield.

MATTEWAN, N. Y., Oct. 29.

John Hadley, and Albert Bray, working in the Sayreville clay pits, were buried alive by the caving in of an embankment of the pit to-day.

NEW YORK, Oct. 29.

Urnal Ford, a member of the National Greenback Executive Committee, has issued an address dated at Auburn, advising members of the party to cast votes for Hancock and English, in order, he says, to turn the scale against the authors of our present political misfortunes.

DEADWOOD, D. T., Oct. 29.

Deputy Sheriff George Heber, was shot and killed by Sylvester Meritt at Sturgis City on Tuesday evening. Heber was the aggressive party and the killing was in self-defence.

CHATANOOGA, Tenn., Oct. 29.

The boiler of Jasper Smith's steam mill at Warrenton, Ala., exploded on Wednesday, killing a boy and a man, and seriously injuring several others, one man having his right foot torn off completely. The mills and engine were blown completely to pieces. No cause for the explosion is assigned.

On last Monday, in the same County, Pink Walker and James Sneed were shot by a miner named Collier. Walker was shot in the neck fatally by a stray shot and Sneed's right arm was shot off. Collier is at large.

ELMIRA, N. Y., Oct. 29.

Gen. Grant reviewed a boys-in-blue procession here to-night two miles in length. There was a crowd of 20,000 people on the street. After the parade Gen. Grant took the regular night express for New York.
