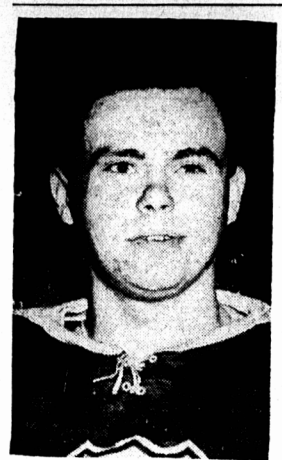


# St. Mary's Come From Behind For 7-5 Win Over Moncton Hawks

HALIFAX, Jan. 24 — (CP) — Soundly outplayed for two periods, Halifax St. Mary's found the combination midway through the third, rifled home five goals and defeated Moncton Hawks 7-5 to jump into third place in the Maritime Major Hockey League here tonight. The Saints' win, coupled with Glace Bay's loss to Charlottetown Islanders, boosted the locals into sole possession of the third slot.

Hawks, playing a more open, fast skating game than on previous appearances, held a 5-2 bulge when the second ended. But whatever happened during the intermission did the trick. For nearly 10 minutes, Saints hammered futilely at the Moncton end, barked time after time by an outstanding performance by Don Lockhart. Then Frank Bergeron's long screened shot went home and Saints kept their finger on the trigger until four more tallies had zipped into the Moncton cage.

Coach Johnny Horeck pulled his goalie with a little more than two minutes left but though they were short, Saints held off the hard-pushing Hawks and shot an insurance goal into the empty net.

Fast-skating Morey Hamilton, Hawks' most effective player, tallied three times for the New Brunswick club. Hamilton was in the Saints' hair all night and was ably supported by George Scholes, Danny Horeck and Lorne Pirie. Stan Milne and Laurie May were the best of the Hawks rearguards.

Danny Nixon again turned in a starchy performance. Nixon scored the winning goal as set up Dewey Thompson for the deadlocking marker. The latter shared honors with Nixon, connecting with the cash register twice and assisting on the winning marker. Kenny McKenzie turned in one of his better games, setting up Hughie Campbell for a pair and picking up assists on the winning goal and Thompson's clincher.

LONDON, Jan. 24 — (AP) — A London newspaper today told Bob Hope and Bing Crosby to stay away from the 1952 British amateur golf championship.

And it looked as if Hope had gotten caught in the middle of one of his own golf gags.

Crosby played in the 1950 British amateur at St. Andrews, Scotland. Hope played in the 1951 tournament at Portcaw, Wales. Both were beaten in the first round.

The London News Chronicle wondered if either man were coming again. It asked them by cable today it printed this reply from Hope:

"Certainly I hope I can work out my schedule so I can again be a big threat in British amateur, sloop. Bing is coming too if he can get enough adrenalin. Best regards."

The News Chronicle played it fairly straight. But its allied evening paper, the Star, bluntly said no thanks.

"However much cinema fans may rejoice, golfers will feel only dismay at the probability of Bing Crosby and Bob Hope both playing in our amateur," said the Star in its gossip column, Star Man's Diary.

The column said:

"Bing came to St. Andrews in 1950 and was welcomed. Bob came to Portcaw last year and was welcomed. Let us be spared the two of them together on one golf course."

In Hollywood, Hope blamed his poor British golfing on a week-end in Paris.

"Next time I play in that tournament, I won't go to Paris first," he told a reporter. "I was playing with the small British ball and a big head."

Turning serious, Hope said he and Crosby have played many charity exhibition tournaments together in this country and added: "I guess we're used to people expecting us to clown a little."

Hope is rated a four handicap golfer.

The Glace Bay Miners, stated to be the biggest drawing card at the Halifax Forum, have established themselves as contenders with the Saint John Beavers for drawing patronage at the Charlottetown Forum. ## Expansion Of N.H.L. Hot Issue

DETROIT, Jan. 24 — (AP) — Expansion of the National Hockey League from six to eight teams is a hot issue now in any time in years, Paul Chandler of the Detroit News said today.

"Specifically there's great heat now to have Cleveland voted into membership. After that, Buffalo is under consideration," wrote Chandler in his column.

"There is one basic reason why such a suggestion may be taken more seriously than it has in the past," he wrote.

"The N.H.L. is giving serious consideration to a plea by Boston and New York that all teams share the receipts at home and away as baseball clubs do. At present the home team keeps the whole purse."

If enacted, the share-alike doctrine would ease the way for Cleveland and Buffalo's entry, Chandler said.

"It would answer the old objection that neither of those cities had a rink large enough to support big league hockey, with a 'minimum limit' always having been set at 12,000 seats."

## Islanders Score 3-1 Victory Over Miners In Sparkling Game

The re-spirited Charlottetown Islanders, playing their hearts out to preserve their hold on second place, defeated the Glace Bay Miners 3-1 at the Forum last night in a titanic hockey struggle between two great and fairly evenly-matched teams.

From the opening whistle until the final siren the free wheeling forwards and defences of both squads raced from end to end, fought tooth and nail in one of the finest hockey exhibitions witnessed here for a long time.

Flashing brilliant bursts of speed, accurate passing, smart defensive blocking and stellar net-minding at the both ends the players brought the fans to their feet time after time with their breezing attempts to score.

For nearly two periods of sizzling hockey the teams played without a goal being scored. Finally at 16:48 of the middle session hardworking Walt Pawlyshyn slipped the disc by a prostrate Bob Arneil and the fans responded with a terrific volume of applause.

The pace slackened off slightly for the rest of the period but the boys returned to their fast tempo at the beginning of the final session. Again they fought on even terms until nearly the ten minute mark when "Bucko" Trainer, the best man on the ice, scored what proved to be the winning goal on a sharp slap shot.
