MRS. WINNIFRED MACCORMACK

The vicinity of Selkirk was saddened on Friday March 4 when it became known that one of its oldest and most respected ladies, Mrs. Winnifred MacCormack had passed to her Eternal reward at the age of eighty-four.

Mrs. MacCormack was born at Monticello, the eldest daughter of Allan Hanning and Mary Macdonald. When very young she was bereft of her mother, and the sole responsibility of caring for the home and instructing her younger brothers and sisters were assigned to her.

In later years she went to the United States, living in Boston and Oklahoma where she made a host of friends and acquaintances.

Returning to her native province she married the late Archibald MacCormack and settled on a farm in Selkirk, where by her hard work and ingenuity together with her husband built up a fine home. In that home she was a model wife and mother. Always endowed with kindness she shared hospitality with everyone who came the way.

Possessed of a good christian spirit she was fervent in her religion and charity was a virtue she loved to practise. Some years ago her husband passed away and three years ago her only son Allan was killed in an accident. Despite these sorrows, she was reconciled to God's will and bore her tribulations patiently. During her illness she was tenderly cared for by her adopted daughter, Mrs. Kenney who together with her husband and children did everything possible to comfort her declining years.

Her funeral, which was largely attended, took place March 7, to St. Margaret's Church where Requiem High Mass was sung by her pastor, Rev. Father Macdonald, who also performed the obsequies at the grave. Then all that remained of a benevolent woman was laid to rest beside her husband and son. The pallbearers were: R. D. MacKinnon, Hugh C. MacPhee, Joseph D. Macdonald, D. J. MacInnis, Hugh J. V. Macdonald and Pius MacKinnon.

FOUND DEAD - The body of Gordon A. MacDougald, 41-year-old Bangor farmer was found Wednesday night in a shack in which he had been in the habit of staying while cutting pulp wood. It was reported that he had left home about 8:00 o'clock on Tuesday morning to go to the shack about two miles from his home. A dog which accompanied him, returned to the dwelling on the same evening without his master. The late Mr. MacDougald was a veteran of the R.C.A.F. quite often stayed overnight at the shack and it was not until the evening of the following day that a twelve year old son, accompanied by a neighbor began a search for the missing man. He was found in the shack with a gunshot wound through his chest. Dr. Burden, as coroner, decided that an inquest was unnecessary. Besides his widow and an aged mother he is survived by six children the oldest of which is 13.

Mr. Meivin J. McQuaid and Mr. John E. MacLean were nominated yesterday at a Progressive Conservative Party convention at Souris to contest the first district of Kings at the forthcoming provincial election.

Both men have been in politics previously, Mr. McQuaid having served as a member of the legislature.

Mr. McQuaid's nomination as councillor was moved by Mr. Harry Burke of Fortune and seconded by Mr. Henry Mallard of Gowen Brae.

Mr. MacLean's nomination as assemblyman was moved by Mr. Daniel Murphy of Elmira and seconded by Mr. Gideon Coffin of Fortune. There were no other names before the convention.

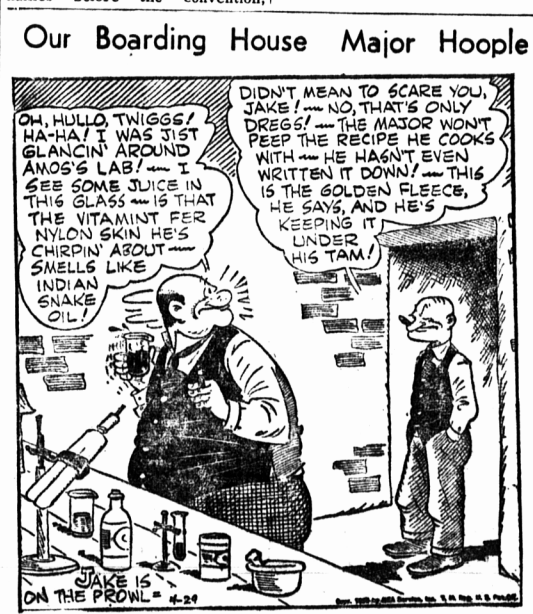
