

Address to Mr. D. C. Chalmers.
FAMILY'S AFTER-NOON Mr. D. C. Chalmers, who for several years past has been agent of the Bank of Nova Scotia in this city, was waited upon at the bank building by a number of leading citizens and presented with an address, of which the following is a copy:

ADDRESS.
To David C. Chalmers, Esquire:
SIR.—We cannot permit the many pleasant years of our business and private relations with you to cease without an intimation of our regret at your departure. How we shall miss you personally, and that valuable help and ready counsel always so cheerfully given, we truly feel at a loss to express.

May we be permitted to say that as the head of one of the leading banking institutions in the Province, we believe that your ability and decision of character have added materially to its commercial prosperity; and that your conscientious adherence to true business principles has as certainly assisted legitimate enterprise, and induced promptness in meeting business engagements.

Unconnected directly with this city otherwise than as a bank manager, yet your active interest in its advancement has ever been evinced by your ready help towards its various enterprises, its social improvements and its charities. Many lists bear your signature with ample evidence of your large-heartedness.

In our home circle—ever a welcome guest—your genial courtesy has won you a warm place. To most of us your departure means the loss of a valued friend. In your future sphere of usefulness we earnestly wish you prosperity and happiness; assured that a due appreciation of those many qualities which we have learned to respect and esteem, will ever follow you through life.

GENTLEMEN,—I thank you heartily for your address. It is very pleasant to hear your words of kindly expressed sympathy at my departure.

Your reference to my six years' work among you as agent of the Bank of Nova Scotia here, though a much longer recognition of it than I feel deserving, coming from gentlemen with most of whom I have had intimate business relations, will always be held by me in grateful remembrance.

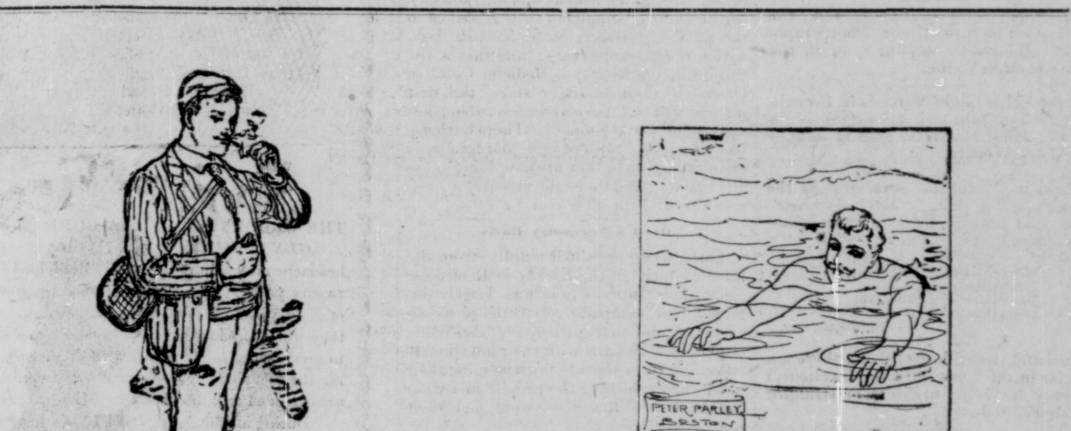
