JUBILEE COMMITTEE MEETING.—A meeting of the Jubilee Committee of the City Council was held last evening. Delegates were in attendance from the various societies, and all promised to do everything in their power to make the celebration a success. Mr. Blanchard, chairman of the School Board, said that the teachers and children would participate in the celebration. It was decided that each society would take precedence in the procession according to the date of its organization in this city, and the representatives were requested to afford such information to the City Clerk as early as possible. Col. Moore was appointed Chief Marshal. Owing to illness His Worship Mayor Dawson was unable to attend the meeting, and Councillor Nicholson presided in his stead. VICTORIAN ORDER OF NURSES.

A meeting for the promotion of the fund for the Victorian Order of Nurses was held this forenoon in the old Legislative Council Chamber. Those present were His Honor Lieutenant Governor Howland, His Worship Mayor Dawson, Councillors Nicholson and Johnson, Hon. David Laird, L. L. Beer, Charles Palmer and W. L. Cotton, Esq's., and Dr's. Richard Johnson, J. T. Jenkins James McLeod, S. R. Jenkins, Peter Conroy, F. D. Beer and James Warburton.

His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor explained the purpose for which the meeting was called, and upon his motion Dr. Johnson was chosen chairman.

The subject matter of Lady Aberdeen's proposition was then discussed by His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor, Mayor Dawson, Mr. Palmer, Mr. Laird, Mr. Beer, and Dr's. Jenkins, McLeod and Conroy.

The following resolution, introduced by Mr. Palmer, was unanimously adopted:

Resolved: That so far as this meeting is informed by the statement issued by Her Excellency Lady Aberdeen of the nature of the movement to establish a Victorian order of nurses to commemorate Her Majesty's Diamond Jubilee, this meeting is of the opinion that inasmuch as the scheme of a new Prince Edward Island Hospital, to be built and supported by voluntary contribution, was in contemplation prior to the promulgation of Her Excellency's prospectus; and inasmuch as it has been decided that this scheme shall be undertaken in commemoration of the Queen's Diamond Jubilee, therefore the object set forth in Her Excellency's statement will, so far as this Province is concerned, be largely, if not fully, accomplished; and in high in hearty sympathy with the movement set on foot by Her Excellency, this meeting does not now deem it advisable to commit itself to any definite action in regard thereto.
