(Continued from page 1) Province this past year, and expected in each of the next four years, was only one-half the sum the present Assembly had unanimously advocated as a minimum fiscal requirement, the member from Souris declared.

Why were the members of the Opposition not pressing for increases in the Ottawa grants as they had in former years, the speaker inquired. As yet nothing was paid the Province in lieu of the northern districts turned over to other Provinces, nor did the Province ever receive anything in the way of compensation for the higher prices of consumer goods produced in Ontario and Quebec markets protected by high tariffs.

During past years the House had listened in full accord to the many arguments for north-land compensation put forth by the then leader of the Opposition, the late Dr. W.J.P. MacMillan, Mr. Acorn recalled.

Decentralization of Canada's major industries, concentrated according to the report of the

British Way To promote economic growth in retarded areas, the UK's Distribution of Industries Act provides for the building of factories for least to private individuals. It also provides for low-cost loans from the British Treasury to undertakings which are un-

able to secure financing through the usual channels. Two similar Bills, one involving \$50 million and the other involving \$300 million are now under consideration by the U.S. Congress, Mr. Acorn said. Severe American impositions on processed goods as opposed to raw duties on raw materials, a direct result of the Ottawa policy of empire-building initiated by Sir John A. MacDonald in 1867, limited the development of processing in the Maritimes, and was still a major factor contributing to the retardation of the economy of this region, the member from Souris asserted.

As an example, fish, raw fillets or blocks are shipped to U.S. plants for processing into fish sticks, which, in many cases find their way back across the border and are offered for sale in Canadian stores. Under federal pressure traditional Maritime trade channels to the south had been diverted to the markets of eastern Canada, thus forcing export and imports to travel long distances over rail lines on which the freight charges were steadily climbing.

In addition consumers in the Atlantic Region were required to pay extra for their needs due to the higher prices prevailing in tariff-protected Ontario and Quebec.

Such agreements would give Maritimers a chance to process their natural resources before exporting them across the U.S. border. So far as the first district of Kings was concerned, he and his colleague, J. Brenton St. John, had planned just where the new roads-to-resources should go, Mr. Acorn declared in answer to a general question asked earlier in the debate by Frank Myers (PCist Queens.).

As urged in the resolution

sponsored by the House committee on transportation during the 1935 session, he and Mr. St. John had picked roads for improvement that in their opinion would be of greatest benefit to the farmers and fishermen of the district, Mr. Acorn asserted. It was disappointing to note that some of the most important of these arteries had been neglected, he said.

RECOMMENDATIONS The Souris member said that the roads recommended for paving by he and Mr. St. John were as follows: East Baltic eight miles; Souris Line Road-10 miles; Souris River Road-six miles; Bear River-Line Road - 10 miles; St. Charles Road-six miles, and the road to Fortune - eight miles. Mr. Myers: "You wanted to pave the whole district." Mr. Acorn: "We should have been able to get 60 miles the same as the district represented by the House leader of the Opposition."

R. R. Bell: "The best district in the Province they deserve it." The member from Souris expressed surprise that the member from Capraud did not press Transport Minister Hees for the Northumberland Causeway rather than the Charlottetown Airport as he (Mr. Myers) had intimated.

Recalling that Mr. Myers and his colleagues had visited Agriculture Minister Harkness a few days previous, and that the minister had immediately announced following his return to Ottawa that the floor price on hogs would come off effective October 1, and the support price on butter would be dropped shortly, Mr. Acorn said he was very anxious concerning the type of advice given the federal minister by Mr. Myers and his fellow PC's.

(Continued from page 1) amount \$25,000 was to Summerside to help in the construction of a new high school. "I can tell the Mayor that when he considers that we give him Prince of Wales College and the Provincial Vocational School, Charlottetown is being well treated by the department of Education."

Of the \$335,000 earmarked for general hospital construction, Premier Matheson informed Dr. Dewar \$140,000 would go to the Western Hospital in Alberton; \$138,000 to the PEI Hospital and \$57,000 to the Charlottetown Hospital.

ROCKY PT. FERRY The Rocky Point Ferry Fairview will most likely be removed from service after pavement has reached the south shore area. Premier Matheson told R. R. Bell who inquired what was to be done with a \$25,000 item for the Fairview.

Mr. Matheson said this was one of the reasons why the pavement had been extended to that part of the country. The government had given consideration to the construction of a new ferry which it was thought would cost \$1 million.

The Premier said it was the intention of the government to continue a ferry for passengers but an automobile ferry would be discarded on this run. Both Mr. Rossiter and Dr. Dewar complained that road markings in their counties were conspicuous by their absence. Speaking on a \$35,000 item for marking highways, Dr. Dewar said that never has he seen a white line on the centre of the western road to his recollection. Mr. Rossiter said there were very few markings in his district. He recalled that they had been placed there once, but a few days later were covered over with gravel.

Bake a batch of crusty Dinner Rolls

● If you bake at home, you'll want to try a batch of crunchy Dinner Rolls. They're so easy to make when you use fast rising dry Best Yeast!

CRUSTY DINNER ROLLS

Measure into a large bowl 1/2 c. lukewarm water; crumble and add 1 cake Best Yeast - or stir in 1 tsp. granulated sugar and sprinkle with 1 envelope Best Dry Yeast. Let stand 10 minutes, THEN stir well. Add 1/2 c. lukewarm water and 1 tsp. salt. Add, all at once, 3 1/2 c. once-sifted all-purpose flour and work in with the hands; work in 3 tb. soft shortening. Knead on lightly-floured board until smooth and elastic. Place in greased bowl. Cover with a damp cloth and set in warm place, free from draft. Let rise until doubled in bulk. Punch down dough in bowl, fold over, cover and again let rise until doubled in bulk. Turn out on lightly-floured board and divide into 2 equal portions; shape each portion into a long roll about 1 1/2" in diameter. Cover with a damp cloth and let rest 15 mins. Using a floured sharp knife, cut dough into 2" lengths and place, well apart, on ungreased cookie sheets. Sprinkle rolls with cornmeal and let rise, uncovered, for 1/2 hour. Brush with cold water and let rise another 1/2 hour. Meanwhile, stand a broad shallow pan of hot water in the oven and preheat oven to hot, 425°. Remove pan of water from oven and bake the rolls in steam-filled oven for 1/2 hour, brushing them with cold water and sprinkling lightly with cornmeal after the first 15 mins., and again brushing them with cold water 2 minutes before removing baked buns from the oven. Yield - 18 rolls.

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
