Frederickson, showed 67 societies represented and 202 present. The recording secretary summarized the six executive meetings held during the year; the activities of nine successful rallies held, and of various questions which were discussed.

In the absence of Mrs. J. F. Easton, Mrs. F. W. Cutcliffe introduced the question box and stated that questions would be answered Wednesday a.m.

Mrs. Allison Tait, literature secretary, in presiding at a well stocked literature table pointed out the merits of the various books dealing with stories, games, songs, meditations, devotional and other themes for young and old—mentioning particularly three recent publications—"Forward Through the Ages", "Wide Windows" and "Wake Up or Blow Up".

Her report showed books sold for the year valued at \$208.00 and 3012 books read by members. Kensington Auxiliary was awarded the book-shelf for 1951 as the best read auxiliary.

Everybody rejoiced when Mrs. J. S. MacLeod, treasurer, reported that \$16,746 was raised, which is \$1,746.00 over our objective. Our year's offerings were dedicated to the furtherance of mission work by Mrs. D. W. McPherson, Murray River. In an appreciation of the untiring efforts and willingness of Mrs. McLeod in her duties, a standing vote of appreciation was expressed.

"Christian stewardship is the practise of systematic and proportionate giving of time, abilities and material possessions and must be a progressive thing," stated Mrs. John Scott, Christian stewardship secretary. She expressed appreciation of efforts made in 1952, stated an increased allocation for 1952 and presented it to Presbyterial for acceptance. It was willingly accepted.

Mrs. Guy Pierce of Brackley, Baby Band secretary, reported thirty-two bands with a membership of over 1,000. They raised \$450.00.

Mrs. W. F. MacLeod, Murray Harbor, Associate Helpers' secretary, reported an approximate membership of 400, who contribute financially and help with supply boxes.

Mrs. Wilbur Webster of Marie, Supply secretary, reported supplies valued at \$5,481 sent to Labrador, Overseas Port Worker at Halifax, Trinidad and Korea.

Bedeque and Bunbury took first and second places in supply work. There is no need for supplies to be sent to Labrador at present, but the need overseas is very great—especially in Korea.

Mrs. Stanley Thompson, Charlottetown Community Friendship secretary and Mrs. Stirling McKay, Albany, Missionary Monthly secretary, each reported advance in their departments.

A most appreciated break in the reports came with the Trinity Mission Band as they sang, "God Thank Thee, Lord," and "God Sees the Little Sparrow Fall," and repeated their Mission Band purpose and prayer.

In her report for Temperance and Christian Citizenship, Miss Louise Calbeck, Bedeque, stated

that the objective for a society can be achieved only when each member makes it a personal objective and quoted the motto of Frances Willard: "I am only one but I am one. I cannot do everything but I can do something, and what I can do, God helping me, I will do."

Mrs. Alban Craswell, Bloomfield Mission Band secretary after giving a most encouraging report passed out the Banc awards for standards of recognition.

The corresponding secretary, Mrs. F. W. Cutcliffe, Frederickton, reported advance in practically all departments, as shown in new Auxiliaries, new Mission Bands, Baby Bands, and C. G. I. T. groups formed. Ten societies appointed secretaries for younger groups and 606 members read the Study Book.

Stewardship of life, of possessions, and of opportunities, was the context of the mediator presented at the evening worship service in Trinity United Church, led by June Bowman, North Wilshire; Elaine Smith, Tryon and Phyllis Drummond, Free-town, Canadian Girls in Training, representing Island groups.

Special music featured Trinity Obedience in "For You Are Praying," and the choir in "Hide Thy Face." Mrs. Hazel Howard, presiding, called upon Rev. H. E. D. Ashford for greetings from Presbyterial and upon Mrs. J. S. McLeod for a brief financial report before introducing the guest speaker, Rev. J. T. Irwin, of Trinity United Church, Charlottetown.

Mr. Irwin expressed regret at the illness of Rev. C. D. Matheson, Summerside, which had prevented him being present at the planned. Commenting on the work of the Presbyterial, he stated that he felt there was a spirit abroad in the Auxiliaries of this Province that foretells a great future for the W. M. S.

Taking as his text Hebrews 11:1—"Now Faith is the substance of things hoped for, and the evidence of things unseen," Mr. Irwin said that the great plan of the universe had been portrayed to us by the great scientists who through the ages with profound faith, endure ridicule and privation, to try to find order out of the chaos of human understanding.

As one scientist said, "We will now try to think God's thoughts after Him." Scientists and all of us are motivated by faith. We believe something will come from our work. Faith is a development and it can begin with faith in ourselves. Know thyself, for almost all of us underestimate ourselves. Mr. Irwin stated that men use only a small portion of the power they possess, for without each of us there is an untapped reservoir of power. As Paul, the Apostle, said, "I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me."

From faith in ourselves, we can go on to faith in our fellow-man, no matter what his color. We do believe in mankind—that is why we send out missionaries. Hymn 556, "Sun of My Soul," and the benediction pronounced by Rev. Mr. Ashford closed the meeting. The Presbyterial meetings will be resumed at 9 o'clock this morning.
