Provincial Track Stars Give Good Show In Meet

Adele Marshbank of Athena Regional High School showed yesterday that she deserves to be going to the National Track and Field Training school...

Marshbank hurled the discus 100'8 inches in setting a new mark in that event and improved her shot mark to a 32' 7 1/2".

Jumping events also took a battering as two of them were broken. Jane Johnston, a member of last season's Islanders Track Club beat her own broad jump mark of 14' 7" by a foot...

However, as usual the greatest number of broken and tied marks came in the running events. Dave MacKinnon of Rochford School knotted the provincial mark in the 10-year-old boys class...

Despite what appeared to be a poor start speedster Rosemary Duffy equalled the 12.5 record in the girls open 100 mark...

This was the second mark that MacAdam established in the meet as he also shattered the boys discus mark with a heave of 135' 10 1/4".

The final mark of the day was Clowater competing in the 12-year-old boys 75 yard dash. He blasted down the runway to shatter the year old record of 9.6 by a tenth of a second.

Action continues at the track today as Junior and Senior performers from all over the Island pour into Charlottetown for their crack at the provincial records and island honors. The

Kauai King Is Favored; Looking For Triple Crown

By ORLO ROBERTSON NEW YORK (AP) — Kauai King, with only 1 1/2 miles of Aqueduct's fast racing strip and other 3-year-olds remaining between him and the coveted Triple Crown, was made the outstanding favorite Friday to capture the 98th running of the Belmont Stakes today.

Only eight horses in the long history of the Kentucky Derby, Preakness and Belmont have won all three of the classics. Kauai King is two-thirds of the way and is 4 to 5 with a strong possibility of shorter odds by post time, that he'll be No. 9 and the first since Citation in 1948.

Post time is 5:15 p.m. EDT. The race will be televised in the United States by CBS and in Canada by the CBC. At stake will be the richest

New York Drops Dodgers Phillies Defeat Giants

NEW YORK (AP) — Jack Fisher pitched a three-hitter for his first victory ever against Los Angeles as New York Mets knocked out Don Drysdale and whipped the Dodgers 6-2 Friday night.

The victory, which snapped a three-game losing streak, was Drysdale's third for the Mets over Drysdale in 21 lifetime decisions.

Littler's second straight 66 and Yancey's 69 gave them 36-hole totals of 132, a two-round record low for the Memphis Open. They were eight under par at the halfway mark.

Jack Rule was second with 135, followed by Bruce Devlin, Johnny Pott, Whit Goolby, Tommy Jacobs, Wright Garrett, Romero Blancas, Bob Charles and Nicklaus with 136.
