THE WEEK AT SDU

Saints Primed To Torpedo Stad. Sailors Grid Squad

Ed MacLeod's powerful Stadacona Sailors are in town with high hopes of extending their two game winning streak to three games. In their two encounters played this fall, they beat Shearwater 21-8 and 16-7. There has been a rumor floating around the circuit to the effect that Stad has gone all out to beat a St. F.X. - We'll, who hain't? But it seems that the Sailors have acquired some new recruits from Her Majesty's services, and have them holding the flag for the Stad football squad. This is probably a little far fetched, but those two wins put them in an enviable position. Meanwhile, Coach Ed Hilton had his band of behemoths in great physical condition for today's contest. The team has been hard at work for the past weeks, and a spirit of enthusiasm and desire has prevailed in the SDU camp. It is difficult to accurately assess the chances for victory today, since the Saints haven't had any exhibition games to judge by. Pessimism is a regular diet around the campus at the outset of any season, but perhaps more so this year. It is felt that the team lost too much through academic difficulties and graduation, yet there are several regulars back. In addition, some ten Islanders have been added to the squad, something which should mean a lot to those playing high school ball right now. While conceding nothing to Stad, Coach Ed Hilton isn't looking for a runaway by either team. "There are some people, I'm told, who think we have lost too much this year, but I'm not one of them. We fooled a lot of people who said the same thing last year, and we did all right. We have a better schedule, so with lots of hard work, we'll win our share of ball games." After today's contest, the Saints go on the road for two games, and then they have three games in a row - Acadia, St. F.X., and Dalhousie. ENROLLMENT UP University enrollment has increased by about ten per cent this year, according to the latest figures from the Registrar's office. There are 556 full-time students - an increase of 45 from last year - with about 150 part-time students taking night courses. The Senior class has 12 students, Juniors number 85; sophomores 140; second engineers 14; and freshmen 228. The increase is what we expected, said registrar, Michael Hennessey. "For some years our numbers have increased by 10 per cent, and this year, our faculty was enlarged and our facilities prepared to handle between 550 and 600 students. The SDU Conservative Club held an introductory meeting Thursday to increase club membership. Under their President, Phil MacDonald, the Conservatives are planning to present a number of programs to acquaint the students with the programs of the various political parties, as well as to provide a forum for discussion of various events taking place in Canada and abroad. The whole program has been tied up in a bundle under the heading of "The Vision to Create," "The Courage to Retain." This may be the wrong time

to write about Winter Carnival dates of all, but chairman Bob Lomburner announced the dates for SDU's big affair so as to give time to schedule hockey games and similar events that take advance planning. The Carnival will start on Wednesday night, Jan. 28, and end on Sat. 31. A one day retreat was held on Wednesday for those students of the Roman persuasion. The announcement of this week of the resignation of the staff of Mount Allison's student newspaper met with some surprise at SDU, not so much on the resignation of the staff, but on the grounds given for it. It seems that the Argosy Weekly resigned because it felt that paper was being treated as a public relations tool rather than a student newspaper. In a bitterly worded editorial, Editor-in-Chief Valerie Marchant announced the resignation of the staff stating that if the administration really believed that the paper was a university publication, it was "ludicrous" to have a student as editor, because of all groups in the university, the students "have the least rights." The ironical part about the affair is that last year, the St. Dunstan's student publication decided to incorporate that paper into the field of public relations, and as a result, organized a "Press Club" to bring about this job. Interest in the recently formed softball league has reached a feverish pitch as every team gets set for the pennant stretch. The Freshmen are in the horror of the underclassmen, are leading the loop as this is being written, but other teams are right behind. Biggest upset of the season took place Thursday when the two Sophomore teams downed the Seniors 2-4, and the Juniors 9-5.
