More Railways Forced to Dismiss Men--Cars Cannot Run--Other Industries Effected

(Canadian Press) LONDON, Mar. 17--The London Daily says the fight between the striking British miners and coal owners, now that it has reached a settlement in the strike has brought Great Britain to realize the serious position of other industries.

Places manufacturers are kept going by means of extra-ordinary efforts and will be no longer able to do this within a few days. A hundred thousand more men and women will be added to the two million men already idle when the Great Western Railway Co. shut down.
