

Five Triple Heat Winners In Six Races

Dean Gallon, Jo Jo Spencer Yuta Afternoon Winners

The favorites ran true to form yesterday afternoon at the Old Home Week races at the Charlottetown Driving Park as Dean Gallon, Yuta and Jo Jo Spencer swept all heats in their classes.

As expected Earl Semple's Dean Gallon lay over the field in the 2:19 Trot. He won the first heat by three lengths and for the rest of the afternoon was barred from the pari-mutuel betting.

Yuta and Jo Jo Spencer both owned by Andrew Perry of Summerside racked up impressive victories. At no time was either of the Summerside horses pushed and they won all dashes with at least a length to spare.

It was a great afternoon for Charlottetown's James "Roach" MacGregor. He was up on both Yuta and Jo Jo Spencer to drive six heat winners.

Vella Grattan in the second heat of the 2:19 trot was a surprise second, and with Dean Gallon barred paid \$172.00 for a win ticket at the pari-mutuel wicket.

The races were more than a hour late getting underway due to rain. They finished one hour before the night races were scheduled to commence.

Dean Gallon won the first heat of the 2:19 Trot by three lengths. Nell Kalmuck went away on top and lead going into the lower turn with Dean Gallon on the outside. Dean Gallon moved to front at the quarter pole and had opened up a three lengths lead by the half way mark. He trotted the last half easily in eight and one.

Cobblesone, driven by Joe Macdonald of Sydney, moved up in the stretch to pass Nell Kalmuck just before the wire for second position. Nell finished third.

In the second heat Mary Merk led for seven-eighths of the mile with Dean Gallon sitting on the outside. Long shot Vella Grattan moved up from third position in the stretch to trot past Cobblesone at the wire.

Dean Gallon was barred from the pari-mutuel betting and Vella Grattan paid \$172.80 for a win ticket and \$113.00 for place.

Dean Gallon won the heat by half a length in the time of 2:16.

It was Dean Gallon by three lengths again in the third heat. He led from wire, followed by Nell Kalmuck and Cobblesone. Cobblesone edged out Nell Kalmuck at the wire with the fast finishing Vella Grattan coming fourth.

Jo Jo Spencer was a length ahead of Vella La Vella as he paced under the wire a winner in the first heat of the 2:16 Pace. Jo Jo came up from third place at the three-quarter mark to pass Direct Mite, who was on the break, and Joey Harvester.

Joey Harvester, driven by Johnny Conroy, was leading at the first turn and was still out front at the half followed by Direct Mite, Jo Jo Spencer, Vella La Vella and Esso in that order. Vella La Vella finished strong to place second.

Driver James MacGregor pulled Jo Jo Spencer out at the three quarter pole and paced up around Vella La Vella and Direct Mite to win the second heat as easily as he had won the first.

Vella La Vella and Jo Jo Spencer into the first turn with the racer horse on the inside. Vella went into the lead on the back stretch followed by Direct Mite, Jo Jo, Chocolate Dip, My Darling and Esso.

Esso, Darling came up from fifth position to finish second with a good stretch drive. Vella La Vella was third.

The other horses were bunched under the wire with Chocolate Dip coming up on the outside to take second place.

Yuta was an easy winner in the first heat of the 2:23 Pace. Driven by James MacGregor, she went away on top followed by Abner McGraw and led until the quarter pole when Mas S. Grattan moved to front.

Yuta and Abner McGraw both pulled out at the half mark with Yuta again taking over leadership. Yuta remained out front and paced under the wire a length ahead of May S. Grattan. Little Delbert paced past Annuncio to take third place while Abner McGraw finished fifth.

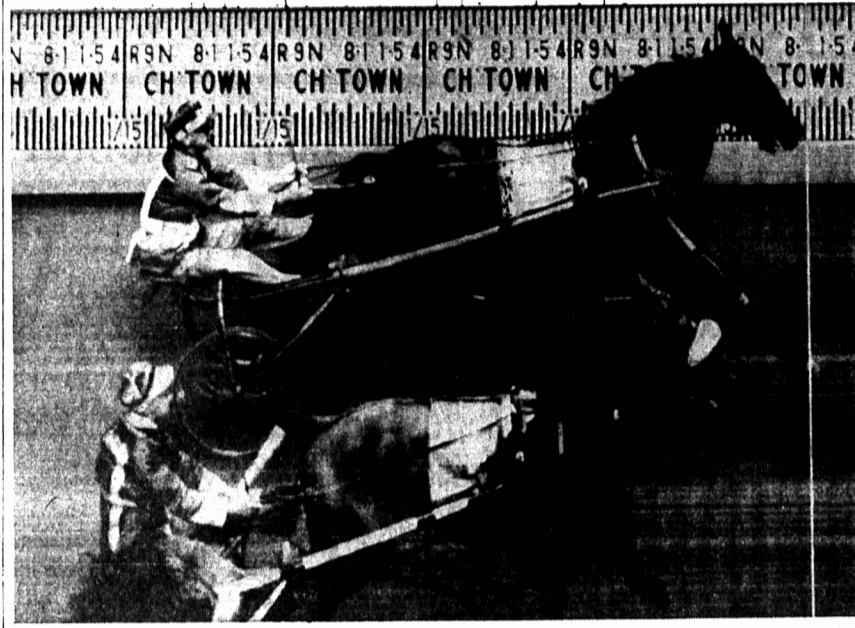

Archie Moore Stops Johnson In 14th Round

NEW YORK (AP)—Light-heavyweight champion Archie Moore came from behind Wednesday night to stop Harold Johnson in 56 seconds of the 14th round of a title fight in Madison Square Garden.

A right to the jaw staggered Johnson and then a series of blows floored Johnson for six. Referee Ruby Goldstein stopped the bout as Moore rained punches on the staggered contender.

Moore weighed 173, Johnson 172½.

The sudden ending stunned the crowd of 8,320 which paid \$34,024. Johnson had been able to handle Moore in the earlier rounds. A fast moving target with his quick hands, the 26-year-old challenger piled up points and tied up the always-aggressive Moore.

Williams Hits Two Home Runs; Ties Mize In Derby

Ted Williams, generally recognized as baseball's greatest modern day hitter, hammered two home runs in Boston's 10-1 victory over Washington Wednesday to tie Johnny Mize for fifth place in the all-time major league home run derby.

The slender slugger smashed his homers in the first and third innings, each time with a man on base to give him 22 for the year and 389 in 11½ active campaigns with the Red Sox. It left him only two behind Joe DiMaggio's total of 361. Williams appears to have only a slim chance to place higher than fifth. Lou Gehrig occupies that position with 494.

While Boston was walking off with the daylight affair of its afternoon-night doubleheader against Washington, the top three teams in the American League continued on the victory trail.

The pace-setting Cleveland Indians took advantage of a couple of Detroit errors to score two gift runs and defeat the Tigers 2-0. The runner-up New York Yankees remained three games behind the Indians, vanquishing the Philadelphia Athletics 3-1 for the ninth time in 11 meetings. Chicago's White Sox took a 1-0 decision over Baltimore as Virgil Trucks bested Bob Kuzava in a brilliant pitching duel.

All National League teams with the exception of the idle New York Giants and Pittsburgh Pirates were scheduled to play Wednesday night.

Four Marksmen Tied In D.C.R.A. Macdonald Match

SOUTH MARCH, Ont. (CP)—Four marksmen—two British and two Canadians—Wednesday tied in the Macdonald match at the third day of the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association prize shoot.

Second was the Royal Winnipeg Rifles team with 379 and the Black Watch of Montreal team placed third with 378.

The provincial team match which also is shot concurrently with the Bankers' match was won by a 12-man team from Manitoba which carded a combined score of 1,120 of a possible 1,200 to edge out a British Columbia team and a Nova Scotia team. Ottawa Team May Move To Hull

OTTAWA, (CP)—George Macdonald, general manager of Ottawa Athletics, will meet the parent Philadelphia Athletics next week to discuss the possibility of moving the capital team's franchise to Hull.

The head office of the Ottawa baseball league will discuss an offer made by Alexis Caron, member of parliament and mayor of Hull directly across the Ottawa river from the capital.

Mr. Macdonald said the big factor in the discussions at Philadelphia will be Sunday baseball. Sunday baseball isn't allowed here, but it can be played in Hull.

"It's costing us from \$15,000 to \$20,000 to travel," Mr. Macdonald added, blaming most of the cost on the fact that the A's have to leave here every weekend.

Mayor Caron disclosed that he had made a "very lucrative" offer to Mr. Macdonald.

He said the team would be provided with a playing site big enough for a 5,000-seat stadium and regulation baseball diamond and field. The club would have to build the stadium.

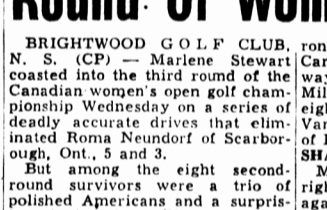
