DIED ABROAD.—Many persons in this city and throughout the province will hear with regret the death of Walter, Oregon, of Mr. William H. Lockhead. Typhoid fever was the cause of death.

CATHOLIC MISSIONS.—The celebrated Missionary Fathers of New York, known as the Paulist Fathers, are to give missions in this Province next September, at Alton, St. George's, Morell and elsewhere.

VALUABLE HORSE LOST.—Mr. James McKeown of Tyne Valley, had the misfortune a few days ago to lose a fine horse. The animal was left standing near the mill pond, and as it was thirsty it went down an incline to drink. The heavy wagon which it was attached pushed the horse into the water, and by this means it was drowned.—Summerside Farmer.

SULLIVAN ON TRIAL.—John Sullivan came up for examination at Moncton on Wednesday charged with the murder of Eliza Datcher at Meadow Brook September 19th. Nothing new was brought out. It is said the Datcher girl received from the burning building has given utterance to something additional, which if verified is considered valuable as throwing light on the mystery.

FOR THE BOSTON MARKET.—The Summerside Farmer reports that Mr. S. H. Jones, of Summerside, Quebec, arrived in Boston last Saturday evening, and expects to remain for the next two months and to ship a large number of lambs during his stay. His first shipment of live stock was made on Saturday's boat, when he sent away 1,500 live geese for the Boston market.

THE FISHING FLEET.—A summary of the Gloucester fishing fleet's doings during the year ending with the month of September shows that 75 vessels were lost, compared with an average of 99 for the past 22 years. Many of the men left families. The number of vessels lost was 13, which was less than that of last year, the total tonnage 323, valuation \$68,000, insurance \$46,048.

ST. JOHN RACES.—The horse races at Moncton, St. John, on Tuesday afternoon were largely attended, and the two events very exciting.
