Montague Road Report

The main highway to Charlottetown from Montague was cleared last night following the storm which occurred Friday night and Saturday. High winds and ground drift quickly filled in cuttings on all roads making the work of re-opening a difficult task.

The road to Charlottetown is narrow and heavy, and late last night there were only a few places at which cars might meet. One plow from Montague cleared the road through Whim Road to Albion, while the Murray River plow opened the road to the south shore road. Owing to weight restrictions the plow is not permitted on the highway between Montague and Murray River.

The road to Georgetown and Cardigan has not been opened, nor has the Seven Mile Road to Dundas, although the Annandale plow is slowly making progress on the Annandale Road. The plows were finding it heavy going in all sections, and it was feared that the anticipated storm would refill all cuttings.
