A collection of the different coins of the realm, and a scroll (parchment) of which the following is a copy:

"In the name and by the favor of the Glorious Architect of Heaven and Earth, on this First Day of July, A. D. 1887, and in the Era of Free Masonry, Anno Lucis, 5887, and in the Fifty-first year of our Gracious Sovereign, Victoria, Queen of Great Britain and Ireland, Empress of India and the Dependencies in Europe, Asia, Africa, Australasia, Dominion of Canada, &c.

His Excellency, the Most Honorable the Marquis of Lansdowne, G. G. C. M. G., P. C., being Governor-General of Canada.

The Honorable Andrew Archibald Macdonald, being Lieutenant-Governor of Prince Edward Island.

Right Honorable Sir John A. Macdonald, K. C. B., &c., being President of the Council, and Premier of the Dominion of Canada.

Honorable William Wilfred Sullivan, Premier of Prince Edward Island.

Honorable T. Heath Haviland, Mayor of the City of Charlottetown.

Rowan R. Fitzgerald, Esquire, Recorder and Stipendiary Magistrate.

Architects—Phillips & Chappell. Contractor—William Fraser.

The corner-stone of the City Hall was laid by the Honorable John Yeo, M. P., P., M. W. G. M. of A. F. & A. M. of Prince Edward Island, assisted by the Grand Officers and a large number of the brethren, with the usual ceremonies and usages of the Order.

During solemn music by the band the stone was let down in its place.

The Master Architect then presented the working tools to the M. W. Grand Master, and were by him handed to the proper Grand Officers, who proceeded to test the stone in accordance with ancient Masonic usage.

The M. W. Grand Master then consecrated the corner stone with corn, wine and oil, emblematical of plenty, health and peace, when the Grand Marshal made the following proclamation: "By order of the Most Worshipful Grand Master of Masons in Prince Edward Island, I now proclaim the foundation stone of the City Building to be laid in ample and ancient form, according to the customs and usages of free and accepted Masons. This proclamation I make once, twice, thrice, in the South, in the West and in the East."

We have just laid the foundation stone of a new city building in which all the business in connection with Civic affairs will be transacted. In 1837 this town was only a village containing but a simple brick building; but at the present time its streets contain rows of buildings of which any city might well be proud, and rivaling those of any city in Canada.

Our old Market House was in shape exactly like an old candle extinguisher; we now have a first class building. Some of us may grow at the National Policy and say that everything is going to the bad; but in spite of all we are going ahead at a rapid pace.

In the whole Province, fifty years ago, there were but 50 public schools, now we have over 500. In this city alone there are more pupils attending the public schools than in the whole Island 50 years ago.

God forbid that any statesman should ever arise in this Province to do anything that would injure that system in any shape or form. We wish our public schools to keep pace with this enlightened age.

Our postage facilities have been vastly increased. It formerly required as long a time to take a letter to Georgetown in this Island, as it now does to send one to Liverpool, G. B.

When our Island railway was first proposed, it met with violent opposition, but not a single man today thinks it unnecessary. I am deeply thankful to those who have assisted in making this demonstration the grand success which it has proved to be.

I also thank the people who have come in from the country—from North and South—to assist in this celebration of Her Majesty's jubilee. I propose three cheers for our glorious Queen. (Three rousing cheers were accordingly given.) Three more also.

The whole ceremony concluded with the Doxology and Benediction.
