Joseph Cyr To Be Sent Home For Investigation

OTTAWA, Nov. 2—(CP)—The controversial naval officer who says he is Joseph Cyr is being flown home from service off Korea to face allegations that he isn't Cyr at all.

Another medical officer, Surgeon Lieutenant David Willoughby of Toronto, is flying out to Korea to take over the medical duties aboard the destroyer Cayuga.

A report from the Cavuga's skipper, Cmdr. James Domet of Saint John, N. B. and Winnipeg, has reached naval headquarters after a preliminary questioning of the man being investigated on the possibility that he impersonated a New Brunswick doctor in joining the navy in March.

The N. B. doctor, Dr. Joseph Cyr of Grand Falls, says the man in Korea may be one Cecil Hannan. The officer will come home under escort but not under arrest and will go before a court of inquiry, probably here. If found guilty of enlisting under false pretences, he would at least be discharged and might face charges in the civilian courts as well.

LONDON, Nov. 2—(Reuters)—Britain's comet jetliners will start making regular scheduled flights to Rome and Cairo in about two months, British Overseas Airways said today. The 490-mile-an-hour planes will carry only freight for the first few trips so that pilots can get used to the new type of plane. The jets will cut the flying time by about half.

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Flyer Rescued After 7 Days

NORTH BAY, Ont., Nov. 2—(CP)—Flyer Bruno Vannier of Sturgeon Falls, Ont., was rescued today after being missing in the Northern Ontario bush for seven days.

A ground party broke through to him and took him to a lumber camp a few miles from his wrecked plane.

Rescuers said Vannier was "weak but in good condition". They said they would spend the night at the camp and fly out tomorrow morning.

The party reached Vannier shortly after he was spotted walking near the bush-ringed lake where his small aircraft crashed Friday 35 miles west of Timagami, Ont.

Vannier was seen by R. C. A. F. pilot Hank Brown shortly after ground searchers had found a note pinned to a small shelter set up near his crashed craft. The note said Vannier was setting out to walk to Sturgeon Falls but was "very weak".

A search was started for the 27-year-old insurance man during the week-end when he failed to return from a trip to three lumber camps north of here. His plane was first sighted today upside down on an island in Yorston Lake.

Former Actress Elopes With Capt.

LAS VEGAS, Nev., Nov. 2—(CP)—Marion Davies, happy as a schoolgirl, eloped yesterday with a sea captain.

The marriage, which caught even the former actress' immediate household by surprise, came a few hours after she settled her affairs with the Hearst Corporation, heir to the newspaper empire of her late close friend, publisher William Randolph Hearst.

The bridegroom is Horace Gates Brown, a merchant marine captain and father of three sons. Brown is 46. Miss Davies gave her age as 45 in applying for the licence. The World Almanac lists her birth date as 1897.

Miss Davies and Brown were married before a justice of the peace. They flew out again for a Palm Springs, Calif., honeymoon after a wedding breakfast of champagne, turkey sandwiches, coffee cake and beer.

In recent years, Brown has been a frequent visitor in the Beverly Hills mansion which Miss Davies owns and where publisher Hearst died last Aug. 14. It was Brown's third marriage and his bride's first.

Miss Davies was closely associated with Hearst for many years, and at one time headed his film producing company, with herself as the star. She recently told a reporter she is worth \$10,000,000.

Manufacturers' Shelves Show Record Inventory

OTTAWA, Nov. 2—(CP)—Manufacturers' shelves were loaded with a record \$3,431,800,000 worth of raw materials and finished goods at the end of August, the Bureau of Statistics reported today.

Rising steadily over the period of a year, the inventories in August reflected a \$56,000,000 increase from July and a total advance of \$899,000,000 from August, last year.

A Trade Department economist, explaining the sharp upward drive in stockpiles, attributed the peak load to two causes:

1. Natural industrial expansion resulting from the country's economic development.
2. Anticipation by manufacturers of greater sales than actually materialized.

All four major industrial groups—manufacturers of consumer, capital, construction and producer goods—shared in the increase over July, though industries producing construction and producer goods accounted for the greatest proportion of the climb.

The stockpile of producer items jumped to \$633,200,000 from \$508,000,000 in July; construction materials, \$276,800,000 from \$266,900,000; capital goods, \$420,000,000 from \$399,700,000; and consumer goods, \$3,121,900,000 from \$2,114,000,000.

At the end of July, the Bureau estimated, the volume of goods held in inventory had increased 14 per cent over the 1950 average level.

"Volume rose slowly during the last quarter of 1950 and the first quarter of 1951, and much more rapidly during the next four months."

Chamber of Commerce President Predicts End of Inflation

Canada's powerful spiral of inflation appears likely to level off within the next three to six months, according to predictions made by Francis G. Winspear, above. And he is the man who should know, for, as president of the powerful and influential Canadian Chamber of Commerce, he is spokesman for an organization backed by more than 100,000 business men and women across the nation.

In addressing the Chamber of Commerce's 22nd annual convention in Quebec City, the chartered accountant from Edmonton, Alta., credited the good news to Ottawa's anti-inflation "brake" credit restrictions—and increased production by industry.

Worked in Quebec

ROME, Nov. 2—(CP)—Italians from storm-hit areas of Calabria and Sicily will be allowed a priority if their applications to immigrate to Canada have been approved, the Canadian Embassy announced today. In some instances, the announcement said, this will avert the waiting period of up to six months.
