He was a past president of Alberton branch of the Royal Canadian Legion and one of its most interested and active members.

Mr. Dunn was a skilled carpenter and painter. For 40 years he was postmaster at Alberton and during the past 15 years he was employed with the Prince Edward Island temperance commission at Alberton. He retired last year.

He is survived by his wife, the former Leah Heister, to whom he was married in 1926, and by three brothers and three sisters, Mrs. C. R. Profit (Ann) of Alberton, Mrs. Michael Kinch (Bessie) of Alberton south, but at present in Ontario, John in Vancouver, George in Chilliwack B.C., Frank and Mrs. John H. Gordon (Edith) both in Arvida, Que.

The funeral will be from St. Peter's Anglican Church at 10 o'clock on Monday afternoon. Interment will be in the church cemetery.

# Social Credit Gets Respect As Campaign Opens In Que.

QUEBEC (CP) — The Social Credit party in Quebec is starting the federal election campaign with something it didn't have until the last weeks of the June 18 campaign—recognition by other parties that it is a force to be reckoned with.

It is generally conceded in political circles that the Liberals and Progressive Conservatives under a united strength of the trend towards the Social Credit party in last June's election until it was too late.

"They grey like dandelions," commented Defence Production Minister O'Hurley on the night of June 18 when Social Credit picked up 26 of Quebec's 75 seats.

Now, on the eve of another campaign, the older parties are including Social Credit in their campaign plans for Quebec. Lionel Chevrier, Liberal member for Montreal Laurier, has said publicly that the Liberals consider Social Credit a greater foe than the Conservatives.

"In the last election," he said, "Social Credit got little opposition from us. This time they will."

William Hamilton, former Conservative cabinet minister defeated in Montreal Notre Dame de Grace last June, says the Social Credit will continue "show strength" this time out.

## AIM AT CHEVRIER

In three speeches this week-end around Quebec City, René Caouette, the party's deputy leader, said he is aiming at the Liberals and indicated that Mr. Chevrier will be the party's main target.

As for the Conservatives, Mr. Caouette said at one point "they are finished" in Quebec. Interest in the party appears as high. At each of Mr. Caouette's three meetings — which had been planned weeks ago and were not official campaign meetings — the halls were jammed.

Mr. Caouette says the party will take 40 of the province's 75 seats April 8.

Social Credit appears to be preparing a big pitch as both a pro-French, pro-Quebec party that is national in scope.

Other speakers said Quebec's 26 Social Credit representatives had done more to promote "the French fact" than any other party before it.
