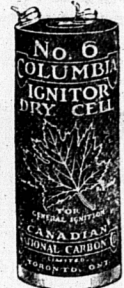

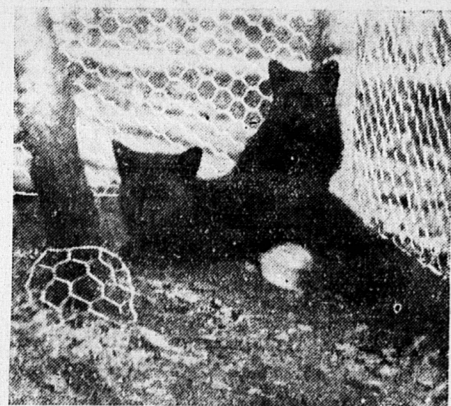

### HOW TO MAKE A CORDED TRIMMING.

Cording is an inexpensive and decorative trimming and much in vogue this season. It is a simple thing to handle and very effective when done in taffeta, satin, or crepe de chene and can also be utilized on cotton frocks. It is made from bias strips of goods, which should be cut about an inch and a quarter in width. Fold the strips lengthwise through the seam along the fold edge. With the strips wrong side out slip the ends of several strands of wool far enough in the end of the tubelike covering so that you can sew them securely to it. Then take the loop end of a wire hairpin, pushing farther into the covering and at the same time turning the covering right side out. When a group of bows is used, this can be done by drawing the motif you care on ordinary wrapping paper. The cording are then basted in place on the design with the seam uppermost, so that the right side of the motif will be next to the paper. The loops and centres are sewed firmly together before being removed from the paper.—From the June Designer.

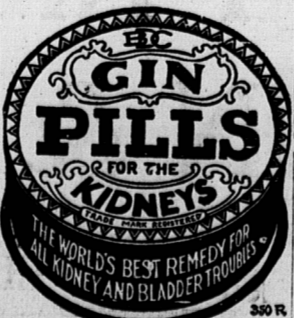

### BULGARIAN REVOLUTION

VIENNA, May 22.—Conflicting reports have reached here of the Bulgarian Revolution. Despatches from Belgrade say King Boris fled to Varna, Premier St. Amboulsky who represents the Peasants Agrarians with his followers proclaimed a Republic. A state of civil war it is further reported, exists, fifteen of General Wrangel's Officers have been expelled.

Agram advices, however, declares the train from Sofia arrived at Belgrade at five o'clock yesterday afternoon and those aboard reported comparative quiet, General Alexandrov having issued a counter proclamation in Sofia calling upon the population to remain loyal to the King.

### INQUIRY GOES STEADILY ON

SPRINGHILL, N. S., May 22.—Mr. D. H. McDougall, Vice President of the British Empire Steel Corporation, stated here on Saturday before the Scott Conciliation Board that rates of wages put into effect at the beginning of the year in Corporations Coal Mines of Nova Scotia was based on an approximate of 37 1/2 per cent. wage cut, were the maximum that could not be paid under the prevailing conditions and the management is strongly convinced it is not justified in accepting the decision the Gillen Conciliation Board this year, which sliced the original cut by about five per cent. which the Miners later turned down not being a favorable enough.

### LIQUOR SHIPPED AS DRY GOODS IS SEIZED

ST. JOHN, May 22.—As a result of intercepting a big consignment of liquors, billed out here as dry goods and consigned to the Universal Garment Company and Toronto Clothing Company, both of Toronto, Ontario, parched throats in the "White City" will continue to crack and the New Brunswick Liquor Commission have its stock increased, about \$8,000 worth with two hundred cases of Dewars Special Liquor nicely packed in cases such as used in shipping dry goods.
