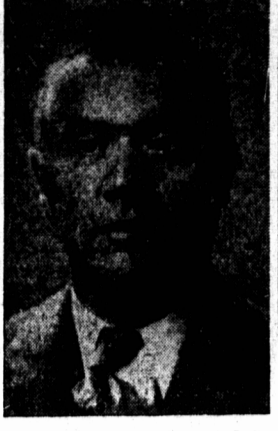

To Preach at Trinity



Rev. Alexander Marks, D.D. (above) will be the guest preacher at the evening service of Trinity United Church on Sunday at 7:00 o'clock. He is speaking in the interest of the American Board of Missions to the Jews and will show a film at 8:30.

Rev. Mr. Marks who himself is a Jewish convert to Christianity has been engaged in mission work among his own people in all parts of the world. Now 43 years of age he was stricken by blindness about eight years ago but this did not dampen his enthusiasm to tell the Jewish people about Christ. "The Jew is not hostile to Christ," says Rev. Mr. Marks, "but he has been led to believe that Christianity stands for discrimination as a result of his persecutors who live in so called Christian countries."

"The aim of the Mission," states the minister is, "to evangelize the Jew and to create better understanding between Jew and Gentile." When asked "what is the secret of your courage?" Mr. Marks replies, "My faith in God."

Born in England and educated in Scotland, Rev. Mr. Marks is noted as an outstanding evangelist. He has preached in some of the largest churches on the North American continent.

Among The Farmers

(Federation of Agriculture News)

How Many Voters

In spite of the claim that a number of growers are being denied the right to vote in the present plebiscite, there is a striking similarity in the figures of the 1950 plebiscite, the 1951 census and the number of eligible growers in the present plebiscite. In the 1950 plebiscite, 6747 votes were cast. The census returns of 1951 indicate that there were 6700 growers having an acre or more, and in the present plebiscite over 6700 growers ballots have been mailed. While these figures of course may be interpreted in a variety of ways they do suggest that 6700 is very close to being 100% of the number of farmers growing an acre or more potatoes.

Compulsion

The opponents of the Potato Board have emphasized the sections of the Marketing Act which set forth the powers of Boards and sought to convey the impression that such powers will all be used in an arbitrary manner. The fact should not be lost sight of that boards are set up to benefit growers and any board which acted in an arbitrary manner and without due regard for the welfare of the producers would quite likely lose their confidence and support. The strong sections of the Act were included to cover extreme cases and as a means of enforcing the co-operation of those who would actively seek out every possible loophole for their own advantage and to the detriment of the general welfare.

Certainly there are compulsory features in connection with marketing legislation and there must be penalties for infractions, but any board should be very careful how such powers are exercised. This does not mean that if a case arises where board regulations are frequently disobeyed or broken that the board should not act. Producers on the board and at the same time do as they like. Under all circumstances, the responsibility of a board is to promote and protect the general welfare. It cannot be expected to protect the special interest of a private individual or allow him advantages which are denied to all.

What We Can Get

At practically every meeting held by the Federation, the statement was made by one or more individuals that farmers should be free to sell where and when they pleased and for what they can get. With the latter part of the statement we are inclined to take strong exception and as an instance of the inherent danger in such reasoning we would point out what could happen to fluid milk prices. At the present time the price of fluid milk is set by a board and each farmer has a quota which he supplies at the board price. At this time of the year practically every farmer has surplus milk over and above his quota for which he must accept a much lower price. Freedom to sell at any price would mean that a producer could offer the plant operator his surplus at a somewhat lower price and thus deprive his neighbor of his entire quota and his livelihood as well. Freedom on the part of the milk producer to offer his product at any price would soon depress the price to all and eventually cause serious loss to all concerned.

In our highly organized industries, it is recognized that the worker is compelled to accept wages in keeping with the general scale. Certainly if an individual were free to go into a plant and work for 10c an hour very soon no one would

be receiving a living wage. Farm products are the labor of the farmer offered in a different form and we will maintain strongly that no farmer has the right to offer his labor at a price which will jeopardize the livelihood of his neighbors.

An Important Decision

Few provincial elections have been of more significance than the present plebiscite and in the interest developed compares favorably with our most stirring political contests.

It may also be stated that the results of the plebiscite can be as significant as that of any election. The potato industry may be at a turning point and the plebiscite may well decide what the future is going to be. The part of the campaign which has been fought in the open has "seen so much in the way of contradictory evidence and statements that growers would have to be more than ordinarily good judges to reach a decision on the merits of the case."

We make no predictions as to the outcome but have sufficient confidence in the good judgment of the majority opinion to state that the decision will not likely be far astray.

C. F. A. Achievements

An independent research worker is responsible for the statement, "It may be noted that the C. F. A. has more success than many other interest groups in dealing with the Government". This statement can be accepted with few misgivings if one stops to realize that of all the important demands which the C. F. A. has pressed upon the government only on the margarine issue have they been balked.

Achievements for which the C. F. A. can claim credit for may be listed as follows:

1. The agricultural prices support program.
2. Legislation for regulated marketing.
3. The coarse grains program.
4. The freight rates assistance program.
5. The cooperative marketing act.
6. The averaging of income, the basic herd plan and other changes in farm income tax regulations.
7. Free listing under customs of certain farm machinery.
8. The operations of the agricultural products marketing board.
9. A bill to prohibit resale price maintenance.

Purpose of The C. F. A.

The main purpose of the C. F. A. is to give the farm people a united voice. Specifically, it hopes to coordinate the efforts of all Agricultural Organizations across Canada into a cohesive policy. It feels that collective and united action will achieve better results than sporadic, sectional ones. In doing this it hopes to promote the social and economic conditions of farmers.
