The major track and field competitions slated for the Maritimes this summer include: Summerside Lobster Carnival, July 13; Antigonish Highland Games, July 16; Halifax's Bill Bailey Memorial Meet, August 14; National Age Class Championships, Saint John, August 27 and the Open Provincial AAU of C Championship at Charlottetown's Memorial Field, September 4th.

Angus Mitchell, 36, who quarterbacked the Saskatchewan Roughriders into the Grey Cup playoffs every year he played with the team since a heart attack at his home in Surrey, near Vancouver, recently. Mr. Mitchell joined the Roughriders in 1952 as quarterback and left the team after the 1952 season.

Stu Aberdeen Is Hopeful On Dave Barry's Prospects

HALIFAX (CP)—Stu Aberdeen, coach of Canada's new National basketball team, said Thursday he doesn't think he has the right to decide who should—and who should not—have a chance to play on his team.

"There's a national committee that will be selecting 20 players who will have a crack at the team," Aberdeen said in an interview. "I'm only going to coach them."

Aberdeen led the Acadia Acesmen of Wolfville, N.S., to the National Intercollegiate title this year and this week was named coach of a 12-man national team to be selected for a tour of Central and South America next month.

He said he had made an agreement with officials of the Association that in addition to the 20 players selected by the committee to try out for the team, he would pick "four or five others that they might have overlooked."

Aberdeen said he has "several players, among them Maritimers, who he hopes to have on the team."

He says top contenders for a berth on the team are former Acadia players Pete Simmonds of Halifax and Ritchie Spears of New Waterford, N.S. Simmonds played this year and at Albert, B.C., and Spears has been studying at Dalhousie University here.

Asked about Dave Barry of Saint John, N.B., the top point man and rebound leader in the Maritime Intercollegiate League last season, Aberdeen was non-committal. Leave it up to the committee, he said. "But you wouldn't have to stretch your

imagination too much to guess that anyone who deserves a chance will get one."

Barry, a 20-year-old Saint John, N.B. native, had an outstanding season for St. Francis Xavier University this year when the X-men finished second in the league to the Axemen.

Dalhousie University Coach Al Yarr, who saw his Tigers defeated twice by St. FX this season, said Thursday night that Barry should have a chance to make the team.

"In ability, Barry's one of the best I've ever seen in Canada,"

said Yarr. "He quick for a big man (6'5") and could play well from the corner on a team like the nationals. I think he deserves the chance."

Les Goodwin, Coach of St. Mary's University Huskies of the Maritime League, said Barry is the best centreman he has seen in 20 years of coaching.

Barry's own coach at St. Francis Xavier, Paddy McFarland, said Barry does everything well. "He shoots well and he's the best all-around player I've had in my six years at St. FX."

Two Suspensions Are Withdrawn

Niagara Falls scored an easy 8-2 victory in the fourth game before 5,336 fans Wednesday night to take a 3-1 lead.

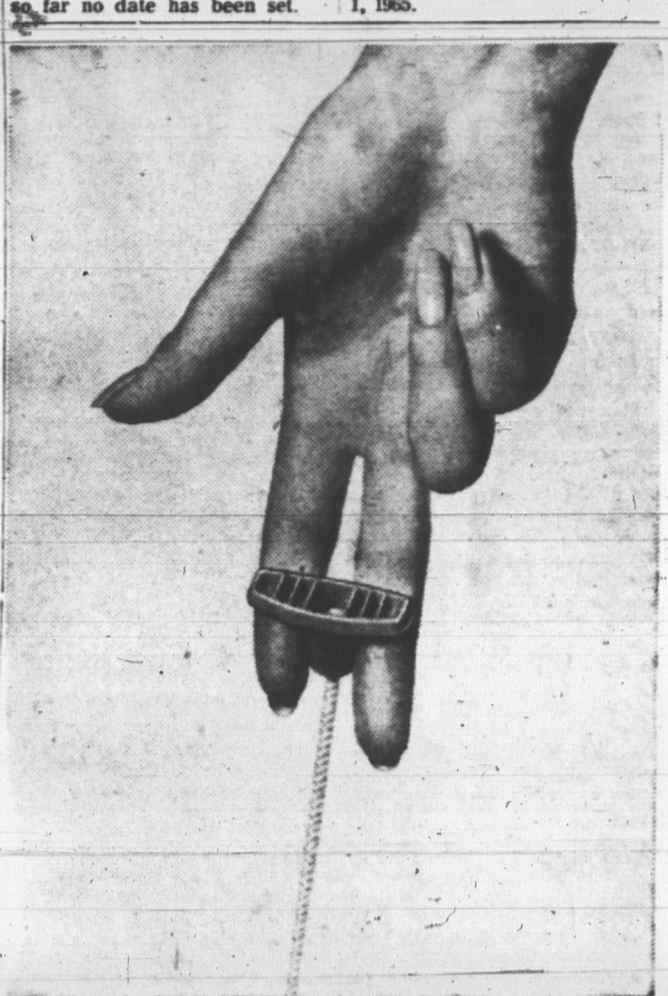
The three players were suspended by Gordon Jukes of Melville, Sask., CAHA secretary manager, after incidents in a wild final period of the third game Monday night.

Montague's Ball Is Underway

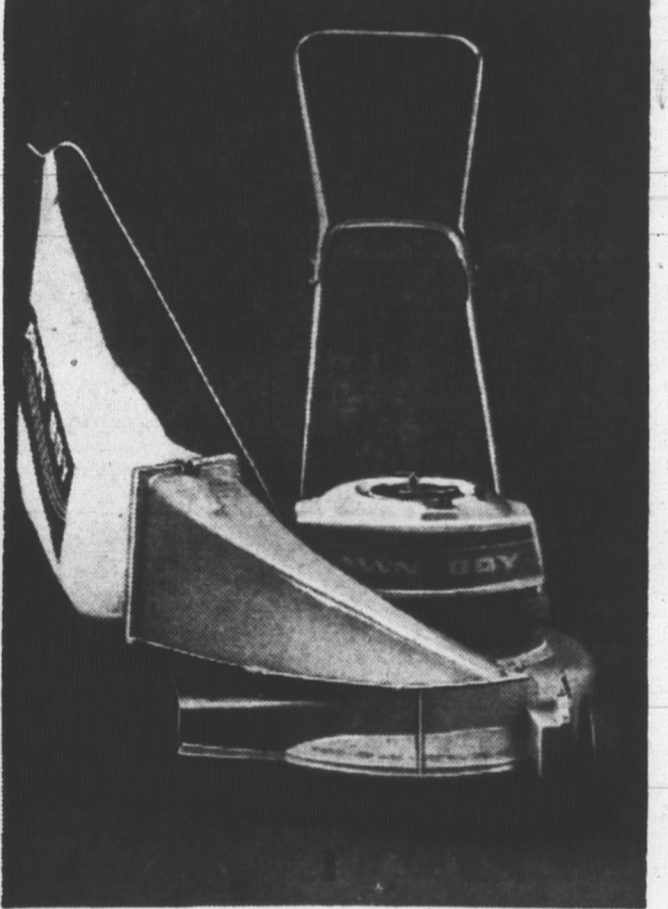


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Ch'town Ladies In The Lead

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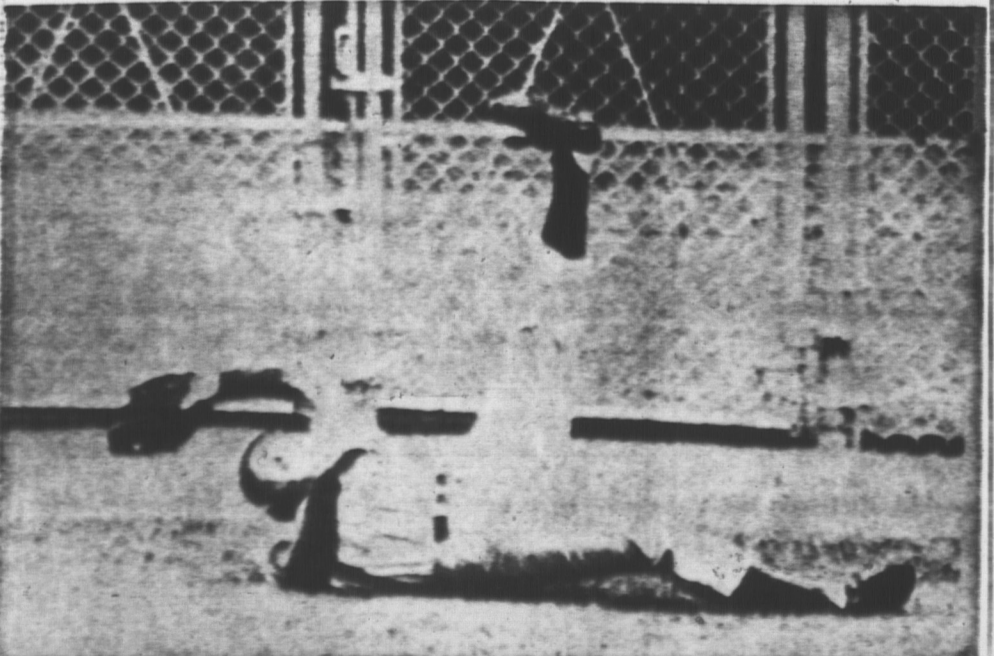
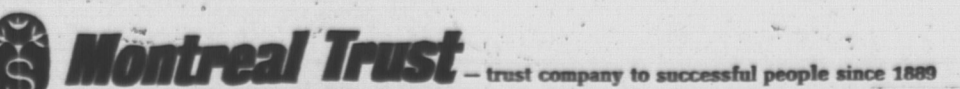
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THIS IS BASEBALL?
