Stadium Ready For New Season

SUMMERSIDE—The doors of Civic Stadium in Summerside will be thrown open Friday night for the first general skating session of the season. First ice-making began this week and rink manager Charles Logan and crew worked through Tuesday night to get a slick ice surface ready for opening hockey practices and skates open to the general public. Summerside Aces will have their first workout of the season tonight along with other teams from Prince County. General skates will also be held Saturday afternoon and evening. During the winter months regular skating will be held on Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday with afternoon sessions Wednesday and Saturday. Pre-school age children and beginners will have skating sessions on Tuesday and Thursday afternoon from 1 until 3 p.m. Pre-school skates are free to the children and their adult escorts. MEET SATURDAY A meeting of the Sunday Night Skating Club will be held at the stadium Saturday afternoon. It is open to anyone interested. At this meeting a decision will be made as to whether or not the

club will be continued. Monday and Friday nights have been left open for the Summerside Aces, still awaiting a decision on a possible Island Hockey League. Wednesday night at the stadium will be featured by games of the recently formed Prince County Rural and Commercial League. The league includes such teams as Tignish, Elmsdale, Birch Hill, Sherbrooke, Town Taxi and Coonac. The league gets underway next Wednesday with all entries seeing action in a triple-header. Student cards which will admit students to skating and hockey activities at reduced prices are available again this year and can be had by contacting manager Hogan. The stadium has been given a face-lifting for this season. Its interior has been completely redecorated. All dressing rooms, lobbies, exits, canteens, railing and boards have been painted in a variety of pleasing colors. The administration of the town-owned stadium is conducted by a committee of the Town Council under chairman Councillor W. E. MacCausland. Benny Grady is in charge of ice-making and canteen manager is Clovis Perry.

This Quarterback Needs His 'Specs'

TORONTO (CP)—Talk about knowing the players without a program—here's a football quarterback who can't spot downfield pass receivers without his glasses. He's Bill Thackuk, 18-year-old University of Toronto student who led North York Knights against Montreal's Notre Dame de Grace Maple Leafs Saturday in the Eastern Canada junior final. The Knights had a dismal season in their Big Four junior loop in the Toronto area with only two victories in six scheduled games. START TO ROLL But that was enough to get them into the sudden-death final of the three-team loop, which

stuck to its old name although it lost one club this year. Then team officials prevailed on Thackuk to wear his glasses on the field. The underdog Knights knocked off the unbeaten, united Lakeshore Bears 13-9 to win the Big Four junior playoff and then defeated Sarnia Knights, champions of the Ontario Rugby Football Union junior series, 29-15 last Saturday to qualify for the eastern final in Montreal. The Knights are coached by Ulysses (Crazy Legs) Curtis, one-time backfield star with Toronto Argonauts of the Big Four, and Bill Liga, who had to give up playing after a head injury with Parkdale last season.

MONTREAL (CP)—Rhoda Wurtele Eaves, an international skier in her heyday, is to lead Canada's women's ski team to Europe this year, leaving Nov. 30 for the Canadian ski camp at Kitzbuhel, Austria.

Bill Tindale, chairman of the newly-formed international competitions committee of the Canadian Amateur Ski Association, said she was chosen "because of her wide knowledge of terrain that awaits our racers and her own undoubted prowess as a skier."

Pepi Salevmoser, who trained Lucille Wheeler into the world championship class, will have complete charge of the girls ski training after they arrive.

Carrying Canada's hopes will be Anne Heggveit, Ottawa, Janet Holland, Nancy Holland, Faye Pitt, all of Montreal, and Claire Monaghan, Quebec City. On the male side are Dave Jacobs, Johnnie Semmelink, both of Montreal, and Vancouver's Lorne O'Connor. Arnold Midgley of Ottawa is expected to join the team later.

Eddie Perkins Defeats Ryff

CHICAGO (AP)—Nimble Eddie Perkins, flashing good combinations, Wednesday night hammered out a unanimous 10-round decision over Frankie Ryff in a lightweight scrap in Chicago Stadium.

Perkins, 21-year-old Chicago youngster who gained his 12th victory in 16 starts, floored the veteran New Yorker with a short right in the third round. Ryff took a mandatory eight.

Perkins landed an overhand right before the third was finished and made Ryff's nose bleed. In the fourth, he hurt Ryff with a right and in the fifth Ryff was bleeding from a gash on his left eyebrow.

Perkins also bled from the nose and from a slight cut under his left eye. Each weighed 138 pounds. It was Ryff's first defeat in his last six bouts and gave the 26-year-old converted southpaw an overall record of 24-9.

Foxes Causing Concern In NS

HALIFAX (CP)—A meeting of the Nova Scotia Veterinary Association here Wednesday expressed concern over the rapidly increasing fox population in the province.

A spokesman said Nova Scotia foxes have no rabies now but the association was afraid the disease might spread from wildlife in Ontario and Quebec. The Association urged the Lands and Forests Department to increase the bounty on foxes as a means of cutting down the population.

Dr. Raymond Kennedy of Sydney was elected association president and other officers include executive council members Dr. E.E.I. Hancock and Dr. Earl Gray of Truro.

Ceremony Marks 1918 Surrender

COMPIEGNE, France (AP)—An emotion-packed ceremony Tuesday marked Armistice Day on the spot where the Germans surrendered to the Allied powers 40 years ago.

President Rene Coty visited the nearby clearing in a forest where the armistice was signed. Tears rolled down the cheeks of many spectators as Coty kissed the flag of his First World War unit. Thousands had clocked to the Compiègne Forest in the early hours of the day.

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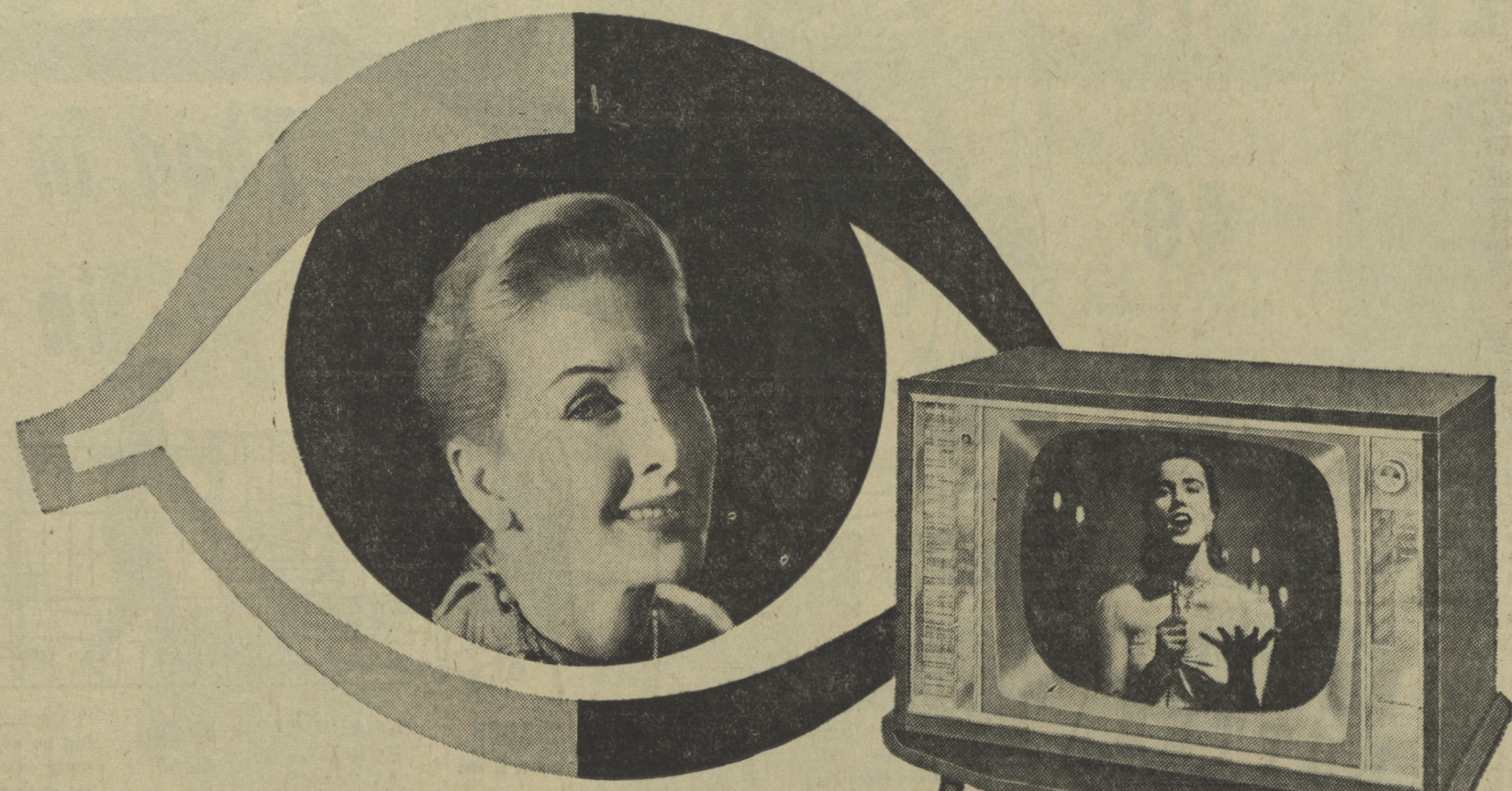
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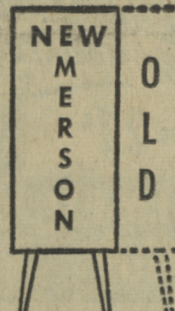
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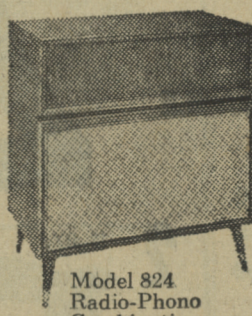
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
