

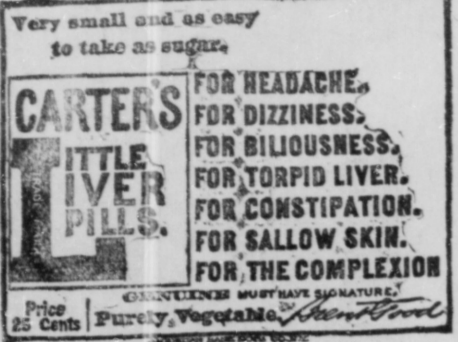

ANOTHER OIL STORY.

BEFORE resigning, the late Government had called for tenders and awarded contracts for one year for the supply of oil for the Intercolonial Railway. The successful tenderers were the Eastern Oil Company and the Imperial Oil Company. When the Hon. Andrew Blair became Minister of Railways he cancelled these awards and, without calling for fresh tenders, gave the whole contract to the Galena Oil Company of Pennsylvania, U. S.,—a branch of the great oil trust controlled by Rockefeller—although the sample of oil furnished by this concern was found on analysis to be decidedly inferior. Here are the prices agreed to be paid by the Conservative government as compared with the prices which Mr Blair paid to the minions of Rockefeller, both contracts to cover the same period of time.

The pretext of Mr Blair for paying high prices was that he had a guarantee from the Galena Oil Company that owing to a system of careful handling, which they would show him how to carry out, a large saving would arise in the quantity of oil to be consumed. But an examination of the returns of the Railway Department, compiled by his own officers, shows that no such saving was effected.

The true motive for making this contract, on such extraordinary terms, has to be sought for on other grounds than the public interest. It appears that when Mr Blair was contesting Sunbury and Queen's, on his acceptance of office, a mysterious stranger by the name of Leitchman, from Pennsylvania, made his appearance in that constituency. It is notorious that "human devices" were resorted to on that occasion in a manner unusual even for Mr Blair. This was about the middle of August. About three weeks later Leitchman was allowed the prices given above for oil by the Hon. Andrew Blair. This contract has cost the taxpayers of Canada probably \$100,000 more than they had a right to pay. How much of that amount went into the pockets of the dockfellers and how much into the Grit campaign fund, we shall not attempt to determine.

DRUMMOND RAILWAY DEAL

WHILE scores of subjects were pressing themselves on the notice of the Laurier Government during their first regular session, in regard to which they had made most solemn promises, they deliberately ignored every one of them and proceeded to deal with a question about which the country had heard nothing—involving an expenditure equal to a capital sum of seven millions of dollars. We refer to the Drummond Railway deal which involved the purchase by instalments at an almost fabulous price of the bankrupt Railway, and the leasing of an equally ridiculous rents of certain rights and privileges in connection with 37 miles of the Grand Trunk Railway, including the Victoria Bridge and terminals in Montreal. The bargain was so notoriously bad that many members of the House of Commons who, through party pressure, voted for it appealed to members of the Senate to reject it. The Senate threw out the bill. But their action was furiously denounced by the subsidized Grit press from Cape Breton to Vancouver.

Two years later, the government reintroduced the scheme, but with improvements in the public interest exceeding in value \$700,000. Here is what the Hon. Mr. Kerr, a strong Liberal and an appointee of the Laurier Government said, in his place in the Senate, when the second bill came before that body:—

"I am bound to say that the Senate has been the means of saving this country some \$700,000 by the course they took then."

Let the electors ask, why were Blair and Tarte so anxious to rush the Drummond bill, and throw away \$700,000 of the public money. They will find the answer in the fact which came out in Parliament, that the principal owner of the Drummond road bought a paper, La Patrie, for the sons of J. Israel, Tarte, for which the sum of \$30,000 was paid

This was probably one of the many scoops which ministers or their friends or families got out of the \$400,000 of clear profit which James G. Greenshields, the Treasurer of the Grit campaign fund, made out of the Drummond railway deal.
