

200 Delegates Expected For Kinsmen Convention

Upwards of 200 delegates are expected to register for the district seven convention of Kinsmen comprising the four Atlantic provinces which opens at the Kinsmen Club, Summerside, tonight. Mr. Norman Hogg, president of the Summerside Club which is holding its first convention, will preside. Summerside Kinsmen, sponsored by the Charlottetown Club, were formed in 1945.

The locale of the convention will be at the Garden of the Gulf Cabins and Motel and at Parkman's Cabins and Motel. Business sessions will be held at Howard's Restaurant.

At a mixed luncheon on Friday, Mr. Hogg will preside and the guest speaker will be Dr. George Fisher who will take as the subject of his address "Cradle of the Waves". At this meeting, Mayor Wedge of Summerside will bring greetings. On Friday evening a stag dinner will be presided over by Mr. Elmer Murphy, past president of Summerside Club. This is to be followed by the District Governor's ball at Howard's Restaurant.

Mr. Jim Harris, president elect will preside at a noon luncheon on Saturday when the guest speaker will be Mr. Roland MacDonald, past president of the Prince Edward Island Federation of Agriculture.

From Summerside the convention will move to Charlottetown where the guests will be received by the Charlottetown Club. This will be followed by the District Governor's dinner when greetings will be brought from the Lieutenant Governor and Premier of the Province, from Mayor Stewart and from Kinsman A. Walthen Gaudet on behalf of the Charlottetown Central Committee. The chairman for this occasion will be Andy Gow of Bridgewater, N.S. The Kin Oration will be delivered by Dick Miller of Moncton. This concluding session will feature the election of the District Governor and District officers for the coming year. An informal dance at the Charlottetown will bring the convention to a close.



Steer Defies All Comers

"As gentle as a bull in a china shop" is hardly the description of the enraged steer seen above as he stood on top of a coal pile in Holman's lumber yard yesterday morning after chasing upwards of 100 spectators and others to cover, who were trying to recapture him.

Master of all he surveys in the above photo, this defiant animal was subdued only after five bullets had ended his life and the threat he presented should he escape onto the nearby main street of the town.

He was brought to Summerside on a light delivery truck by Keith Coles of Breadalbane, who had purchased him from Kenneth MacLean of Lot 16. These two men were unloading him for weighing at Holman's scales when he suddenly went wild and broke away from the two men who were unable to hold him.

Escaping into the lumber yard near the waterfront he disorganized every effort to recapture him and several times sent everyone scurrying for cover.

Clearly indicating that he was ready and anxious for combat and considered extremely dangerous, his owners gave permission for his execution, and Gusie Galant, a Summerside fisherman, as a one-man firing squad using a 30-06 rifle, ended the temporary command held by this big Holstein steer which weighed over 1,000 pounds.
