The bidding:

The number of hearts is that come up where declarer makes a fatal misstep on the very first trick is quite surprising. The reason for declarer's fall from grace usually is that he plays too hastily to the first trick and then discovers too late that he should have restrained his impetuosity.

A spade is led by West, East playing the queen. South should play the eight! Why? Simply because by doing so he assures himself of nine tricks.

First let's see what happens if declarer instinctively wins the East's queen with the king. He can now count seven sure winners, and his only real prospect

of making game is to go to work on the clubs.

When he takes the club finesse, East wins with the king and returns a spade. West runs four spade tricks and South is down one.

Let's next compare what happens if declarer allows East to win the opening lead. East can do no better than return a spade and declarer is now assured of at least nine tricks whether the club finesse works or not.

It all goes back to the question of declarer's approach to the play of a hand. If declarer sees at the beginning of play that there is a sure way to make the contract, he should naturally not pursue any other line of play that jeopardizes it.

Since it is possible for South to be defeated if West has a five-card spade suit and East has the king of clubs, declarer should design his play so that this possibility is overcome.

By ducking the queen of spades, South guards against every conceivable hand the defenders may have. If it turns out East has three spades, giving West four, the contract is in no danger. Or if East's spade queen is a singleton, nine tricks are likewise foolproof.

What the whole proposition boils down to is that, while it may seem completely natural to win the queen with the king, the urge to take the trick should be resisted since it endangers the contract.

Private Enterprise Must Show Merit

WASHINGTON (CP)—The private enterprise system under which Western countries operate must show the whole world that it is the best way to a better life for all peoples, Carlos Mantero of Portugal, newly-elected president of the International Chamber of Commerce, told the closing session of the week-long chamber congress Saturday.

Mantero told the business men—about 1,000 of them from more than 40 countries—that if they do not rise to their responsibilities that private enterprise system as it is known today can hardly survive.

This was a responsibility which included not only immediate private or national affairs, but the affairs of all countries of the world, and particularly the newly developing countries.

“Unless we are able to make the free enterprise system an instrument for continuous economic expansion at a rate sufficient to meet the restless demand for more material and spiritual satisfactions, the political pressures that will come to bear upon our institutions may force them into dangerous deviations from which they may not readily escape.”

“Unless the competitive system works efficiently, it will give room to the recurring popular demand for new political experiences, the cost of which will ultimately be borne by the people themselves.”

Mantero said investment by developing countries in the countries needing development is today's key need, and the one on which the present Western way of life may survive or fall.

COPENHAGEN NEXT

The final congress session which he addressed confirmed 58 statements and resolutions which are the decisions of the international chamber during the two years since it met in Naples in 1957. They also give direction to the chambers for activities during the next two years until it meets in Copenhagen in the spring of 1961.

Paul Bienvenu of Montreal, president of the Canadian council of the ICC and leader of the Canadian delegation, said he was impressed by the wide sweep of the matters discussed.

The chamber resolutions and statements put heavy emphasis on the need for monetary stability; cautioned against government expenditures taking up too much of a country's available savings; and urged the freedom of central banks from government or political interference.

Heavy Frost Hits Fruit Belt

KELOWNA, B.C. (CP)—Two nights of frost in the fertile Okanagan Valley of interior British Columbia have dealt a severe blow to fruit growers in southern areas.

In the Kelowna district, horticulturist Frank Morton said the frost has “for all intents and purposes” wiped out the cherry crop and caused some damage to apples and pears.

Temperatures dipped more than 10 degrees below freezing Thursday night and from six to eight degrees below last night.

In the north Okanagan, where crops are a little later, damage was light.
