SAY PROTECTION WOULD END UNEMPLOYMENT

LONDON, Nov 28—The question whether lack of employment exists in New York is the latest matter to occupy rival London newspapers in their discussions of the budget crisis. One free trade organ quotes a writer to the effect that at the present moment there are two hundred thousand unemployed in that city. A tariff reform paper, however, in denying this contention got a statement from Patrick F. McGowan, President of the Board of Aldermen of New York City, which said: "Practically speaking there is no unemployment at the moment. The reformers here contend that the adoption of their policy will serve to dispel the unemployment situation here."

GOVT SEIZED ITS OWN FLOUR

DES MOINES, Ia., Nov 28—Upon instructions from Attorney General Wickersham, Chas M. Temple, U. S. district attorney in the southern Iowa district court, dismissed the case brought against 310 sacks of bleached flour seized by government officers at Ft. Des Moines last summer. The fact that the flour was government property at the time of its seizure was given as the reason of dismissal.

Huber was awakened by some one walking in the room just before daylight.

IMMENSE TOBACCO CROP IN U. S.

WASHINGTON, Nov 28—More than one hundred and fifty million pounds of cigar tobacco and nearly four times that quantity of the other types of tobacco was grown in the United States in 1908, according to a bulletin issued by the Department of Agriculture today. Kentucky leads all the states in tobacco grown, producing more than one-third of the crop of the country and about one-ninth of the entire crop of the world. While some tobacco is produced in almost every state, less than one per cent of this country's crop is grown west of the Mississippi River, Texas being the only trans-Mississippi State in which the industry has gained much importance.

GUARD SHOOT AT INTRUDER

CLEVELAND, Ohio, Nov 28—In an unsuccessful attempt to gain the ear of John D. Rockefeller at his Forest Hill home, Count P. A. DeVries, a nobleman of Amsterdam, Holland, was fired upon twice and ejected from the Rockefeller mansion. Since Wednesday the count has been making daily attempts to see the head of the Standard Oil Company, to interest him in a project for draining the Zuyder Zee. Wednesday and Thursday DeVries was turned back at the gate. Returning Friday in a huge rented automobile, DeVries approached the gate. He eluded avenue at high speed, but the keeper shouted to him to stop, but DeVries dashed through the gates and about the winding driveway toward the house at the top of the hill. He was fired upon as he neared the house. Leaping from his automobile, he mounted the steps and entered the door, followed by a squad of guards who came on the run. Before DeVries could enter Rockefeller's study, however, he was collared by the butler and by Caretaker Knapp and ejected. He then left, and according to a story told today, toward the gate. While the excitement was at its height, Mr Rockefeller was one hundred yards away on the golf links, unaware of the failure of the Zuyder Zee project.

RAIN STORMS IN PORTO RICO

SAN JUAN, November 28—The incessant downpour of rain since November 10th, has caused heavy damage to property throughout the island. The rivers are raging torrents, overflowing the country. The rain, however, was accompanied by only a light wind. The sugar, tobacco and pineapple plantations have suffered greatly, many acres of sugar-cane and pineapple land on the northern coast have been flooded and the Yabucoa and Humacao sugar districts on the southern coast have been swept away and countless cattle drowned. Landslides on the military road from San Juan to Ponce and Guayama obstruct traffic and delay the mails. Telegraphic communications have been badly interrupted the wires being down everywhere.

LAST COAL BOAT UP ST. LAWRENCE

SYDNEY, Nov 28—On the sailing of the steamer Fornebo, which left the international Pier yesterday with a full cargo of coal for Quebec, the Dominion Coal Company shipments up the St. Lawrence were completed amounting to 960,000 tons approximately. The total shipments for 1908 were 1,344,200 tons the decrease being due to the strike. The steamers Christian Knudsen and Borgestad completed their charters with the Coal Company last week, and several others will finish before the end of this week. The company has had eleven chartered steamers this season, besides their regular steamers of the Black Diamond line. Last season the Company only had two chartered boats in the month of June. The Boston trade, but two more Louisburg-Boston trade, but two more will be added, making a total of four will be added, besides its own regular fleet. Shipping will be continued for the winter months from Louisburg.

WM. MACKENZIE HAS RETURNED

Is Well Satisfied With Financial Prospects and With B. C. Elections.

Special to The Guardian. TORONTO, November 29—After five weeks in Europe, Wm Mackenzie has returned. He went to England for the purpose of floating a big issue of Canadian Northern bonds. Mr Mackenzie said his mission was satisfactory, the issue being over-subscribed. Mr Mackenzie also expressed himself as pleased with the outcome of the elections in British Columbia and said as soon as the necessary legislation was passed the work of construction would be proceeded with and the line extended from Edmonton to the coast.

SOCIALIST WON GERMAN ELECTION

HALLE, Province of Saxonia, Prussia, Nov 28—Herr Kunert, Socialist, in a bye-election held yesterday for the Reichstag for Halle-Saalkrow, defeated his Radical opponent by a vote of 35,553 to 21,298. The vacancy was caused by the death on Thursday of Schmitt, Radical, who in the general election of 1907 had an absolute majority over two other candidates, one of whom was Herr Kunert.

THE GAME WAS SPOILED IN TIME

SHELBURNE, November 28—A man named John H. Jellows, claiming to be master of the Gloucester fishing schooner "Koomas," victimized a number of Shelburne merchants Friday. He arrived in town on Thursday evening and represented that his schooner had broken her mainboom in her severe gale of Wednesday. He stated that he was on his way to the halibut fishing grounds, and had left his vessel near the mouth of the harbor. Joseph McGill, who usually does all the business for the Gloucester captains, ordered a new boom from Halifax, and also advanced Jellows three hundred dollars in cash, which he said he wanted for his crew. It transpired last evening that there was no such schooner in the port, and Jellows had thus obtained the advances under false pretenses, and had left for the United States. The chief of police at Yarmouth was telephoned, and Jellows was arrested on arrival of the Halifax and South Western train. The greater part of the cash was found on him, and other papers, showing that he had been obtaining goods from merchants at Liverpool and other towns along the shore. He will be brought back here for trial.

BIG MERGER OF RAILWAY LINES

CHICAGO, Nov 28—Official announcement of the consolidation of the Chicago & Alton, and the Toledo, St. Louis & Western (Cloveleaf) roads with the Minneapolis & St. Louis and the Iowa Central railroads, under one management, is made. The announcement comes in the form of appointments of officers with jurisdiction over all four roads.

RESPECTED FAMILIES INVOLVED IN FEUD

WILLIAMSON, W. Va., Nov 28—That a third person was shot in the battle between the Christian and Daniels families, near Devon, Mingo county, Thursday, became known when a physician was summoned to attend Jim Daniels at the home of his brother. The wound may result fatally. In the event of his death three members of the Daniel family will have been wiped out as the result of this feud. Mrs Charles Daniels and her 16 year old daughter were shot to death. Kentucky officers have refrained from approaching the Daniels since the fight of two years ago, knowing that it means more bloodshed. Information gained today points to the possibility that two of the largest and most highly respected families of Mingo county may become involved in the feud.

BIG WARSHIPS NOW LAID DOWN

One the Greatest Cruiser Ever Built in Size, Armament, Power and Speed. Both Ready in Two Years.

LONDON, November 29—The keel plates of two monster warships, the Orion, an improved Dreadnought battleship and the Lion, a cruiser battleship, were laid today, the former at Portsmouth and the latter at Devonport. The material for both vessels is ready and arrangements have been made for their completion within two years. The construction of the Lion marks a notable stage in the evolution of cruising battleships. She will have 70,000 horsepower, while her immediate predecessor had 45,000. She will displace 21,000 tons and has a length of seven hundred feet, constituting her the largest man of war ever laid down. The intention is to equip this cruiser with ten 12-inch guns, placing her as regards armament on an equality with the latest battleships.

STEAMER LINES RAISING RATES

TORONTO, Nov 29—Malcolm L'Herbier, was elected to the legislature for Birtle, Manitoba, Saturday, making the first repulse the Roblin government has received, although the seat was formerly held by a Liberal.

HOSPITAL NURSES OUT FOR A SPREE

JERSEY CITY, Nov 28—Because they donned trousers coats and hats and posed for a photographer in the rear of a Clifton place residence, three young women attending the training school of the Jersey City Hospital, have resigned rather than stand trial on charges of conduct unbecoming nurses.

STRICTER SUPERVISION IN USE OF ANTI-TOXIN

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov 28—Stricter supervision by the Government of antitoxins is strongly advocated by the Department of Agriculture as the result of exhaustive tests authorized by Congress relative to the growth of unsatisfactory results from the use of such preparations as graph, newspaper and press offices. The fact that Portland, Los Angeles and Salt Lake City Utah telegraph their antitoxins vary extravagantly in their unit of strength, and some cuts that they could not raise San Francisco on any wires, tended to give some color to the rumors of an earthquake.

PARRY MARINE SHED WRECKED BY EXPLOSION

PARRY SOUND, Nov 28—An explosion which shook the whole town occurred between 10 and 11 this morning at the agency of the Marine Department here, (by which James Kerr was killed and A. C. Jones so seriously injured that he may not recover. The agent of the department, Maurice Brails, was also slightly injured. The agency has charge of all the lighthouses and buoys on Georgian Bay, and here the acetylene gas is generated and the plant for making the acetylene consists of a purifier, high-pressure dryer, low-pressure chamber, a compressor, and an engine which works the machines. A. C. Jones, the foreman, assisted by the fireman and Engineer James Kerr, was filling a number of storeholders, which were to be taken by the Government steamer Simcoe to replenish some of the buoys in the bay. One storeholder had been filled and the hose was attached to a second, in process of fill, all the glass in the windows next to the building was broken. Mr Kerr's clothing was charred to a crisp, and he had standing outside the building watching the process through the open door, when suddenly, without any warning, a heavy explosion occurred, completely demolishing the building, and hurling Jones some twelve feet and covering him with debris and pieces of broken iron, while Kerr was hurled in the opposite direction, also covered with timber and scrap iron. EVICTIONS IN MASSACHUSETTS

Striking Operatives Turned Out of Their Homes. Rain Destroys Their Effects.

LUDLOW, Mass, November 19—Some elements were added to the misery of the twenty-five families evicted on Saturday from the tenements owned by the Ludlow Manufacturing Association because of the strike in the mills. The household effects of the evicted persons were piled together in a great heap in the streets. The owners found shelter for themselves and their families but not for their goods. Rain ruined the greater part of the clothing and bedding and caused great damage to the furniture.

COWBOYS TOOK POSSESSION OF TOWN

ENGLEVALE, N. D., Nov 28—Two cowboys Thursday night fatally shot Louis Maxwell, a farmer, took possession of Englevalle for twelve hours and finally departed early yesterday with armed citizens in pursuit. The cowboys, known as the Gant brothers have not been found. In a pool room fight last night Maxwell was shot by one of the brothers. The Gants, who recently came from Texas to work on a ranch, then took possession of the town. Firing volley after volley with large revolvers, the two paraded the streets and forced every one to do their bidding until long after midnight. They then galloped off, much to the relief of the inhabitants. A Deputy Sheriff and deputies fear trouble when the Gant boys are found.

TWO RACES IN THE ARENA RINK

The Two Events Run off Last Night Were Hotly Contested. Poor Attendance.

In the Arena Rink last night a small attendance greeted the management who had put on two events, viz, five mile and one mile runs. The night's sport was not so well advertised as former races in this city and this fact, doubtless, was partly responsible for the diminutive size of the audience. But the two races were, in spite of this, good and well worth seeing, and those who were there were not disappointed in their expectations of witnessing something "worth while." The five mile was the first event called and the three starters—Michael Thomas, M. Robertson and Harry Harley, faced the starter about eight thirty-five. From the first Robertson took the lead, which he held for one lap, when he was passed by the Indian. The next lap, however, saw Robertson again at the front. There were two other changes in the first mile, which ended with the Indian at the lead. The beginning of the next mile was marked by Robertson's taking the lead. Each of the succeeding miles was reeled off regularly with occasional temporary bursts of speed, which for the moment, changed the positions of the runners. The last two miles were run off with Robertson in the lead, Thomas and Harley following, and it was not until there was but a half mile of the course left that the speed increased materially, with Robertson then in the lead. From this point he was never headed and though most energetically pushed by Thomas, he came in a winner about the distance in the good time of 26.57. Harley fell out of the race when but a lap to go, and just at the time when it was necessary for him to exert himself to the utmost. Thomas was a good second. The one mile was called on shortly after and only Robertson and Thomas showed up to compete. The race was led from start by Robertson who held this position for five laps when Thomas decided to try his hand at setting the pace. After three or four more laps Robertson again took to the front, a place he held until the end of the twelfth lap after a short race was then run and won, and he showed up and stopped at the first turn. Here he was passed by Thomas and on receiving the warnings of the officials made another start, and in a splendid sprint caught up to the Indian, whom he forced to do the distance in four minutes and fifty two seconds.
