

M.C.A. Wallops Holman's Intermediates 13-6 To Move Into 4th Place Tie

Maritime Central Airways moved into a tie for fourth place in the Island Baseball League last night by walloping Holman's Intermediates 13-6 in a free-hitting contest on Memorial Field.

The M. C. A. squad collected a total of 16 hits off Ray "Giblets" Arsenault while the Summerisle players came up with nine base knocks off the stout-hearted Lefty MacAleer.

MacAleer, who would be a leading candidate for the League's most valuable player award, relieved Jackie Burke in the first inning with none out and pitched the rest of the game.

He has now pitched 19 innings in the last two nights. Over that stretch has allowed only four earned runs in a sensational showing.

M. C. A. raced into a 3-1 lead in the first-inning on the strength of a triple by Elmer MacNeill, singles by Lewis and Purcell and a long fly ball by Matheson.

They added two more in the third as Jay drove Trainor and Matheson across the plate with a single. Matheson had earlier sent MacNeill home with a bouncing double into centre field.

Billy Purcell scored the winning run in the fifth inning. He opened the inning with a single into left field and stole second base. He went to third on Des Trainor's Texas League single and scored on Matheson's outfield fly.

Holman's stayed with the winners until the fifth frame. Callow scored a run in the first inning. The losers added two more in the second on two walks and an infield error.

They added another in the third when Delaney, Simmons, Gillis and Arsenault collected singles and they scored two more in the fourth when Simmons doubled home Jimmy Grady and Delaney.

Jackie Burke started on the rubber for M.C.A. but could not find the plate. He walked the first three batters and allowed one run to score on a wild pitch.

Coach Jimmy MacDonald sent MacAleer to the hill in relief with two men on and none out. Lefty proceeded to retire the side without another run being scored.

MacAleer gave up seven hits in the third and fourth innings but from then he remained in control. He allowed only two singles in the last four frames.

Glen Matheson, drove home four runs and had three hits in four trips to lead the winners. Lewis, MacKenzie, Purcell, MacNeill, Trainor and Willis Hennessey of M. C. A. all collected two hits.

Mark Delaney had three hits in five trips for Summerisle. Donnie Simmons banged out two hits for the losers.

Benny Grady in centrefield for Holman's made the outstanding play of the game when he robbed Matheson of a hit in the fifth inning with a one hand catch.

Three Americans Share Lead In Canadian Open

By JACK SULLIVAN Canadian Press Staff Writer TORONTO (CP)—Three American pros, all well known on the circuit, Thursday night shared the second round lead in the \$15,000 Canadian open golf championship.

Just one stroke off the pace, was Saskatchewan's Pat Fletcher who overcame a dose of stomach flu to shoot a three-under-par 68.

Slim Gardner Dickinson, a 127-pound bundle of golfing dynamite from Panama City, Fla., withstood the challenge of the "name" players to keep his share of the lead with Wally Hines of St. Paul, Minn., and Leo Baggett of Baltimore, Md. Each now has 136 for the 18 holes, Fletcher chasing them with 137.

It was a somewhat goofy day around this nifty 6,607-yard course as the 180-odd golfers from Canada and the United States came up with scores ranging from 67 to a 17-over-par 88.

There was a hole in one, by amateur Bill Given, vice-captain of the host club; a spectator poked his head in front of a hand-driven ball and was knocked cold; Ky Laffoon from St. Andrews, Ill., lost his temper and broke his putter across his knee and slow-moving officials kept Te' Kroll of Utica, N. Y., hanging around the 10th fairway for more than an hour before they appeared on the scene to decide on a lie.

O'Brien Drives Winner At Goshen, N. Y.

GOSHEN, N. Y., (AP)—Parker Byrd shaved one and three-quarter seconds off the historic track record for two-year-old pacers Thursday but Frank Ervin stole the show by driving the winner of four of the five races.

Parker Byrd, a son of Poplar Byrd owned by R. W. Drogmeyer of Chicago, stepped the final heat of the \$16,450 Goshen Board of Trade Pace in 2:05 to beat off Diamond Hal, owned by S. S. Camp farms of Shafter, Calif.

The previous track mark was set on July 4, 1946 by Vernon Hanover. Ervin won the first elimination heat with Parker Byrd in 2:07 with Del Miller driving. Meadow Gold into second place. Diamond Hal won the second elimination heat in 2:09.

Octave Blake's Newport Chief, driven by Joe O'Brien, of New Glasgow, N. S., beat Might Brewer to take the Goshen American Legion 17 class pace in straight heats.

Commanche, owned by Dr. J. M. McNally, of Bellwood, Neb., won the Tuxedo two-year-old trot with Ervin in the sulky. Ervin came right back to win the Middletown Chamber of Commerce 17 class trot with Edsel Hanover, owned by K. D. Owen of Houston, Texas.

Ervin then won the Will Gagahan two-year-old pace with Frisco Byrd, also owned by Drogmeyer.

Conference On Traffic Problems Is Continuing

HALIFAX (CP)—W. C. Butler of Toronto, president of All Canada Insurance Federation, said Thursday reports of abuses in provincial unsatisfied judgment funds are "grossly exaggerated."

He told the eastern conference of motor vehicle administrators here that no motorist in Canada has had to contribute more than \$1 per car in any one year.

"There have been all kinds of rumors and reports of how unsatisfied judgment funds have been bled and drained," he said. "Generally speaking such statements are grossly exaggerated."

Mr. Butler called for strict laws and forceful traffic regulation to reduce automobile accidents.

The conference was told that a standard 6 by 12-inch licence plate, in use in six states and seven provinces, is being recommended to the annual meeting of the American Association of M.V.A's.

Paul H. Becker of Detroit, representing the Automobile Manufacturers Association, and George E. Kenepp of Washington, D. C., showed a section of car truck with a slot in which the plate would fit.

E. S. Campbell, Nova Scotia's registrar of motor vehicles, said his province is losing bridges "right and left" because of heavily-loaded trucks. Truck loads were examined at the New Brunswick border but overweight vehicles still travelled the province's highways.

Charles F. Kelley, commissioner of motor vehicles for Connecticut, urged unity in trucking regulations. He said varying state and provincial laws were a threat to the trucking industry.

10 Great Golfers Bunched For British Title

GARNOUSTIE, Scotland, (AP)—Ten great golfers were bunched within four strokes Thursday night at the head of the pack as a ruthless scramble developed for the prized British open golf championship.

Dal Rees and Eric Brown, two Britons, led with 142, two strokes ahead of Ben Hogan and Frank Stranahan of the United States.

Hogan added a 71 to his 73 of Wednesday for 144, while Stranahan slipped from 70 to 74 for the same total. Peter Thomson of Australia was tied with the two Americans, while between these three and the leaders was the powerful Argentine star, Roberto de Vicenzo, with 143.

The final 36 hole of the 72-hole tournament over the tough, windy, wet course will be played today with the field cut from 81 to 49.

A score of 154 was needed to qualify for the finals.

The tournament, billed as Ben Hogan's own, became anyone's but the little Texan famed for his fighting finishes, might well have been out in front if his putts had not been missing by inches and fractions thereof. This is his first attempt to add the British title to his long list of American victories.

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Marine Capt. Ted Williams returned to the United States Thursday from air combat service in Korea and firmly ruled out any possibility that he would return to baseball this season.

The famed Boston Red Sox hitter said he might get back into the game next season, provided the Red Sox "want to fool around with old men." Williams will be 35 next month.

Bound immediately to Oak Knoll Naval Hospital, Oakland, Calif., for treatment of an ear ailment which cut short his Korea duty, Williams said he did not know how long he will be in the hospital. He noted he was not due for discharge from the service until October in any event.
