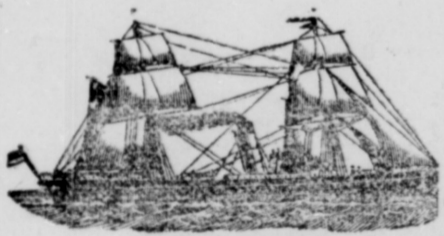

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER

**From Yesterday's 5 o'clock Edition.**

New York, May 18. - A special to the Herald from Washington says that Great Britain is evidently preparing for a war, which she expects will occur in the far east.

Official information which has been received at the Navy Department shows that she is buying up great quantities of coal in the far Western States and is storing it at Esquimaux.

The cause for Great Britain's action is not known in naval circles, but it is thought that the British Government desires to have on hand a large supply of fuel which will be useful for her squadron in Asiatic waters in case the situation in the far east should be productive of war.

Because of these purchases by Great Britain the price of coal has gone up, and the Navy Department is compelled to pay a higher rate per ton than heretofore.

WASHINGTON, May 18. - General Aquinaldo, the insurgent leader, has left Hong Kong to lead the attack on Manila.

It is said that 3,700 troops await him at Cavite.

He will act in conjunction with Anmira Dewey.

The Spanish authorities are making desperate attempts to win over the insurgents.

HAVANA, May 18. - The French cruiser Dubouche left Havana yesterday afternoon for Haiti, having on board a number of French refugees.

HAVANA, May 18. - The Captain General of Porto Rico has cabled to Captain-General Blanco saying that although the bombardment of San Juan de Porto Rico took place at rifle shot distance not a gun of the forts was silenced and the Spanish losses were only eighteen wounded.

The Captain General of Porto Rico further reports that the United States war ships Indiana, New York, Montgomery and Amphitrite, were in sight of Porto Rico during Saturday last.

CARACAS, D. W. I. May 18. - The Spanish fleet is now supposed to be off the coast of Venezuela or off the coast of Colombia.

Only a portion of the fleet were allowed to enter the harbor to obtain provisions cattle and coal which were purchased here.

Confirmation was obtained of the report that the Spaniards left one of their torpedo gunboats at Port de France, Island of Martinique.

New York, May 18. - The news just received from Porto Rico confirms the report that Freeman Halstead, the American newspaper correspondent, has been sentenced by a military court at San Juan de Porto Rico to nine years imprisonment after having been convicted of taking pictures of the forts with the use of a camera.

WASHINGTON, May 18. - Reports received here from Key West show that the condition of the torpedo boat Winslow is much worse than was supposed and it will be necessary to have her come to Norfolk for repairs.

**THE HAIRDRESSER.**

He Tells Stories of Human Vanity as Displayed in His Business.

The hairdresser was, as is not unusual with members of his profession, in a talkative mood. He was also inclined to meditate upon the vanities of humankind, which he has admirable opportunities to observe.

"If it wasn't for the fact that people think so much of their looks," he said, "we should lose three-quarters of our business and might as well shut up shop." It is wonderful to me, although you'd think I might be used to it by this time, to see how much trouble people will take about their hair. Just now the most fashionable shade of hair among women is a deep reddish brown or bronze. To get that color we bleach the hair to a blonde shade and then dye it to the proper bronze tone. It is a very slow job, for there must be five or six applications of the bleach, and then the dyeing takes a good deal of time. The whole process requires an entire day, and women will come in here and sit from morning until evening, never losing patience if they only think the result will be becoming and stylish.

"But that's only one of the ways in which they show their vanity about hair. There are lots of others. Why, I had a woman come in the other day who wanted all her own hair cut off, so that she could wear a wig. I looked at her in surprise. Her head was covered with thick, soft, naturally wavy hair of the finest quality, but what do you suppose was her objection to it? It was gray! I took out the hairpins, and the beautiful mass of hair fell in ripples far below her waist.

"But, madam, I said, 'it is a shame to cut off this hair. It is magnificent.'

"Oh, no," she said, 'I will not have gray hair. Cut it, I tell you. I want a brown wig.'

"So, of course, I did as I was told. The hair dropped to the floor, and was glad, I tell you, when I found she didn't want to take it away with her.
