House Briefs

OTTAWA (CP)—The CBC has found it too expensive to extend the French-language radio service to British Columbia, State Secretary Harkness said in a Commons reply Monday to Robert McEwen's question (Richmond). The number of French listeners in B.C. was 11,000.

Robert McCleave, parliamentary secretary to Works Minister Fulton, said the federal government is working out a contract with a syndicate of engineers known as Northumberland Construction limited for the proposed Prince Edward Island causeway. No reports from the engineers have yet been filed with the government. He was replying to John B. Stewart (L—Antigonish-Guysborough).

Defence Minister Harkness said the government is studying grievances in connection with standby duties and pay practices involving civilian duty officers at Canadian naval ammunition depots. But he told G. Roy McLean (L—Northumberland—Miramichi) that the necessary pay provisions must be approved before any action is taken.

Premier Walter R. Shaw has resumed his government activities. Yesterday, he was back in his office, and to start the ball rolling had a conference with several of his cabinet ministers. The premier was away from his office for about a year and a half. He underwent surgery in mid-August.

OTTAWA (CP)—Former speakers R. Roland Michener of the Commons and Mark R. Drouin of the Senate Monday were installed as members of the Privy Council of Canada at a government house ceremony. The appointments give them the title "honorable" for life.

Prime Minister Diefenbaker and former Conservative leader Hon. John Bracken, who was made a private councillor last year, attended the ceremony performed by Privy clerk R. B. Bryce in the presence of Governor-General Vanier. Mr. Diefenbaker, who is also a member of the United Kingdom Privy Council, giving him the life title "right honorable" and a 40-minute private conference with Gen. Vanier before the ceremony.

S'ide Men Elect Jury Trial On Robbery With Violence

SUMMERSIDE — Alfred (Toady) Cahill and Vincent Galant, both of Summerside, charged with robbery with violence, elected jury trial by Judge and jury when arraigned before Magistrate Richard S. Hinton QC in police court yesterday. Both pleaded not guilty to the charge and were remanded until Wednesday morning for hearing, after they told the court their lawyer J. Watson MacNaught QC was unable to be present.

The two men were charged after Bruno Arsenault, a Summerside pensioner, was beaten and robbed on the night of Oct. 7 and 8 in North Market Street. Stolen were \$30 in cash, a wristwatch and a cheque in the amount of \$55. Three mainland men as well as three local men pleaded guilty to drunkenness and each was fined \$20 and costs or five days. The charges were all laid under the town by-laws rather than the usual method of laying them under the Liquor Control Act. Five days was the alternative ordered by the magistrate.
