Optimism was expressed by space scientists, who pointed out the Ranger was capable of a mid-course trajectory correction of up to 10,000 miles.

The remaining point was preset at 16 hours after launch, when the spacecraft would be approximately 75,000 miles from earth.

In announcing the Ranger's slightly faulty trajectory, the federal space agency said: "This miss distance is well within the correction capability of Ranger's mid-course maneuvering system."

Six television cameras were housed in the 804-pound spacecraft launched by the Atlas-Agena rocket from Cape Kennedy at 11:49 a.m. Thursday.

The spacecraft completes its 11th orbit in a 90-minute flight. It will bear down on a relatively flat portion of the moon's surface about 10:49 a.m. AST Sunday.

Eleven previous U.S. moon shot attempts have failed. During the last 10 minutes of the flight, the camera will go into action, relaying as many as 3,000 pictures by radio signal to receiving equipment at the jet propulsion laboratory.
