

Thrilling Finishes Mark Racing At Driving Park

Tragedy stalked the Charlottetown Driving Park last evening and it struck in race four when Tea Time Gal with Gordon Robinson went down on the first turn and was dead of a broken neck when handlers arrived on the scene. The race was the feature one of the evening and early closer with ten entries and the race for the fall at the turn resulted in a mixup leading to the accident. Robinson was pinned under the dead mare and was taken to hospital. However, it was reported last evening that he had suffered no more serious injuries than a severe shaking up and will be all right.

An investigation of the accident is planned for Saturday evening and any action resulting from the spill will be announced when the report is made.

The Phillies got only five hits off Denny Lemaster 5-4.

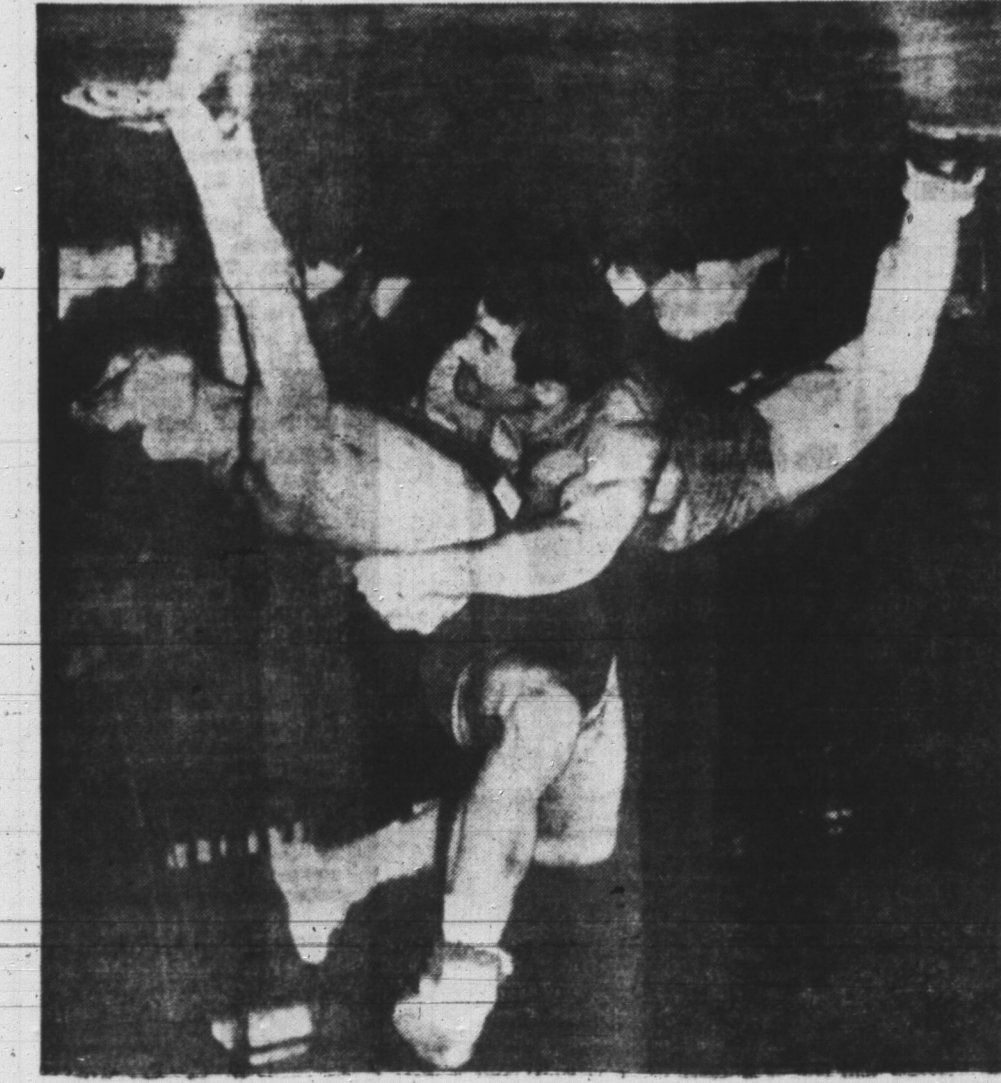

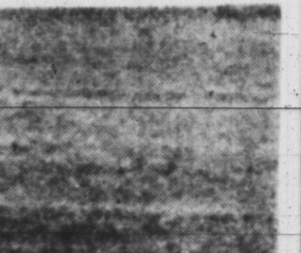

COOL REPORT

Football fans may have seen some reference to the COOL Report in the past few days and wondered just what it was all about. The initials COOL stand for the Committee of One League and they are going into action at the current meeting of the Canadian Football league. The committee will have to study the aspects involved in order for the league to join into one. Why the loop or rather loop want to amalgamate is beyond me for if they do join it will be just cause a lot of problems. For example what will happen to the Grey Cup game. As it is now the Eastern and Western Conferences of the Canadian Football league each declare a champion and the playoff for honors. The same system is used in both the National and American football loops so there can't be too much wrong with the setup. However if there was one league for all of Canada what would be the setup. If Western clubs dominated the league standings it is possible that an eastern team which finished as low as fourth in the standings would have to play off.

How would playoffs go, if they had them work. Would be constructed along the same lines as hockey where the first and third as well as second and fourth face one another and then the winners play off. All in all it makes for a complicated mess and it is just this that the COOL committee is going to have to iron out.

One would think that the present setup would satisfy most fans for the two loops are playing an interlocking schedule and the Western and Eastern teams generally hook up at least once a season when the exhibition games are taken into consideration. However the COOL report has that problem in their hands now and let them suffer for now.

MINOR BALL STARTS

Elsewhere on this page you will notice the lineups for the Little League and Farm League players registered in the city this year and they are the most significant to get carried in this paper if only for the number of them. Well over three hundred boys will be playing organized baseball this summer under the guiding eyes of the Charlottetown Recreation director and the Royal Canadian Legion and this represents double the number that participated in the set-up last year. Minor league baseball has been growing with leaps and bounds in the past few seasons here and baseball itself is making a comeback as can be attested to by the newly formed Junior Baseball league. Over fifty players have registered in this loop and rumors have been circulating that an intermediate team might attempt to join the league if enough interest can be aroused.

An interesting point to consider would be the sending of a little league team into Canadian competition for every year a Canadian Little League champion is declared and attends the World Little League championships in the United States. A team from Stony Creek Ontario lost in the finals last year in a U.S. club but by the attention given it by United States newspapers one would have believed they had won.

A little league team from here could possibly go a long way for little league players are little league players. That is to say most of the teams attending the big competitions have only one or two good pitchers and a solid infieling and outfielding corps so that any youngster stands a good chance as the next to become a star.

I seem to remember a team called the Charlottetown Peerless Ice Wees representing this city in the Quebec International Hockey tourney and winning thousands of fans for the Island. Why not have a young band of baseball players do the same?
