NEWS FROM THE CAPITAL

Tariff to be Brought Down on the 22nd.

LIBERAL LISTER AND THE OIL DUTIES.

McMullen's Want of Confidence in His Leaders.

OTTAWA, April 13.—Hon. Mr. Fielding
terminated the anxiety about the date of
the Budget yesterday afternoon by announc-
ing that the tariff would be brought down
on Thursday, the 22nd inst.

Hon. Mr. Foster asked whether there
was any hope that the tariff would be
proposed before the Nova Scotia elections?
Hon. Mr. Fielding said that it could not
be done.

Hon. Mr. Laurier announced that the
Government did not propose to rescind the
Remedial Order or take any parliamentary
action in the matter of the Manitoba
Schools.

The evening session witnessed a debate
on the oil duties. Mr. Moore, of Stanstead,
a Liberal-Conservative, proposing a reduction
of the duty to half the present rate.

Mr. Lister, Liberal, defended the present
duty.

Mr. McMullen's Bill placing the control
of the promotion, dismissal and payment of
the civil servants in the hands of a non-
political commission, over which the Govern-
ment would have no power was read a
first time.

I am glad to see that the honorable
gentleman is unwilling to trust the Civil
Service to the hands of his leaders, said
Sir Charles Tupper by way of comment on
the Bill.

Sir Charles excused Mr. McMullen's
Bill on account of the recent outrageous
dismissals and appointments in the interior
and other departments, especially the
treatment of the deputy Minister Mr.
Burgess,—a capable faithful official who
has served to the satisfaction of the Mac-
Kenzie and McDonald governments, who
is replaced by a man utterly discredited
in his own country by his scandalous con-
duct as Manitoba's representative at the
Chicago show.

GREECE AND TURKEY.

Both Address Pacific Notes to Powers.

GERMANY, RUSSIA AND AUSTRIA AGREED ABOUT THE BLOCKADE.

The Diplomatic Situation in Vienna.

ROME, April 13.—It has been semi-offi-
cially announced that Turkey and Greece
have both addressed to the powers state-
ments of a pacific character in regard to
the encounters on the Macedonian frontier,
which are described as mere frontier inci-
dents.

Germany, Russia and Austria have ap-
proved of the arrangements of the admirals
in command of the foreign fleets in Cretan
waters for the blockade of Piraeus.

Situation of Expectancy.

VIENNA, April 13.—The diplomatic
situation here is one of expectancy. The
proposal to blockade the Piraeus is now in
abeyance, and the diplomats think it
wholly improbable that the powers will
agree to restrain the Greek navy in the
event of war between Greece and Turkey.

Death of Mr. Lewis Carvell.

TORONTO, April 13.—Lewis Carvell, Esq.,
at one time general manager of the Inter-
colonial Railway, died here this morning.

YOUNG MEN'S DEBATING SOCIETY.

The second last debate of this society
for this season, was held on the 3rd inst.,
when the members discussed the question,
"Would Prohibition be a benefit to Can-
ada?" H. Tweedy acted as chairman of
the meeting. The speakers in favor of
Prohibition were Messrs. Mathias Praught,
R. E. Mutch and M. McLeod, who argued
that the only effective remedy for the
liquor traffic and the evils resulting there-
from is Prohibition. Give us that kind of
a law and we will progress as we never did
before.

Messrs. Ernest Nelson, Seymour Young
and David Fairclough, speaking on the
other side, argued that a prohibitory law
should not be enacted because in Canada
at the present time the sentiment of the
people is strongly against it and it would
therefore prove an injury to the country
rather than a benefit. The princi-
ples of Prohibition is wrong.
Men cannot be forced to give
up anything they think is not harmful in
itself; horses, oxen and mules can be
driven, but man generally opposes with all
his might any attempt to drive him as you
would a beast of the field.

The speakers showed how Prohibition failed to work in
Mine and other places where it had been
tried, by an increase of drunkenness, and
the use of poisonous drugs—hence if those
and other evils has always followed in the
train of Prohibition in other places, the
same might be expected in Canada. That
Prohibition hanting, the Scott Act was
dealt with; a speaker on the opposite
side claimed it was useful as a "temperance
educator"—its "power" in that line was
exposed by showing that it was carried the
first time and defeated the second time in
28 counties, and in every county where it
is still in force, it was carried by largely
reduced majorities, and it is the same old
failure as prohibition is in the States.
The loss of about nine millions of dollars
revenue would be another result of Prohi-
bition in Canada, and with the large
amount it would cost in the vain attempt
to enforce the law, this would be too much
for us to have to make up by direct taxation
or otherwise, seeing that we are now in the
hands of a gang at Ottawa, whose chief
ability is extravagance and deception.

Then again a prohibitory law could not be
enforced in Canada now. Any law that is
not backed up by public sentiment can
never be enforced, even though it might be
passed by that mighty apostle of purity—
"Lare himself."

After the subject had been well discussed
the chairman was called on for his deci-
sion, but in place of giving it, he briefly
stated his opinion on the subject. "An-
nexation with the States" will be discussed
at our concluding debate.
