TYPHOID FEVER.—There is a good deal of typhoid fever in the city at the present time. Between the 8th September and the 5th October 27 cases of typhoid and 2 of scarlet fever were reported to Health Officer Johnson. The reports of terminations for the same period show three deaths and thirteen recoveries. The cases now under treatment are progressing favorably. The notices of termination indicate that for the most part the disease is of a mild character.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER. The Poisoned Candy Case.

St. JOHN, N. B., Oct. 11. At the inquest to-night Post Office Inspector King was recalled and said that he had now fully satisfied himself that the poisoned candy was mailed in the city between the hours of 5.15 and 8.15 on Thursday night. Harry B. Peters, chief clerk in Barker's establishment, was examined at length. He saw McDonald in the wholesale department several times after night. He had no permission to carry a key. After the poisoning became known, he became somewhat curious about it, and on Friday night called on Coroner Berryman, and examined the boxes in which the candy had been sent. Saturday morning, on going to the shop, he examined the stock boxes and found Stewart's three-inch fine comb boxes to correspond exactly. McDonald was restless on Friday and Saturday, and on the latter morning, W. S. Barker mentioned to witness his suspicion of McDonald, and he remarked that he held the same suspicions after the arrest. Peters remarked that it corroborated his suspicion. He also told of McDonald being found in the shop one night about fifteen feet from where the strychnine was found, and of his sudden disappearance when the person appeared. W. S. Barker stated that the reason he was suspicious of McDonald was that he believed the work of sending the candy was that of a lunatic, and that was what prompted him to ask Peters to go to the coroner on Friday night and examine the boxes. He had no other cause for suspicion of McDonald. The inquest adjourned at four minutes to midnight until to-morrow evening.

Political Notes.

Ottawa, Oct. 11. Mr. Beauchemin (Liberal) and Mr. Massue (Tory) were nominated for the House of Commons for Richelieu county, to-day. Messrs. Laurier and Chapleau spoke. The feeling runs high. Senator Guevremont was mobbed and roughly handled at Sorrel to-day during the nomination proceedings. It is believed that Mr. Dewdney's speech at Victoria in favor of Chinese immigration was intended to foreshadow the adoption of a pro-Chinese policy by the Dominion Government, and the repeal of the present law imposing a tax of \$50 a head upon all Mongolians settling in the Dominion.

Sudden Death.

Ottawa, Oct. 11. Judge L. Oliver, Judge of the County Court of Prescott and Russell, died suddenly while attending a banquet at Ottawa College here last night. He had just concluded a speech, when feeling ill he was carried into an ante-room, and died in a few minutes. Deceased was 40 years old, and was appointed a Judge last year.

The Want Eight Hours.

BIRMINGHAM, Oct. 11. The National Conference of Miners to-day declared in favor of working days of 8 hours to go into operation on January 1st. The miners throughout Great Britain have taken a ballot on the question and decided to strike if their demand is not granted.

Have Taken Action.

Ottawa, Oct. 11. Carter, Mace & Co., tea merchants, have commenced an action in the Exchequer Court to recover \$1,600 alleged to have been improperly collected from them by customs officials as duty upon tea imported from China through the United States.

Belle Hamblin Wins.

NEW YORK, Oct. 11. At Fleetwood Park, to-day, a match race took place between Belle Hamblin and Harry Wilkes in the presence of a large number of spectators. Belle Hamblin won in two straight heats. Time, 2.16, 2.19.

Leave of Absence.

Ottawa, Oct. 11. Justice Fournier, of the Supreme Court, has been granted six months' leave of absence, and will travel in Europe with his daughter.
